

COAST LEAGUE DIRECTORS TO ACT ON LANDIS DECREE

President McCarthy Says He Will Abide By Decision

SAN FRANCISCO, July 31.—The directors of the Pacific Coast Baseball league will meet here tomorrow to ratify the ruling of Commissioner Landis that William Klepper and James Brewster, Portland club owners, be suspended from participation in organized baseball as a result of the affair in which Player William Kenworthy left the Seattle club to play with Portland this year.

William H. McCarthy, president of the league, has announced his intention of abiding by Judge Landis' ruling, but J. Cal Ewing, owner of the Oakland club, said he would defy it. Klepper has continued to act as president of the Portland club and has as yet made no announcement that he will turn the club affairs over to anyone else.

According to the Landis decision, Kenworthy becomes the property of the Pacific Coast league tomorrow.

BOXING GAME CLOSED UNTIL OCTOBER IS ORDER

Commission Decides to Hold Off Permission

There will be no boxing games staged in Eugene until after October 1, according to a decision announced by the Eugene boxing commission, following a meeting of the board last night, at which time a thorough discussion of the local ring situation was held, including a conference with Jack Fulton, promoter of the local game. No details were announced as to what plans for the future were under way or whether Fulton would continue to handle the cards in this city.

The local promoter has announced that he was lining up a card to be staged at the armory here August 25, with his brother, Fred Fulton, nationally known heavyweight, as a participant in the main event, but what effect the mandate of the boxing commission will have on the proposed bout is problematical. Although the decree of the boxing board seems to be final, local followers of the game seemed to be of the opinion last night that the game might be reopened prior to the definite date set by the commission providing that certain requirements of the members were complied with.

If the ruling of the commission stands it is understood that the proposed Fred Fulton bout may be held at Springfield, according to reports that circulated last night to the effect that arrangements were being discussed for the staging of the show at the mill city. Jack Fulton stated he had been offered a permit to hold the card at Springfield, but that no definite decision had been reached pending the outcome of the Eugene situation.

LIPTON WILL TRY AGAIN FOR AMERICA'S TROPHY

Persistent Britisher Proposes to Challenge

NEW YORK, July 31.—Sir Thomas Lipton, who has monopolized the challenging for America's cup, the blue ribbon trophy of international yacht racing, and who has failed in four attempts to take it across the sea, is coming to the United States in September to challenge again. After his Shamrock IV was defeated by the American defender, Resolute, Sir Thomas said he would challenge again for a race in 1923, but would wait until this fall to give other yachtsmen an opportunity to challenge. Nobody has challenged, as Sir Thomas is coming over. It is reported that Sir Thomas may ask for a change in the craft from sloops to schooners, but regardless of what rig his challenger will be called Shamrock V.

WILSON WINS AT GOLF DEFEATS PRESTWICK FOR SCOT-TISH CHAMPIONSHIP

rehearsing on the matter by the board. 4—"Farming" out of shop work by the railroads will be discontinued.

Discussion of the establishment of adjustment boards.

Regarding the matter of adjustment boards the official stated that the unions desired a national board of adjustment while the railroad executives seek either regional or system boards. Three points will be stressed by the general chairman tomorrow. It was stated, as a basis of settlement, restoration of full seniority, national boards of adjustment and the elimination of "garnishing" out of work. They will oppose, it was stated, curtailment of seniority, agreement to accept in the future decisions of the board and other than a national board of adjustment.

It was stated that the matter of accepting the proposals of President Harding is entirely up to the policy committee of the railroad department of the American Federation of Labor, since this body was the one which sanctioned the strike of the shipmen. The policy committee is composed of 80 men, 30 from each of the three districts, the dividing lines of which are the Mississippi river and the Mason-Dixon line.
