BIBLE UNIVERSITY WILL SOON BUILD HOSPITAL

\$100,000 Will Be Expended In Construction Work

LOCATION NOT DETERMINED

Two Separate Structures to Be Erected: May Train Missionaries in Medical Work

The board of trustees of the Eugene Bible university in a meeting held yesterday decided to erect in Eugene in the immediate future, a hospital and a sanatorium at an estimated initial cost of \$100,000. The sites for the structures, which will be built on separate tracts of land, have not been decided on, but it is known that the sanatorium, which will be used for convalescents and nervous cases, will be erected in a quiet place where surrounding conditions are ideal.

Although not definitely announced, it is understood that one of the purposes of the new hospital will be to train medical students and nurses for missionary service. The Eugene Bible university, it is understood, not only will equip its students to teach the gospel in foreign lands, but will also instruct them how to care for the sick and carry afar the doctrine of health.

Will Not Use Mercy

Contrary to a rumor which has been persistent in Eugene for some time, it has been made known that the Mercy hospital will not be purchased. The new institutions will be known as the Pacific hospital and sanatorium.

The tentative plans for the hospital indicate that it will be a fire-proof structure and will have room for 100 beds. A building committee will be appointed today.

Several Locations Considered

Two or three locations were considered by the board of trustees at its meeting yesterday. The Eugene Bible university owns several tracts of land near Eugene, but it is not known if the hospital and sanatorium will be erected on this land.

Additional units will be added to the structures from time to time and it is planned that patients will be sent here from all parts of the Pacific coast.

Definite announcement concerning the plan of the new buildings and materials which are to be used will be made soon.

JULY BUILDING IS ACTIVE

TOTAL OF \$80,630 OF CONSTRUCTION RECORDED

Forty-Six Permits Issued During Month By City Inspector—Combined Fees Largest in Years

Building permits representing a total of \$80,630 worth of new construction work in Eugene were issued during the month of July from the office of W. H. Alexander, city building inspector, according to the monthly report of the office compiled yesterday. Forty-six permits were issued, the largest being for the new home of the Delta Theta fraternity and one for \$7500 for the erection of the new fruit evaporator of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association.

Although the total amount of construction work is far below the \$193,736 figure of June, the number of permits is only three less. The heavy total of June included several large single permits, the Eugene hospital at a cost of \$50,000 being one of these. The total for May was also slightly above July, the figures being \$85,200. The total amount of building permit fees for July was \$344.25, being the largest one-month record in the past several years, according to the building inspector. The 46 building permit fees totaled \$106.25, and 64 plumbing permits turned into the office \$132.75. Electrical construction work permits totaled \$105.25.

TEACHER LIKES WORK WITH COUNTRY CHILDREN

Summer Session Student at University of Oregon Takes Interest in Community Activity

explains, "and a victrola plays between the pictures while we ventilate the room. The children are eager to help. They are happy to be allowed to run the Victrola or even open the windows."

Not only does Miss Thomas take the slides to those people who are far from cities and towns of any size, but after making them interested in doing things on a community scale she organizes children and adults into groups and manages basket socials, picnics, plays, all with the intention of helping them raise the funds which enable them to bring in slides more often.

"They are so responsive," she said. "If you love them and do things for them, they will love you—almost to death. And those children are not 'fed up' on city movies; they get a good deal out of the university films."

"The people in the small settlements are pioneers, and are the finest in the country. They deserve the best the state has to offer."

Miss Thomas has used the industrial films most, also the geographic and historical. Her whole aim is to stimulate community life in the smallest places and to add to the sum total of happiness. She taught last year at Hecla, a lonely spot on the Oregon coast, and next year she will be near Reedsport.

RIGHTS TO BE PROTECTED

RAIL OFFICIALS TO STAND BY NEW EMPLOYEES

J. H. Dyer, General Manager, Wires Instructions to Local Headquarters Concerning Status of Men

In a communication concerning the status and seniority rights of the Southern Pacific employees now on strike and those who are still with the company or who may in the future be employed, J. H. Dyer, general manager, stated that full protection as regards the rights of those now in the employ of the company will be protected.

The following communication has been received from the local offices of the company from the general manager:

"In answer to inquiries from employees concerning the present and future attitude of the management of this company toward those who have remained at work, those who entered the service since the strike was called and those who quit the service and went on strike July 1, 1922, would say that no matter when or how the strike is ended it is not the intention of this company to displace employees not in service or who may enter service to make room for strikers. Rights and privileges acquired by those now in service or who may enter the service between now and the time of ending of the strike will be protected. Furthermore, those who left the service of this company on strike July 1, 1922, who have committed acts of violence or attempted to intimidate and interfere with employees in the performance of their duties or who have encouraged others to commit such acts and have otherwise been active in promoting the strike and inciting disorder will not be permitted to enter the service of this company."

FIELD TO BE DISCUSSED

SCHOOL BOARD TO PLAN ATHLETIC GROUND

New Eugene High School Project to Be Decided by Budget Committee in Two Weeks

What arrangements will be made for the construction and equipping of the new Eugene high school athletic field, the site of which has been donated by the heirs of the Hendrick estate, will depend upon the report of the budget committee which will meet within the next few weeks according to members of the board. When the plot of ground was deeded to the school board an announcement was made that the field would probably be ready for use at the end of this year and this matter will be taken up by the committee.

The question of the financing of the construction work will have to be considered carefully, according to members of the school board, who state that the six per cent limitation on expenditures may result in preventing the entire completion of the work this year according to the tentative plans that have been discussed for the field.

Details of the arrangement of the athletic ground will be decided upon following the reports of P. L. Grannis and Fred Chess, who have charge of the athletic activities of the local high school. If it is found expedient to provide for the construction work this year the probable plan will be for the school authorities to provide the site and the school board, who state that the six per cent limitation on expenditures may result in preventing the entire completion of the work this year according to the tentative plans that have been discussed for the field.

EASTERN OREGON MEN SPEAK HERE THIS EVENING

This evening at the chamber of commerce a meeting will be held at which members of the Central Oregon development league will present their views as to why the Central Pacific should be divorced from the Southern Pacific and given to the Union Pacific. The officials of the Central Oregon association assert that the Willamette valley is going directly against its own interests in favor of the Southern Pacific contention. J. W. McCulloch, president of the league, ex-Governor Oswald West and William Hanley will be among the speakers.

The Central-Southern Pacific divorce, with its reaction on the completion of the Natron cut-off, is one of the most important questions affecting Eugene's future, and a large audience is expected to meet the Eastern Oregon men, Sentiment in Eugene, at the final hearings of the interstate commerce commission, will favor whichever system offers the most in definite results to this community.

RURAL MAIL IS CHECKED

POSTAL RULE REQUIRES REPORT ON 15-DAY PERIOD

In order to ascertain the amount of mail carried in a fifteen-day period by each rural mail carrier, the work out from the Eugene office a check is being kept on the outgoing mail in accordance with the rule of the department that twice each year this check will be compiled. The number of pieces handled and the total weight of the loads are included in the report of the postal authorities. It will be several days before the complete figures will be available for the fifteen-day period, according to Postmaster E. L. Campbell.

ORCHARDS TO BE VISITED

COLLEGE EXPERTS TO INSPECT FRUIT GROWING

Results of Program for Better Yields Will Be Observed By O. A. C. Horticulturists

To inspect the orchards of Lane county and to observe the results of the county program for the bettering of the fruit yields, Professor O. L. Long of the Oregon Agricultural college, accompanied by members of the extension division, faculty in the department of horticulture will be in Eugene Thursday and will visit many of the orchards in this vicinity with Ira P. Whitney, county agricultural agent. No demonstration are planned by the visitors, states Mr. Whitney, as the trip is for the purpose of checking up on the work that has been accomplished by following the plans advocated by the state college experts.

The results of the close application of the methods that are urged by the horticulturists are apparent in the orchards of the county, states the agricultural agent, who reports that a total of 49 tons of nitrate of soda have been used during the past year in the local orchards and that this has had a marked effect in the increase in the fruit bearing.

A series of poultry demonstrations are also planned for Friday and Saturday according to the schedule of the county agent. Professor H. E. Cobby, of the O. A. C. extension division will be here and with Mr. Whitney will hold a demonstration Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Barber farm, near Coburg. Saturday morning at 9:30 o'clock the demonstration will be at the McMahon farm near Thurston and in the afternoon at 2 o'clock at the J. W. Woodruff place, near Santa Clara.

BURGLARS ENTER HOME

MIL. ANR. MRS. CARLTON O. BUTTON LOSE JEWELRY

TAX FIGURES MISLEADING

PORTLAND REDUCTION FAILURE, STATISTICS INDICATE

Local Man Believes Data Given Out From Salem Recently Is Fallacious

Statements sent out from Salem recently relative to a decrease of \$715,658.50 in the complete tax levy of Oregon for the year 1922 are misleading, believes L. L. Ray, president of the Eugene chamber of commerce and candidate for state senator on the Democratic ticket. Mr. Ray has recently analyzed state tax statistics and points out that the marked reduction is fallacious.

Mr. Ray statistically shows that the reduction in tax levies for all taxable bodies in the state is \$715,658.50. Of this amount, \$597,742.39 was the reduction on local taxing units, and \$117,916.11 is the decrease in state taxes. This decrease in the state taxation was brought about by the shrinkage of assessment which amounts to \$20,034,816.10 less than the previous roll and the consequent reduction in the amount of money received from the different millage taxes. This indicates the reduction was brought about not by the lessening of the tax rate but by the reduction of the assessed valuation in the state tax levies.

Concerning the local units, Mr. Ray's statistics show that the largest reduction was made in the city of Portland where \$1,595,533.81 was cut from the roll, and of this sum \$1,077,411.37 was taken from the public school income. This attempted cut in school revenues resulted in the people of Portland finding it necessary in June of the present year to levy a special additional school tax of \$1,000,000 and to float a \$3,000,000 bond issue.
