TRAIN KILLS JOHN ELDERS

SHASTA LIMITED STRIKES MAN FROM MOSIER, ORE.

Starts Across Tracks and Falls to See Rapidly Approaching Locomotive

CRESWELL, Ore., Aug. 1.—John Elders, of Mosier, Oregon, was struck by the north-bound Shasta limited this afternoon and instantly killed. His body being fearfully mangled. The accident occurred almost directly in front of the depot.

In company with D. N. Lister, of

Albany, Mrs. Elders was returning to Creswell from a trip to look at some land owned by Mr. Lister. When they arrived at the depot, a freight train was standing on the tracks just south of the passenger station and a brakeman warned Mr. Lister and Mr. Elders not to cross. The car was stopped and Mr. Elders started across the tracks toward the station. Presumably he did not hear the approaching train and it struck him. The body was taken to Eugene on the Shasta.

Coroner W. W. Branstetter, who was called and took charge of the remains, communicated with Mr. Elders' daughter at Mosier over the telephone and she stated that someone would be here today to take the remains home. The man was aged between 65 and 70, said the coroner, and he learned that he kept the hotel at Mosier. It has not yet been decided whether or not an inquest will be held.

CHANGE IN ROAD WANTED

HARRISBURG DELEGATION VISITS STATE COMMISSION

HARRISBURG, Ore., July 31.—(Special to the Register)—M. D. Morgan, W. E. Wadsworth and H. H. Sherrill were in Portland Wednesday.

They went there to confer with the highway commission about changing the right-of-way through the Sherrill place back to the original place, this being only through the north end of the 11-acre place. This right-of-way if it could be changed back, could be obtained free from the Sherrill family, but if it remains as it is at present, damages to the property to the extent of \$2,000 are being asked.

The commission evidently feels that the route as it is at present is the best possible entrance into the city, and they further stated that this route could not well be changed back to the original survey. The Harrisburg men were given little satisfaction when the commission referred their request to the engineers.

HOP HOUSE IS DESTROYED
BUILDING NEAR HARRISBURG BURNS TO GROUND

HARRISBURG, Ore., August 1.—(Special to the Register)—The popular of Harrisburg were awakened about 1 this morning by the blowing of the fire alarm.

The hop house of Joe Wooley's on the M. A. Winn property south of town on the river bank was found to be on fire. The fire department hurried to the blaze but it was soon found that the fire house could not reach the blaze. Flying embers from the fire in the hop house caught the roof of a barn nearby and a number of houses who gathered at the fire immediately formed a bucket brigade and put the fire out on the roof of the barn after it had burned for fully fifteen minutes and badly damaging it. Some hop supplies also were up in smoke along with the building.

It is not known who discovered the blaze or how it had its start. The loss is estimated at about \$1000.

DAILY MARKET REPORT

OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 1.—There is no surplus of best quality butter in the local market at this time. Continued dry weather has so much retarded the output of practically all Northwest makers that the former surplus of good quality has practically disappeared.

In fact, reports indicate that some points of the Willamette valley which were previously liberal shippers of surplus butter to Portland are now not only unable to do so, but are actually seeking their requirements here.

This has had the effect of stimulating the market for good stuff, although off-grade country cubes are still in abundance and easily obtainable around 26¢ a pound.

Notwithstanding the recent advances in prices at California points, prices here continue the highest in the nation, a condition that is not at all justified by the trade.

EGG TRADE GENERALLY HOLDING
Generally unchanged prices continue in the egg market, both buying and selling values being stationary. Receipts appear more moderate, while demand is reflecting some slight improvement.

COUNTRY-KILLED HOGS HIGHER
Half cent a pound has been added to the selling price of country-killed hogs along Front street with tops commanding 16½ cents a pound generally. Only a limited supply is showing. Veals are firm for good stuff.

ONION PRICES REDUCED AGAIN
With Walla Walla offering supplies at a further reduction, local sales of onions from that section are being made around \$1.75 per 100 lb. net weight. California yellow Danvers held at \$2.50, but sales are very limited.
