the egg market has been somewhat improved of late. This has been due mostly to the fact that farm eggs have been plentiful, although supplies from henneries have kept up rather well.

The market in reality has a mixed appearance. Considerable off-grade stuff is being offered from candlings and this has a tendency to cause weakness in some quarters.

BUTTER TRADE HOLDS STEADY
No change was shown in the butter market situation here for the day. Cubes sold with sales from \$1.50 to \$2.25 generally to retailers.

CHICKEN MARKET IS STEADY
Chickens show a merely steady tone in general, although resellers of liberal lots of light-weight hens find it impossible to clean up beyond 18c, although small lots bring the extra fraction. Ducks and geese continue slow.

POTATO MARKET REMAINS EASY
With lower prices available on some California stock, the local market for new crop potatoes was easy at \$2.00 to \$2.50 per cental generally. Old stock is still in demand with sales from \$1.50 to \$2.25 generally to retailers.

BEANS MARKET IS EASY
Beans were generally quiet and firm and in some instances higher figures were named with legums at \$1.05 to \$2.00; blackberries, \$1.75 to \$2.00; raspberries, \$2.25 to \$2.50 per crate. Very scant offerings of leguminous and raspberries of quality.

BOSTON, Aug. 4.—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say:

A fair demand has been in evidence in the wool market at steady prices. The openings of the American Woolen company apparently being attended with a fair degree of success and this helping the wool trade to more confidence.

Tariff outlook still is uncertain, but not sufficiently so to cause any price cutting, especially in view of the problem of replacement. A little buying is reported in a speculative way in the West on recent price levels.
