

HALL HAS GAINED EIGHT IN PORTLAND RECOUNT

Ballots in 32 out of 135 Precincts Rechecked

MANY ERRORS ARE FOUND

Names of Three Hundred Persons Accused of Having Voted Illegally Presented

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 4.—Charles Hall today gained eight votes over Governor Olcott in the recount of the ballots in Multnomah county. Thirty-two of the 135 precincts have been checked and many errors are found. Names of 300 persons accused of having voted illegally in the Republican primaries were presented by attorneys for Charles Hall today when the Oregon circuit court convened here to continue trial of the content of the Republican nomination for governor.

Hall won first blood in the recount when Olcott lost two votes in precinct 1. The court decided to proceed with the recheck of the ballots and decide legal questions after the count of the contested precincts has been completed. Attorneys for Hall charged that the seal of the ballot box of precinct 1d has been cut. County Clerk Beveridge declared that a seal is sometimes broken in the presence of election officials in bringing in the box in order to get at records improperly placed inside. The man who brought in the box is expected to be called later. Hall's attorneys also asserted that in precinct 1d, Estelle Lagerquist, one of the election officials, had been registered as a democrat, but according to the pollbook had called for a Republican ticket.

Request that all the ballots cast in precinct 2 be thrown out was made by Hall's attorneys on the ground that election officials had not numbered,

GREEKS SEEK PEACE BY ACTION AGAINST TURKS

OCCUPATION OF CAPITAL MEANS OF BRINGING IT ABOUT

Continued Delay Will Result in Fresh Calamities to Christians in Asia Minor, Claimed

ATHENS, Aug. 4.—Responding to the allied powers note of July 21, the Greek government says it decided to occupy Constantinople in order to bring about peace by means of decisive military action against the Turkish capital. Complaint is made that the allied decision against such a move raises an obstacle to the proper exercise of Greece's right as a belligerent to put an end to Turkish resistance by military action of incontestable importance.

The Greek reply reiterates that continued delay in the conclusion of peace will result in fresh calamities to the Christians in Asia Minor and further aggravation of the whole near eastern situation.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 4.—The council of allied generals is taking drastic action to prevent further incidents in the clash between Greek and Turkish troops on the frontier, northwest of this city, early in the week, in which three Greeks were killed. It has been decided that the Greeks shall occupy new positions less menacing to the Turkish lines.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Aug. 4.—The concentration of troops on both sides of the Thracian line has not disturbed traffic on the railway to Constantinople, the Orient express and other trains going and coming regularly across Thrace. Calm prevails on the Greek-Bulgarian frontiers.

FOREST FIRES GAINING HEADWAY IN 3 STATES

Large Number of Men Fighting Blazes in Different Sections

SOME RAIN HAS FALLEN

Not Enough to Affect Situation in Western Montana, Idaho and Eastern Washington

MISSOULA, Mont., Aug. 4.—Forest fires gained headway in various places in Montana, Idaho and Eastern Washington, according to reports at headquarters of the district No. 1 of the forest service today. One fire, that on Twin creek, jumped from 300 to 700 acres on the Clearwater forest. This fire is near the Idaho-Montana line in a section that is almost inaccessible and mule pack trains, accompanied by men walking, are being sent in a distance of 45 miles. Twenty-three men were fighting this blaze and 25 more are on their way from Orofino, Idaho, to enter the battle against the flames.

The 700-acre fire on the Kanikou forest, which is burning in a part of the forest service experiment station, has not made any headway against the 300 men fighting it. Two fires under control. The flat fire and the Kallispell fire, on this forest, have been brought under control, but a blaze has broken out, called the Kallispell fire No. 2. These Kallispell fires are not near the town of Kallispell, Montana, but are 12 miles from the town of Priest River in Idaho. The Otis Creek fire, on the Cootenay forest, in Northwestern Montana, got beyond control last night and burned over 25 acres.

On the Blackfoot forest the 1000-acre fire is still going and about one mile of trench remains to be constructed to surround this blaze. The national park service has been fighting a part of this fire, which jumped into Glacier park and has burned over 70 acres. All other fires on the Blackfoot are under control. On the Pen d'Oreille forest in Northern Idaho, 60 men are holding the Myrtle creek fire. The area over which this has burned is unknown.

New Blazes Break Out
On the St. Joe forests in Idaho, the fires on Marble Creek, Pocatello creek and Homestead creek, all south of Avery, Idaho, are being held. A new fire has broken out here, which is being fought by a crew sent in last night. No reports as to the size of this fire have been received. This is in a heavy stand of good merchantable timber.

Rain fell last night and today in Montana, but did not get far west enough to put out forest fires. Some rain fell on the East Selway forest in Idaho. It was reported as cloudy from all forests today, however, and it is believed the situation tonight is better than it has been for days.

During the past 10 days 239 fires have occurred in the district, nearly all of which have been in Western Montana and Northern Idaho. Of this number, 36 are still burning. This makes a total of 576 fires in the district this season. The total area burned over is approximately 24,000 acres, of which 17,000 is private land and 7,000 national forest land. The causes of the fires during the last ten days period are as follows:

Lightning, 151; railroad, 38; smokers, 11; campers, 13; brush burning, 2; lumbering, 3; incendiary, 14; miscellaneous, 7.

HUNDRED FORTY VESSELS ON PACIFIC COAST IDLE

NOT ENOUGH BUSINESS TO KEEP THESE SHIPS BUSY

Shipping Board Has Fifty-six Steamers Swinging at Anchor in Mud Flats

SAN FRANCISCO, July 25.—Eighty-nine American steamships and fifty-one American sailing vessels have been idle from two to 20 months in ports of California, Oregon and Washington, the result, according to W. Relyea, general manager of the United States Shipping board, of the fact that there is not enough business at present to keep the shipping of the world busy.

"The United States is getting its share of what business there is," said Relyea. "For foreign vessels are tied up in their own countries."

"When business conditions become normal, there will be a great demand for boats to carry cargoes. The United States should prepare for this by turning over the shipping board vessels to private owners and grant them subsidies, that they may compete with foreign-owned shipping."

Thirty-one of these idle boats on the Pacific coast are wooden sailing craft, and three are wooden steamers. Foreign vessels are being moved promptly, although some carry part cargoes and some carry ballast.

The United States Shipping board alone has 56 steel steamers swinging to anchors in mud flats. In size they range up to 5,500 tons. Thirty-seven of these shipping board vessels are in San Francisco bay. Five of them never made a voyage. They are: The Murea, a steel steamer of 4,385 tons, launched July 3, 1920; the M. Men, a steel tank steamer of 2,971 tons, launched August 2, 1920; the Memnon, steel steamer, launched September 29, 1920, and the concrete tank steamers Palo Alto and Peralta, each of 2,701 tons, launched October 26, 1920.

Before the war was begun in 1914 few vessels carried the American flag to foreign ports. Today, possessing a merchant marine among the largest in the world, Uncle Sam sees his flag flying on many vessels in home ports.

Riding at anchor in San Francisco bay are 27 steamers and 36 sailing vessels. Puget Sound waters float 21 steamers and 11 sailing craft. The Columbia river shelters 10 ocean steamers and two sailing vessels, and the lumbering port of Grays Harbor, Wash., has two sail-power boats tied up.
