

LONG-BELL TRANSFERRING OPERATION TO NORTHWEST

Exhaustion of Southern Pine Stumpage Anticipated

BUILDING MILLS AT KELSO

Approximate Annual Capacity of New Enterprise to Be Six Hundred Million Feet

The largest manufacturer of southern pine lumber and one of the largest lumber producers in the world, the Long-Bell Lumber company of Kansas City, is arranging a gradual transfer of its interests from the southern states to the fir forests of the Northwest, where the company owns more than 70,000 acres of timber.

At the confluence of the Columbia and the Cowlitz rivers, just opposite Kelso, Wash., the company has purchased several thousand acres of land, on part of which construction will presently begin of sawmills, docks, storage yards, railroad yards, machine shops, hotels, homes, retail business and amusement centers and all the incidental equipment and conveniences of the most modern logging communities.

Returning to Kansas City recently from the Northwest, where he examined the progress of the development, R. A. Long, founder and chairman of the board of directors of the company, announced immediate construction plans for the new project.

New Plant at Kelso
The plant will be located 50 miles inland from the Pacific ocean, about half way from Portland to the ocean. Large ocean freighting vessels traverse the Columbia river from Portland to the Pacific, passing this location, and will find loading at the company's docks. Three trunk line railroads, the Great Northern, the Northern Pacific and the Union Pacific, will distribute the product to the interior points of the United States.

The two big mills, which will operate day and night, will be located on the Columbia river. Another mill located in the immediate vicinity will be built somewhat later. These mills will have an approximate annual capacity of 600,000,000 feet, or nearly 100,000,000 feet more than the company is producing at present in its 11 big southern pine mills.

The first construction will be that of two fir mills. These mills will stand side by side with a 25-acre pond between them. This pond is to

serve immediately these mills, while a larger pond of about 1600 acres will serve as a storage pond.

Mills Complete in Year
"It will be more than a year before the mills are completed," Mr. Long said. "The development now at hand follows two years of exhaustive preparation in surveying and mapping the entire timber holdings and clearing several thousand acres of land, preparing for the mills. Probably what is the first relief map of timber holdings in the history of the lumber industry has been made and on such a scale to permit officials in the Kansas City office to plan detailed operations, such as location of railroads, outlying logging camps and mills."

The main office and general sales office will remain in Kansas City. "We will not be through cutting in the southern pine district for years, and will be shipping fir in large quantities long before our timber is exhausted in the South," Mr. Long added.

Lumber to Be Branded
"Branding our lumber, first inaugurated by this company some three years ago, will be continued in the Northwest. Every piece of lumber that leaves our mills will bear the trade-mark of the company."

Mr. Long said 4000 workmen would be needed when the mills were ready for cutting, and provision is being made to make home life there more attractive to families by the providing of suitable and attractive homes for their use.

The Long-Bell Lumber company was founded in 1875 with one retail lumber yard. Today it is a \$30,000,000 corporation owning 11 pine mills and 2 hardwood mills, all located in the South; also a large white pine mill and sash and door factory at Weed, Cal., and 130 retail yards located in Kansas, Oklahoma, Missouri and Texas.

SWATOW TYPHOON WORST IN HISTORY OF THAT CITY

DEAD BODIES FLOAT AMONG WRECKAGE EVERYWHERE

Death List Placed at Five Thousand—Water in Harbor Rises and Drives People From Homes

(By the Associated Press)
HONG KONG, Aug. 5.—Wednesday night's typhoon at Swatow, 250 miles north of here, was the worst in the history of the city. Dead bodies are floating amid the wreckage everywhere in the harbor. Nearly every house in the city was damaged. A flood following the wind drove inhabitants from their homes.

Telegraph lines between here and Swatow are down, but details of the disaster were brought here today by steamer.

The storm broke at 10:30 o'clock Wednesday night and gathered force until daybreak, when it subsided, leaving death and destruction in the city and harbor. The death list is placed at 5000.

Hundreds of native craft along the water front were wrecked and their occupants drowned, while houses ashore felt the effect of the terrific wind.

Several godowns, or warehouses, were badly damaged and their stocks of merchandise wholly or partially ruined. Trees were torn up by the roots, telegraph poles were snapped off, roofs were carried away and entire houses laid flat in the pathway of the storm.

Native boats in the harbor were picked up as the wind and the water linked forces and were carried far inshore. Coasting steamers, dragged their anchors, some of them over distances of two miles, and were pitched on land, damaged. The lighthouses at the entrances of the harbor, despite their solid foundations and sturdy construction, also show the scars of the typhoon.

The water in the harbor rose rapidly until several feet deep in the shore-line warehouses and as it continued upwards, inhabitants of the houses left or retreated to their upper stories.

TACOMA BANKER IS SOUGHT

ANOTHER WOMAN FIGURES IN EMBEZZLEMENT CASE

TACOMA, Aug. 5.—Friendship for another woman, it was declared today by officials working on the case, was the motive which caused Spencer Conrow, assistant manager of the Tacoma branch of the Bank of California, to leave behind him a prostrated wife, a child and a shortage of about \$6000 in his accounts and flee the city as a fugitive from justice.

Agents of the department of justice and the United States marshal were seeking today to apprehend Conrow on a federal warrant sworn out before United States Commissioner Thomas W. Hammond. The charge against Conrow was brought in the federal court by reason of the Bank of California being a national bank.

According to Manager G. H. Raleigh of the bank, a complete check of Conrow's accounts has disclosed a shortage of \$6,000.97. He did not have access to the bank's cash and his peculations, which extended over a period of two years, were obtained through securities. It is believed at the bank that Conrow was contemplating flight before he was confronted with the charge of thefts, for \$1500 was found in his desk following his flight from the city Tuesday night. News of Conrow's wrongdoing, together with the confirmation of rumors that "there was a woman in the case," was a distinct shock to his friends. He was prominent in golfing circles and took an active interest in many of the civic affairs of the city. He was receiving a salary of \$450 a month and bonuses which brought it up to about \$500 monthly, or about \$6000 a year. He seemed to have no expensive habits, his tastes were of a conservative nature.

ROAD WILLING TO ACCEP

NORFOLK AND SOUTHERN TO GUARANTEE SENIORITY

NEWBURN, N. C., Aug. 5.—The Norfolk and Southern railway is willing to accept the proposals of President Harding guaranteeing seniority rights to striking railway employees as a basis for the settlement for the shopmen's strike, says a letter addressed to the former employees by F. P. Peller, general manager of the road.

"There are no matters in controversy between this railroad and its employees which cannot be settled in absolute accord with the basis outlined by President Harding," said Mr. Peller in his letter.
