NEW BUILDINGS PLANNED FOR UNIVERSITY CAMPUS

Two Burned Structures Will Be Replaced

WORK TO START AT ONCE

Regents Authorize Construction of Wing to McClure Hall and New Home for School of Art

Construction of a new building to house the school of art of the University of Oregon and the building of a wing on McClure hall to provide quarters for the other departments that suffered in the recent campus blaze were authorized by the executive committee of the board of regents at a meeting here last night. Plans for the new structure will be prepared at once under the direction of E. E. Lawrence, dean of the school of architecture and construction work on the building will start as soon as possible, it is announced. The new art building, according to the tentative plans discussed will be constructed on the site of the former women's gymnasium that was destroyed in the fire and will be of wood construction with the addition of a special fire-proof wing for the housing of the art work of the school and to prevent any recurrence of the loss of valuable objects of art as resulted by the destruction of the former art building.

McClure Hall Wing Planned
The wing that is planned for McClure hall will be of the same height and design as the present building and built out from the rear of the structure and the arrangements made for the construction of this addition provides for the cancellation of the plan for the building of a smaller wing to the building that was authorized prior to the fire. The McClure hall wing will provide office and class rooms for the department of journalism and the department of physical education which were formerly quartered in the burned wooden building. The journalism "shack" which was saved from the fire, will be rebuilt and will be ready for occupancy when the college year opens in October.

More Floor Space Available
Although work on the buildings will be pushed as rapidly as possible it is not expected that they will be complete and ready for use until several weeks after the opening of the fall term but provision is to be made to take care of the work of the departments until the buildings are complete. According to the tentative plans for the art building and the McClure hall wing, the departments that will occupy the new quarters will have more floor space than was available in the buildings that were destroyed in the fire.

The appointment of several new members to the faculty of the university was also authorized at the meeting of the regents. The following members of the board were present: Charles H. Fisher, Eugene; Thomas W. Medford, Corvallis; C. Dixon, Eugene; and Mrs. George T. Gerlinger, Portland.

MAZAMAS HEAD EASTWARD

MOUNTAIN CLIMBERS ARRIVE ON WAY TO SISTERS

Group of Local People Accompany Party on Outing to Snow-Capped Peaks of Lane

This morning at 5:30 o'clock 88 Mazamas, mountain climbers of the Northwest, will arrive in Eugene where they will be joined by 13 local people, and tonight by the time the sun nears the smoke of the western skyline this group of 111 will be camped at Obsidian falls near the snow line of the North Sister, for an outing which is to last two weeks.

Although the mountaineers will have breakfast here after alighting from the Portland train early this morning, the Eugene chamber of commerce has taken the opportunity of appealing to their appetites by giving them two crates of locally grown peaches which are supposed to serve as part of their noon meal at some point up the McKenzie highway not far distant from the snow-capped peaks. Along with these boxes of peaches went the welcome of the chamber of commerce and the best wishes for an enjoyable excursion into Eugene's backyard.

After eating breakfast here, the hikers, well equipped with goggles, hobnails, alpenstocks, and accoutred in the habits of typical mountain climbers, will leave for Frog camp, a place near the McKenzie highway close to the summit of the mountains, and 65 miles distant from Eugene. From this site they will hike six miles over the skyline trail to their base camp. Cecil Pendleton, a veteran mountaineer, has been arranging the camp for the past week, and everything will be in readiness for the climbers when they reach the place today.

While in the vicinity of the Sisters the Mazamas will scale five of the nearby peaks. The schedule of hikes includes visits to all of the prominent peaks in this locality and excursions to places of scenic and geologic interest. Elmer Maxey, local newspaper man, will accompany the party as the official representative of the Eugene chamber of commerce. Other Eugene people who will accompany the Mazamas party are W. K. Newell, W. M. Case, J. E. Allison, Agnes Campbell, Beatie Day, W. C. Yoran, Jessie Biles, Helen F. Hand, Nellie Helser, Emma Waterman, Eyla L. Walker and Catherine Youim.

LOCAL RADIO HEARD AFAR

YOSEMITE NOTIFIES LEWIS HE HAS BEEN COPIED

The Garrett Lewis broadcasting station located on Emerald street is the first point in the seventh radio district to be copied by the Yosemite radio plant. The Yosemite station is situated in the great canyon, one mile wide and nearly one mile deep, and few stations other than the nearby California cities can be heard.

The seventh radio district comprises Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana, and since the local station has been the first among the great number of broadcasting points in the Northwest to be copied by the Yosemite station, it means that Mr. Lewis' equipment, which has been supplemented with many of his own radio devices, is superior to other stations in this district.

Mr. Lewis now has his station so equipped that he can carry on voice communication with Los Angeles stations and can hold code communications

tion with places as far east as Phoenix, Arizona. Through his broadcasting set he can be copied in six out of the nine radio districts in the United States.

Through a communication by mail the Yosemite station has notified Mr. Lewis that his broadcast had been copied three times during the same evening last week.

BLAZE NEAR ROMAN NOSE

PLANE WRECKED IN FORCED LANDING

Two Men Uninjured When Ship Lights Near Eureka In Flight From Eugene

From an altitude of 6000 feet over Triangle lake, Lieutenant Maughn, of the 21st aero squadron, and Carl Oglesby, supervising warden of the Western Lane Fire Patrol association, yesterday counted 31 forest fires. Only four out of this number were mapped as new blazes, and Lieutenant Maughn, who piloted the only ship sent out yesterday on patrol duty, has estimated that one of these blazes, located seven miles east of Roman Nose mountain, covers over 400 acres of land, while the blaze on the hill north of Beecher, when sighted, was running over 160 acres.

Concerning the ship which fell Friday afternoon near Eureka, Cal., late yesterday evening officers of the patrol stationed here said that it was understood that the plane was wrecked, but as both men, Sergeant Fred Kelly, pilot, and a passenger, Sergeant Gravin, were uninjured, the local station will not investigate further. The crashy field officers will care for the salvaging of the wrecked plane.

The DeHavilland which was wrecked by the forced landing, was being sent to San Francisco for engine repairs. It has not been learned why the ship was forced to land, but it was probably due to engine trouble. Sergeant Kelly remained with the plane and Sergeant Gravin went on to San Francisco by train.

Around Roseburg the pall of smoke from the numerous forest fires of the state is practically impenetrable, report the aviators. Lookouts stationed in various parts of Douglas are handicapped due to the fact that they cannot see farther than three miles. The range of visibility from the air is likewise decreased, but the planes travel low over the hills at a rapid pace and observers are enabled to peer through the haze over a large area. Most of the smoke which is now banked up in the Roseburg country is coming from the Triangle lake blaze, according to the aviators. A stiff ocean breeze was blowing inland yesterday and the coast districts were cleared of smoke.

After returning from the flight yesterday, Mr. Oglesby reported that the fire at Triangle lake was backing down the hill against the wind. There is a fire on Emerald creek on an old burn, and a small fire was spotted in the Alsea country.

UNIVERSITY ART SCHOOL REQUESTS CO-OPERATION

Public Meeting Planned for This Week

ASSISTANCE IS DESIRED

Efforts Being Made to Replace Collections Lost in Recent Fire at Institution

In order to obtain the co-operation of artists and collectors in the loaning of examples of work in normal and industrial arts in the plans that are being made to replace the collection lost in the recent University of Oregon fire, a public meeting will be held at the Woman's building on the campus this week under the direction of a committee appointed to handle the details of the arrangements for the reopening of the art school of the institution that was completely destroyed by fire.

The university is now planning the erection of a small fireproof museum in which the articles will be placed, according to members of the committee, thus assuring those who are able to assist by loaning their works of art that their collections will be amply protected. The date for the reception to be held to which all art lovers are invited has not yet been definitely selected, but the committee has sent out invitations explaining the great need of the assistance of the public in order that the art school work of the university may not be impaired during the coming year.

Committee Is Appointed
The committee, whose work shall be to foster by every possible means the gathering of materials essential to the work of the normal and industrial arts department of the university this fall, has passed the following resolutions:

Whereas, in the \$60,000 fire at the University of Oregon much valuable reference material, which was the personal property of the professors in the manual and industrial arts department, was lost, and

Whereas, this collection was many years in being gathered, and as it will be necessary to have objects of fine arts and home decoration, period furniture, metal ware, textiles, weaving, pottery, china, prints, embroideries and anything of historical value in home decorations, to properly carry on the normal and industrial arts department of the University of Oregon;

Be it therefore resolved by this committee, That donations, either as gifts or loans, be asked for of lovers of art and education and of the friends of the university. Such a collection to be housed in a fireproof museum.
