## THE PEERAGE SCANDAL

Americans can find considerable amusement in the British peerage scandal. The English public is wildly excited over the discovery that titles have been bought and paid for. It is said that knightships have been knocked down for \$50,000 to \$60,000, while baronetcies have been quoted at \$175,000 to \$200,000. And where no money has changed hands, there have been other considerations in many cases. The whole expose is helping to clear up the mystery of why certain men received their titles.

The bribery, if such it is, does not seem often to have been individual—nothing so raw as that. Funds paid over have usually gone to swell the war chest of the dominant party. And that fact serves to bring out the basic truth about the British nobility—or almost any other modern nobility, for that matter. It is primarily political. Titles go sometimes for distinguished public service, but far oftener for influence for financial support.

Lloyd-George has broken all records in this line. During his premiership, five and a half years he has created or promoted 108 peers, about 20 a year. The king is supposed to confer titles, but he confers them as the premier directs.

Yet there are thousands of Americans who will go right on regarding as half-divine, and viewing with awe-struck reverence, any brewer or soap-maker or politician or banker or editor who happened at some time or other to have had enough money or "pull" to break into the pseudo-sacred ranks.

## VOISTEADING GERMANY

Now, of all things, comes a campaign for a "dry Germany," and "Pussyfoot" Johnson and the American anti-saloon league have nothing to do with it. The movement is purely German. There is a "committee for the introduction of prohibition in Germany" headed by a well-known statesman and including numerous academic, political and labor leaders, as well as professional men and women, from all sections of the country.

More startling still, this redoubtable organization is in favor of adopting the Volstead act, and its first undertaking will be to enlighten the German public as to the merits and method of that law.

The reformers seem convinced that prohibition, with all its defects of administration, have been good for America, and they believe it would be just as good for Germany. If they succeed, and the land of beer and wine yields to the drastic Volstead process, what hope will there be left for the "liberals" now making so vigorous a protest in the United States?

## FISHING FOR COAL

One of the interesting revelations connected with the coal strike is the vast volume of "river coal" available in streams flowing from the coal regions in Pennsylvania. This fuel has nothing to do with the so-called "white coal" which hydro-electric interests have been developing in recent years. It is plain, black bituminous, spilled and washed into the rivers in the course of production and carried by the water sometimes as far as 200 miles.

It is said to exist now on some river bottoms in the form of a stratum several feet deep. The amount accessible by the process of dredging is estimable at many million tons. The water-washed fuel is considered better for many purposes than that coming fresh from the mines.

The salvaging of this coal naturally has been stimulated by the scarcity resulting from the strike. It is being fished for on a scale never known before. And it affords a notable commentary on the wasteful methods which in normal times attend the coal industry.

## CHEATING CHEATERS

If organizations aiming to promote a knowledge of sound investment and aid the investor to secure facts mean anything the life of the swindler and crooked stock promoter will grow less happy day by day.

One of the most recent of these organizations is the Better Business Bureau of New York City. While its activities will be concerned mostly with local matters, it will co-operate with similar bureaus in 36 other cities throughout the country, and keep in close communication with the National Vigilance Committee of the Advertising Clubs of the World.

These are only a few of the interests concerned with warning the public against cheating promotion schemes and furthering the cause of legitimate investment, but there can hardly be too much activity of this sort.

The interest in investment has spread with amazing rapidity among small as well as large investors. The organization which ruthlessly pursues the swindler, and opens to the investor avenues to sound investment performs a public service.

Pretence to French Throne Disappears in New York After Creating Stir There

BOSTON, Aug. 7. — Prince Louis Henri de Bourbon, as West 94th street knew him for a few scintillating days, now sought in Boston the refuge of a vicarage, achieved the pinnacle of his fame in New York last week when, attired in all the splendor of his Russian uniform, he got himself arrested on a charge of disorderly conduct. He was released later.

## LIQUOR PARTY IS RAIDED

ARRAIGNED IN COURT

Unoccupied House on Moss Street Is Rendezvous for Unlawful Gatherings but Police Take Hand

On charges of intoxication, disorderly conduct and using rude and indecent language, three women and five men were arraigned in police court yesterday following their arrest early in the morning in an unoccupied house at Moss street where they spent the evening and which resulted in complaints of neighbors. Constable John Marsh was notified and called up Captain Jenkins and Officer Miley who took the party to the city jail in various stages of intoxication and undress.

Opal Larsen Brown, 18, was given a jail sentence of 20 days and Claudine Prout, 24, drew ten days and Annie Belle Freed, 25, also was sentenced to ten days. G. A. Clark and C. A. Wellborn were fined \$50 each or 25 days in jail. A. J. Dowd and L. W. Weaver, privates in the aerial squadron, were turned over to Captain Lowell Smith, their commander, and they will be tried by military court on the charges. Another youth with the party was released with the loss of his motor cycle license for a period of sixty days, as according to the reports of the police, he was drawn into the affair on a misunderstanding.

Several empty bottles and jars that had evidently contained moonshine were found in the house and very little liquor was obtained as evidence and it is probable that this charge will be dropped. Wellborn last night paid his fine and was released.

## MOTORCYCLIST IS HURT

RICHARDS AND MOTHER COLLIDE WITH AUTOMOBILE

Arthur P. Richards, a gunsmith who lives at 1910 Sixth avenue west, was seriously injured late yesterday evening when the motorcycle with a side car which he was riding crashed into an automobile on Gunt hill, about five miles southwest from Eugene. Mr. Richards had with him in the side car his mother, who was scratched considerably, but according to physicians, received no serious injury. One of Mr. Richards' legs was broken and he suffered other injuries. He was taken to the Eugene hospital.

Another injured man taken to the Eugene hospital yesterday evening was Carl Martin, who was badly bruised and lacerated when a limb of a tree fell on him when working in the woods near Wendling yesterday afternoon. It is understood that his injuries are not considered serious.

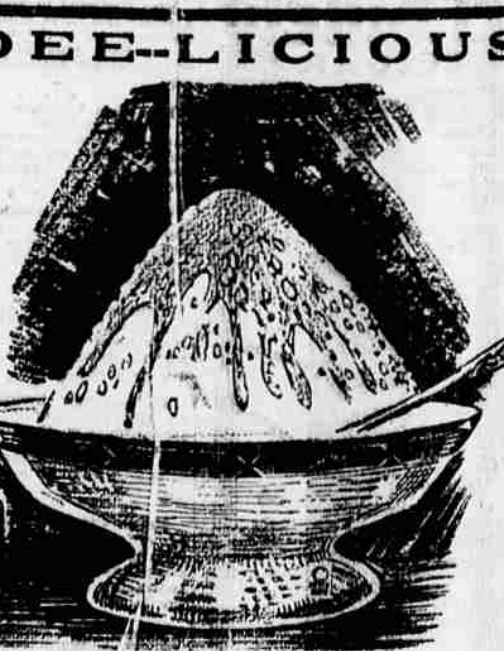

## NEW PEACE PLAN NOT FAVORED BY SHOPMEN

(Continued from Page One)

shopmen and the employees, we urgently recommend to you, as chairman of the railroad organization, wire each executive to attend the conference in Washington, Friday, August 11.

The President's communications to each party of which, strike there made public this afternoon after a visit to the white house of three union leaders, who waited over after meeting him Saturday. An administration spokesman expressed the President's belief that paralysis of transportation, especially in coal regions, was threatening the industrial and agricultural fabric of the country. No formal conferences with rail executives had preceded the formulation of the new basis for settlement of the strike, it was said, and it was entirely the government's plan built up from the position which the President had maintained between the contending parties.

Moved by the continued representation concerning the state of railroad equipment, the senate today passed a resolution calling upon the interstate commerce commission to report the exact condition in which it finds locomotives and cars. The commission, through its safety bureau, maintains an inspection service to determine whether legal standards are met by operating lines.

Southern railway officials, who have sought a settlement separately from other roads with striking shopcrafts in its employ, also met a union committee today for the road and agreement was asked for on the terms of President Harding's proposal of July 31 and the return of full seniority status to all strikers, but adjournment until tomorrow was asked by union spokesmen because of the national settlement discussion pending.

## KEYMEN VOTING ON STRIKE

TELEGRAPHERS ON BIG FOUR TAKING BALLOT

CINCINNATI, O., Aug. 7.—Telegraphers numbering approximately 1,100 on the Big Four railroad are taking a strike vote following the breakdown in negotiations over the interpretation of working rules. It was announced tonight by the company in a statement to the Associated Press.
