HOP PICKING PRICES SET
PICKERS TO GET \$1.25 PER 100, WITH SEASON BONUS

Prices to pick this year for picking hops were set at a meeting of growers of the upper valley Wednesday evening. For late hops, the standard wage is to be \$1.25 per 100 pounds, with an additional bonus of 25 cents to pickers that stay clear through the season. Early hops are to be paid for at the rate of \$1.25 per hundred, with no bonus.

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LANE COWS MAKE RECORD

JERSEY HEIRED WILL BE DISPLAYED AT FAIR

Average Production of 657 Pounds of Butter Fat in Year Is Registered By Ten Animals

As a feature of the livestock display of the annual Lane county fair this year, a herd of ten Jersey cows holding the world's record for production of butter fat in one year, will be on exhibition by Owen A. Thompson, who will bring the herd here from his ranch at Triangle lake. The Thompson herd of ten animals has a recorded production of an average of 657 pounds of butter fat for each animal during the past year, and this showing, according to Ira P. Whitney, county agricultural agent, has never been exceeded, according to all available data on the subject of Jersey production.

The records for the year have just been completed by the owner of the herd and the display at the fair here will be the first time that the animals have been officially entered as a show exhibit, states Mr. Whitney. Some of the animals in the herd of ten have produced as high as 800 pounds of fat during the period of the check, according to the figures reported.

Officials of the county fair state that much interest has been aroused among breeders of Jersey cattle concerning the public display of the Thompson herd and that stockmen from many points in the Northwest are expected to attend the annual show here to view the champion herd.
