WATER INTAKE IS MOVED

COTTAGE GROVE TO GET SUPPLY FROM LAYING CREEK

(Register Lane County Special)
COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., Aug. 11.—The city water intake now located on Prayther creek, has been relocated at Laying creek, an extension of 3000 feet from the present intake because the Prayther creek supply is insufficient in hot weather and because logging operations threaten the purity of the water.

It is hoped that the new base of the city water supply will be ready for use by the end of 30 days. J. I. House, dam builder, has already started to work building the dam and preparing for the laying of the extension to the pipe line.
