McCormick gave a luncheon at the city hall, at which Mr. and Mrs. Dudley Field Malone, wife of the Mr. Malone was counsel for Mrs. McCormick in the proceedings which recently resulted in the divorce between her and Mr. Alexander.

McCormick and his bride after the luncheon left for an automobile tour. Their destination was not announced. Mr. and Mrs. Malone were the only witnesses of the wedding.

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 11.—"Mrs. Edith Rockefeller McCormick will have no comment to make on Mr. McCormick's marriage."

That telephone message, delivered by Mrs. McCormick's secretary, was the only statement forthcoming this morning when the Associated Press informed the former wife of the International Harvester head of the latter's marriage in Paris to Mrs. Ganna Walska, the opera singer.

Since Mrs. McCormick, daughter of John D. Rockefeller, has declined to comment since her divorce last winter on either her former husband's activities or the announced engagement of her 17-year-old daughter, Mathilde, to Max Oser, elderly Swiss riding academy proprietor.

Mrs. Walska created a furor when she came to Chicago two years ago to appear as one of the stars of the Chicago Opera company. Mr. McCormick, who with Mrs. Edith McCormick, were the principal guarantors of the company, had employed her while visiting Paris.

Divorced last May. On the day before her announced debut with the Chicago company, Mrs. Walska packed her bags and left for New York. Gossips buzzed over the incident and it was generally reported that Conductor Marinuzzi had publicly criticized her ability as a singer before the entire cast at a dress rehearsal.

Mrs. Walska was the wife of Alexander Smith Cochran, wealthy manufacturer. Incompatibility divided them and a divorce decree was issued by a French court on May 31 last to become finally effective in sixty days.

Mrs. McCormick obtained a divorce last December after a married life of twenty-six years. The decree was obtained on the ground of desertion.

Earlier Details. Reports were frequent during the spring and early summer that Mr. McCormick intended to wed Mrs. Walska when she had obtained her

final decree and these persisted despite denials which were generally regarded as what international parlance terms "diplomatic."

Mr. McCormick sailed for Europe in July and reports from Paris were that he was seen frequently in Mrs. Walska's company. Friends of the couple generally believed that their marriage would not be long delayed.

The sailing for Europe of the groom in today's Paris wedding followed shortly his recovery in Chicago from an operation. He was accompanied on his voyage by his daughter, Mathilde, whose romantic attachment to Max Oser has rivaled the maternal romance in public attention.

The outcome of Mathilde's romance is not yet definitely apparent, but Mr. McCormick has declared he would not interfere in his daughter's affairs and Miss McCormick only yesterday went with her governess from Paris to a resort in the Lacore, where her fiancé also is stopping.

The present is Mrs. Walska's third marriage. Her first husband was Baron Aracide O'Kerning, a Russian army officer, who was killed early in the war.

COOLIDGE TO GET TROUT

MCKENZIE WATERS WHIPPED FOR PRIZE REDSIDES

Stream in Sylva Setting Furnishes Meal for Vice-President of United States

This evening, when the vice-president of the United States seats himself with his party for dinner in his private car, he will probably remember that the trout placed before him were just about the last through a representative of the Eugene chamber of commerce, but unless he is a sportsman and has heard from him who traveled about the McKenzie river of Oregon, he will probably not know about the setting in which his meal was caught, or about the persons who whipped the swift waters of the upper McKenzie to catch the 24 redsides and Dolly Vardens presented to him.

The man who superintended the catching of the trout for Mr. Coolidge was H. W. Devolin—a man who travels westward over 3000 miles from New York to fish in the McKenzie and enjoy the solitude of the valley which has carved its way through the basaltic mountains. With the assistance of M. E. Sayre, of Los Angeles, another convert to the paradise of the McKenzie, Mr. Devolin filled his basket in one short day.

Perhaps Mr. Coolidge this evening would enjoy his trout much better if he knew their native habitat was a river which had its source in the melting glaciers of the snow-capped Three Sisters and Clear Lake, near the summit of the Cascades of Oregon. Also, he would probably be interested to know that the water of the McKenzie river in the summer has an average temperature of 47 degrees and that it was in this water—a stream which sparkles with iridescent beauty when the sun shines through the thick foliage—that his basketful of trout was caught. Perhaps the vice-president would again be interested to know that the playground of his trout had not been restricted, but stretched for some 80 miles through valleys covered with forests.

The trout, which were brought to this city from McKenzie Bridge on ice and are now in a cold storage plant here, range from 14 to 15 inches. They will be placed aboard Mr. Coolidge's private train when the train halts here for 15 minutes this afternoon. L. E. Bean, member of the state game commission, will make the formal presentation.

TRACE TURNS TO DRIZZLE

OREGON MIST PLACES EUGENE IN CUSTOMARY ENVIRONMENT

Weather Man Predicts That Clouds Are Now Lining Up for a Real Aquous Attack Soon

MORE PLANES ARE COMING

FOUR WILL LEAVE SAN DIEGO FOR EUGENE MONDAY

Sent From Rockwell Field to Augment Squadron Already on Duty in Oregon

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Aug. 11.—Four more De Havilland forestry patrol airplanes will be flown to Eugene, Oregon, starting from Rockwell Field Monday morning, according to announcement made today by Lieutenant John M. McCallough, post adjutant.

Four flyers from the 21st aero squadron, based at Grissley field, San Francisco, will arrive here tomorrow to pilot the planes to the Oregon forestry patrol base.

Forest fires have proven so disastrous this summer in Oregon and Washington that the authorities of these states have implored the federal government for aid. A total of ten airplanes, all manned by army aviators, under the command of Captain Lowell H. Smith, are now engaged in scouting for fires over the forests of Oregon.

GERMAN AIRSHIP BUILDERS DECLINE BRITISH OFFERS

PROPOSAL FOR SERVICE TO AUSTRALIA TURNED DOWN

Herr Schutte Tells of Plans to Found German-American Company to Conduct Transatlantic Line

(Correspondence of the Associated Press) BERLIN, July 24.—English interests have failed recently in efforts to entice the German airship builders to establish and maintain an aerial service between England, Egypt, India and Australia, under British auspices, according to Director Johann Schutte of the Schutte-Lanz works. Herr Schutte has recently returned from the United States after concluding negotiations for a German-German-American company to conduct a European-American air line.

The director intimated that the English project was launched in an attempt to divert the close connections which now have been established between American and German undertakings and to substitute for them a British leadership in airship construction "which does not exist," he said.

According to Herr Schutte, British interests made proposals to three German companies looking to cooperative construction, but in each case the offer was declined.

Herr Schutte divined in the project an effort to reap the advantages of Germany's experience in airship construction, with the object of ultimately taking over the German leadership in this department. He declared its frustration signified the impracticability of the entire plan. Asserting the English builders have repeatedly failed to produce satisfactory results, he declared the English now have at their disposal only two serviceable Zeppelins built for use in the war, and that the cell bodies of these are no longer trustworthy. These, he said, would not suffice even for a service between England and Egypt.

Herr Schutte said that Americans have had their eyes opened by the fate of the R-38, and that they will now force a way for world advantages to accrue from the German industry which, despite the obstacles of the Versailles treaty, has built 80 first-class Zeppelins and 29 Schutte-Lanz ships.
