DAILY MARKET REPORT

(OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE)

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 16.—Strenuous efforts are being made to force arbitrary high prices on eggs here. The plan appears to be the idea of some of those who have liberal stocks in storage, therefore would be the chief ones to profit as a result of any advance in the market. This stock has not been held in storage long enough so that it could not be sold under the law as fresh offerings, although in the trade it is commonly known as short-held cold storage.

While in a limited way as high as 23c a dozen is being paid for current receipts at the moment, practically all of the business is at 22c. Selling prices are unchanged generally.

BUTTER TRADE POSITION BETTER

Better position is shown in the local butter trade since the recent price cut and the later advance in California. No change was shown in the price of either print or cubes for Wednesday.

POULTRY DEMAND MUCH BETTER

Much better demand is showing for poultry in the front street trade with light weight hens at 13 1/4c a pound generally, while heavy stock is moving at 22c. Geese and ducks still not wanted.

ONION MARKET STILL GAINING

Market for onions continues to gain strength and a further advance in the price is shown here. Most of the sales to retailers were around \$1.50 for Walla Walla offerings and some were taking much higher prices because of the wet weather in the valley which makes shipping almost impossible.

PEACH PRICE IS SAGGING HERE

Because of the present heavy surplus of supplies of Yakima Carmen peaches, prices are down to 50¢ per bushel for such offerings, although as high as \$1.25 is obtainable in a very limited way for select sizes of California varieties. Eugene prices early sales in selling around 90¢ per bushel for large sizes, while local stuff is bringing around 50¢ per bushel.

CANTALOUPE PRICES ARE DOWN

With additional surplus supplies of Yakima Burrol Gem and Honey Ford cantaloupes the price here is easier, with some sales as low as \$2.50 for either variety. Dallas stock around a similar price.
