

PUFFING MOGULS MOVE TRAFFIC ON S. P. LINES

Road Announces Itself Ready
to Handle All Freight

CALIFORNIA FRUIT ON WAY

Movement Through Roseville in Short
Time Amounts to Approximately
500 Cars

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Aug. 16.—Following an unprecedented movement of fruit and non-perishable freight, both fruit and non-perishable, through Roseville yesterday and today, the Southern Pacific railroad today announced itself ready to handle all traffic. Packing sheds and all other facilities in superior California, are pouring out shipments of fruit regarded as almost a total loss a few days ago.

An almost solid procession of puffing moguls having long trains of delayed freight passed through Roseville yesterday and all night. Assistant Division Superintendent W. M. Sullivan announced the movement through Roseville from 7 o'clock yesterday morning until two o'clock this morning amounted to approximately 400 cars. Fourteen trains of fruit and delayed freight went east; three from Roseville and from Sacramento two trains of 74 cars each were dispatched north during the same period.

Heavy Movement Unprecedented
The freight moving east together with light engines to "boost" the long strings over the Sierras, returning after a trip to the summit, marked one

of the heaviest movements of traffic over this division ever attempted. Passenger trains also added to the general movement, but were able to reach destinations nearly on time. That there is a possibility of a shortage of fruit cars in the near future was a current rumor in shipping circles today. General Manager Dyer of the Southern Pacific stated there were sufficient cars on the Pacific coast to handle the fruit crop for some time to come, but the return of empty fruit cars from the East would determine future movements.

Officials at the Pacific Fruit Express company also said the return of refrigerator cars from the East was the prime factor in handling the fruit crop of California.

FRENCH CABINET BACKS ATTITUDE OF POINCARÉ

PREMIER STAND AT RECENT
CONFERENCE APPROVED

On Matter of Moratorium for Germany
It was Decided to Await Decision
of Commission

(By the Associated Press)
PARIS, Aug. 16.—Sitting under the presidency of President Millerand, the French cabinet in its session here today gave approval unanimously to the attitude of Premier Poincaré at the recent conference of allied premiers in London and also discussed the question of a moratorium for Germany.

On the matter of a moratorium it was decided to await the forthcoming decision of the reparations commission, but plans were perfected regarding the measures to be adopted should the decision of the commission fail to agree with the French viewpoint.

Another decision arrived at was that for the time being the government need not call an extraordinary session of parliament so that the deputies and senators might be acquainted with the exact situation and the program of the government. Freedom of action was reserved, however, to consult with parliament in the event that plans adopted should require legislative endorsement.

M. Poincaré went to London with the specific mandate to execute a plan which had been signed by all members of the cabinet without the slightest deviation. It is known that when Poincaré made some concessions to David Lloyd-George's counter proposal last Friday a telegram was dispatched to him from Rambouillet requesting the strict carrying out of the specific plan agreed upon.

Penalty for Default
What retaliatory measures will be taken by France should Germany be declared in "willful default" of her reparations obligations is being kept a close secret. It appears that the French ministers are of the opinion that a moratorium will be refused Germany, but that they have little hope that the reparations commission will declare Germany in willful default. The Belgian vote on the reparations commission is regarded as certain to be against a moratorium or else the Belgian representative will abstain from voting on the proposal which would be equivalent to a negative vote. But a similar abstention by the Belgian member on the French proposal to declare Germany in willful default would place France in the minority on that question.

tional industrial situation will suggest legislation giving the federal fuel emergency organization powers to control the distribution and price of coal to safeguard the country against hardships this winter, according to officials who talked today with the chief executive.

The president was reported to be considering seriously recommendations for definite legislation to provide legal powers to supplant the voluntary system of coal control now in operation and was understood to have before him a draft of a tentative plan of fuel administration prepared by Secretary Hoover. Creation of a federal coal commission also would be recommended, it was reported, which would be designed to make a thorough investigation of the national coal industry and suggest legislation for the permanent solution of labor problems.

Would Continue Fuel Control
Pending the enactment of empowering legislation the central coal distribution committee, high officials indicated, would continue fuel control under voluntary price agreements. Existing fair price agreements made with Mr. Hoover by producing operators were to be in effect during the strike, but a meeting of the federal coal commission with the commerce secretary and fuel distributors today to consider the effect of partial settlement of the mine controversy upon price arrangements, decided that the agreements would hold until production was more largely resumed.

Investigation of charges of profiteering in coal, however, was asked of Secretary Hoover by Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, in a letter calling for suggestions as to immediate measures to prevent charging of excessive prices.

TROTTER DENIES HE ELOPED
MISS CAMPBELL ADMITS LOVE
FOR BRIBING PASTOR

MEALESTER, Okla., Aug. 16.—Dedicated that he had eloped with Miss Audrey Campbell, a pretty nurse, was made today by the Rev. J. C. Trotter, who is held in jail here on a charge of embezzlement of funds of the Brooks Institute of Hartsboro, of which he was financial secretary.

The minister, pastor of the Methodist church, South, of Hallsville, admitted to an interviewer that there was a love affair between himself and Miss Campbell, but denied any illegal relations. Mr. Trotter also declared that when the books are audited he and Miss Campbell, former head nurse at the Brooks Institute, will be vindicated of embezzlement charges.

The minister declared he was in Oklahoma City the night it was reported he had eloped to Eufaula, Okla., with the nurse. Both were arrested at Eufaula Monday.

Mr. Trotter refused to discuss his family affairs except to say that his wife was a "gentle woman and a good mother." Mrs. Trotter and her three children are visiting in Chattanooga, Tenn. Miss Campbell avowed her love for Trotter, and admitted improper relations with the minister.

ROAD BIDS TO BE OPENED

COMMISSION TO MEET IN PORT-
LAND AUGUST 29

Work on All Projects Expected to Be
Started This Year. Bridges
to Be Built

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 16.—Bids for the construction of approximately 65 miles of highway and five bridges will be considered at a meeting of the state highway commission to be held in Portland on August 29. The estimated cost of the projects was placed at approximately \$500,000 by the highway department.

Work on all of the projects will be started this year, it was said, but because of the delay in getting actual work under way some of them will not be completed until next season.

The highway work contemplated in connection with the call for bids affects eight counties. New bridges will be constructed in five counties.

The projects for which proposals will be considered at the August session of the commission follow:

Crook county—Ochoco highway, Prineville-Jones mill section, 17.3 miles rock surfacing.

Harney county—Central Oregon highway, Burns section, 4.2 miles grading and graveling.

Hood River county—ML Hood loop highway, Hood River-forest boundary section, unit 1, 9.17 miles broken stone surfacing; unit 2, 7.87 miles broken stone surfacing; unit 3, 6.08 miles broken stone surfacing.

Lake county—Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway, Drews valley section, 8.8 miles grading and surfacing.

Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway, Valley Falls-Chewaucan Narrows section, 12.3 miles gravel surfacing.

Polk county—Salem-Dallas highway, West Salem-Brunks' Corner section, 5.5 miles ditching and reconstruction of shoulders.

Umatilla county—Cold Springs highway, Holdman-Harps ranch section, 3 miles grading and surfacing.

Oregon-Washington highway, Vinson section, 4 miles rock surfacing.

Washington and Yamhill counties—Newberg-Multnomah county line section, 3.64 miles concrete paving.

Baker county—Old Oregon trail, one re-inforced concrete span over Powder river near Baker.

Gilliam county—Oregon-Washington highway two reinforced concrete bridges over Willow creek near Heppner Junction.

Lincoln county—Newport-Corvallis highway, one steel span with timber approach over the Yaquina river at Eddyville.

Linn county—Pacific highway, one wooden truss span over Calapooia river.

Yamhill county—McMinnville-Tillamook highway, one 80-foot steel span over Willamina river at Willamina.

HERBERT WILSON ON TRIAL

EX-PASTOR ACCUSED OF MUR-
DER OF HERBERT COX

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 16.—Trial of Herbert Wilson, accused of the murder here on April 3 of Herbert Cox, began at 2 o'clock today in Justice Perry Wood's department of the superior court. The case was set for morning, but was delayed while Judge Wood examined a panel of

The state charges that Wilson shot Cox down when the deputies appeared, the theory being that Wilson believed Cox had disclosed the escape plans.
