DAILY MARKET REPORT

(ORIGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE)
PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 17.—Market for eggs is very active here, but there is no change noted in general quotations. There is more or less talk about 25c being paid for henner whites, but the fact remains that those who are talking the loudest of paying extreme values are refusing to purchase at the price named. In other words, the market here today is somewhat manipulated. There is not the slightest doubt that the situation justifies at least the price named, but it is likewise a fact that the price was hurried upward with the intention of unloading storage eggs.

BUTTER TRADE REMAINS SAME
Butter, however, is considered steady here with no change in prices noted for either cubes or prints. Retailers report a better demand since the latest price cut.

CHICKEN MOVEMENT LIBERAL
Very liberal movement of chickens is showing in the front street trade, but practically no further changes in price are noted. Demand is equal to supply in all lines, ducks and geese along being slow.

TOMATO PRICES SAGGING HERE
With enormous supplies available, sales for local tomatoes on the Farmers' market were around 20¢ a box for the day, while on front street business was shown from 20¢ to 25¢ generally. Only a sprinkling above this.

CANTALOUPE PRICES LOWERED
Burrell Gem cantaloupes sold as low as \$2.00 a dozen, per crate, for Yakima. Bales offerings during the day, with \$2.00 a dozen, the extreme price asked for the better packs of California stock.

ONION MARKET LIFTED AGAIN
Further advance of a quarter is shown in the price of Walla Walla onions, here, with \$1.75 today the general sale value to retailers. Walla Walla advises that the season there is about over.

MEXICANS SEEK REPRISALS
SHERIFF AND DEPUTIES PATROL ORO BLANCO REGION

NOGALIES, Ariz., Aug. 17.—Sheriff Harry Saxon and several deputies were patrolling the Oro Blanco country in Santa Cruz county today following rumors of impending trouble at Ruby. Armed Mexican riders have been crossing the border, Ruby residents reported and inquiring as to the whereabouts of persons who testified against Manuel Martinez, who is scheduled to be executed tomorrow for participation in a bandit raid in Ruby a year ago, in which Postmaster and Mrs. J. Frank Pearson were slain.

Sheriff Saxon led a detail of his deputies to the scene after apprehension was voiced by some of those who were instrumental in obtaining the conviction of Martinez that countrymen of the slayer apparently are bent on vengeance.
