NEW SHEDS TO BE BUILT

EXCELSIOR PLANT TO PROTECT
WOOD SUPPLY

Shipments Are in Excess of Present
Capacity of Mill, Owner States and
Proper Storage Is Necessary

New sheds which will require approximately 40,000 feet of lumber to build are being constructed at the plant of the Eugene excelsior works in order to protect the supply of balsam wood that has been shipped into the local mill and will not be used for some time owing to the operation of the plant on half time schedule, according to Mayor C. O. Peterson, proprietor of the mill. In the past the mill has kept pace with the shipment of the raw material but on the present working basis the incoming supply is in excess of the present half time working capacity and it has been found necessary to provide protection for the wood with the coming of the rainy season.

GRAY'S EMPLOYEES DINE

GROUP GATHERS IN KREMMEL'S
PLANT LAST NIGHT

Process of Bread Baking Described
By Owner of Concern Which
Supplies O. A. C. Students

Employees of the Gray's Cash and Carry store of stores from Junction City, Springfield and Eugene, gathered on the main floor of the Kremmel Brothers bakery on Seventh avenue east last night to enjoy a chicken dinner and the additional chance to listen to addresses by A. Ralph Gray, owner of the stores, and by Henry Kremmel, of the Kremmel Bakery, maker of the Sally Ann bread and other products.

Several times each year Mr. Gray gets his force together for a dinner and during such times gives them a brief talk concerning the business. Mr. Kremmel last night told the group of 30 about the making of bread, the operation of machinery and about the plant in general. The table was set on the main floor of the plant near the flour mixer, where the men could follow the varied processes of bread making as described by Mr. Kremmel.

The Kremmel Brothers bakery will shortly install a new modern bread mixer, it was announced last night. This bakery, one of the most complete in the state, recently obtained the contract to furnish all fraternity and society houses at the Oregon Agricultural college with bread during the coming school year. Over 1200 students in 50 houses on the campus at Corvallis will be served by the local bakery. The output of the Sally Ann bakery approximates 1000 loaves each day. This bakery had the contract of making the bread for the O. A. C. students last year also, and that year again won the contract against a field of competitors which included the entire Willamette valley.

The Kremmel Brothers bakery now has a fleet of four White trucks for delivery wagons. Three of these serve out-of-town customers, going north, south and east, and the other is used here in Eugene.

LUMBER BUSINESS BETTER

PRODUCTION FOR WEEK ABOVE
NORMAL IS REPORT

One hundred and twenty-three mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending August 12, manufactured 86,814,066 feet of lumber; sold 75,462,783 feet; and shipped 71,726,686 feet. Production for reporting mills was 5 per cent above normal. New business 15 per cent below production. Shipments were 8 per cent below new business.

Thirty per cent of all new business taken during the week was for future water delivery. This amounted to 22,332,783 feet, of which 16,327,779 feet was for domestic cargo delivery, and 6,005,004 feet for overseas shipment. New business for delivery by rail amounted to 1,771 cars.

Twenty-eight per cent of the week's lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 20,006,633 feet of which 15,297,312 feet moved coastwise and inter-coastal; and 4,709,321 feet export. Half shipments amounted to 1,724 cars.

Unfilled domestic orders total 91,124,703 feet. Unfilled export orders 63,662,420 feet. Unfilled rail trade orders, 6,631 cars.

In thirty-two weeks production has been 2,574,256,014 feet; new business 2,575,944,256 feet; shipments 2,545,039,126 feet.

CAR TRACKS TO BE MOVED

WORK ON SOUTH WILLAMETTE
LINE TO START

Work on the removal of the tracks of the street railway line on South Willamette street to the side of the present road will start next week, according to the announcement yesterday following an inspection of the route by members of the county court and rail officials. The track and poles

will be erected a distance of 15 feet from the present line and the road will then be macadamized by the county.

The distance to be changed amounts to 2200 feet and arrangements will be made during the construction work so that there will be no interruption of the College Crest service, according to railway officials. A stub line will probably be maintained if it is found necessary to move some sections of the present line in place of building a new track.

SCHOOL PETITION IS FILED

RESIDENTS OF DISTRICT 181 DE-
SIDE CHANGE

County Boundary Board (Composed of County Court and Superintendent) Will Pass on Application

Bearing 62 names of residents of school district 181 which adjoins Eugene in the College Crest district, a petition was filed yesterday with E. J. Moore, county superintendent of schools, requesting the boundary board to recast the lines of division and form a separate school territory for that section of the present district that is adjacent to the Eugene city limits. The matter will come up for decision when the boundary board composed of members of the county court and the county school superintendent meets September 11.

The filing of the official petition for a complete separation of the north and south sections of the district is the final result of a long discussion concerning the location of the school building that serves that territory and it is expected that a determined opposition to the separation plan will be launched by the residents of the south section of district 181, which is one of the smallest in the county.

It is the contention of the residents of the northern part of the district that the present school location is inconvenient for the children and that it is too far from the center of great population. If another district is formed for the north section of the territory involved it is possible that a further recasting of county school lines in that section of the county may be made in order to increase the extent of the remaining south section that under the division plan would have a small population and a limited revenue to carry on the school work.

Views Differ on Meridians The meridian of Greenwich is generally accepted as the starting line from which to reckon longitude and time all over the earth. But objections are from time to time raised against the universal adoption of the Greenwich meridian for such purposes. Recently Italian savants have expressed these objections by pointing out that on the meridian of Greenwich clouds and bad weather are frequent, interfering with astronomical observations. They suggest that the civilized world should agree to adopt the meridian of Jerusalem as a common reference line, because there the skies are clearer.
