HIGHWAY TRAFFIC HEAVY

COUNT IS MADE BY GARROW OF TRAVEL THROUGH CRESWELL

CRESWELL, Ore., Aug. 18.—About once a month Engineer J. G. Garrow has made a record for one day of the traffic on the highway between the hours of 6:00 a. m. and 10:00 p. m., and such a record was made Thursday, August 17. The result was as follows: Oregon passenger cars, 582; other states' passenger cars, 242; light duty trucks, 55; heavy duty trucks, 35; heavy trailers, 6; motorcycles, 6; horse drawn vehicles, 23, a total of 1007. These traffic accounts are ordered by the state highway department.

here last Wednesday to visit her father and brother for a short time.

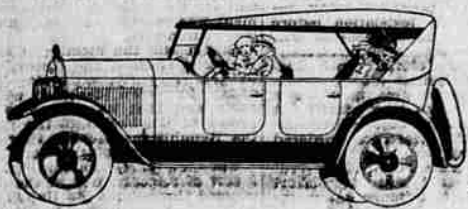
A "winner roast" was given by Mrs. Henry Bergman at the cave below town Tuesday evening and attended by most of the younger married people. A merry time is reported.
