

D. E. LINE CARRIES LUMBER

BOOTH-KELLY PLANT SHIPS OVER ELECTRIC ROAD

Shortage of Cars to Be Offset By Utilizing All Available Facilities, According to A. C. Dixon

For the first time in the past two years lumber from the Booth-Kelly plant is being shipped out over the Oregon Electric railroad from here, according to A. C. Dixon, manager of the concern, who states that the shortage of cars for the handling of the product of the firm is to be offset by taking advantage of the facilities of the electric line in making shipments from here.

Mr. Dixon, who returned yesterday from Portland, states that the ground at the site of the new plant of the concern at Wendling is being made ready for the foundation and the pouring of concrete for the piers, although construction work on the building will not start for at least another month. The plans and specifications for the new structure to replace those destroyed by the recent fire at the plant are being rapidly completed and the new mill will be when finally equipped one of the finest in the Northwest, according to the manager.

The situation in the lumber business throughout the Northwest is on the up grade and increasing demand for timber products is the report from all sources of information at the various plants recently visited by Mr. Dixon in his quest for ideas in mill construction that are to be utilized at the new Lane county plant.

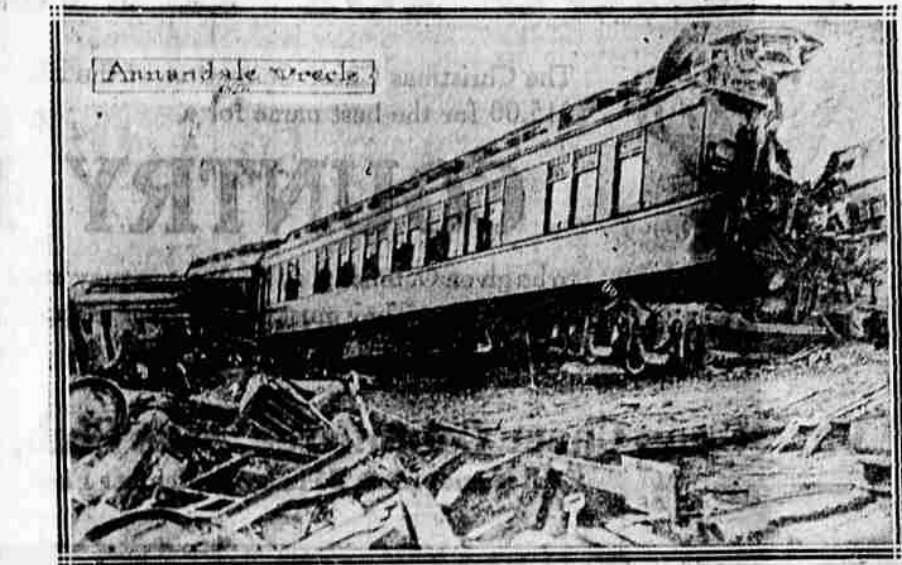

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OHIO REPUBLICANS LAY PLANS FOR STATE DRIVE

SLOGAN OF "STAND BY THE PRESIDENT" IS VOICED

Congressman Fess Sounds the Key-note of the Campaign in Speech at Memorial Hall

(By the Associated Press) COLUMBUS, Ohio, Aug. 22.—With the slogan "stand by the President and the national administration," Ohio Republicans laid plans for the state campaign which will terminate at the polls on November 7.

Congressman S. D. Fess, of Yellow Springs, the party nominee for U. S. senator, sounded the keynote of the campaign in a speech before the Republican state convention in Memorial hall.

The convention, after listening to the keynote address and a speech by Senator Willis, recessed until ten o'clock tomorrow morning, when platform will be adopted.

After adopting a declaration of principles the convention will adjourn and the campaign will be on.

In sounding the keynote of the campaign, "stand by the President and the national administration," Congressman Fess outlined the accomplishments of the Republican congress and the Republican national administration under President Harding, himself an Ohioan.

Senator Willis told the convention that something more than "a mere state contest" was at stake in the impending campaign. "We must back up the President and the national administration," he said, after declaring that the eyes of the nation were watching Ohio and that the outcome of the state election in November would have a decided effect on the next national campaign two years hence.

(By the Associated Press) COLUMBUS, Ohio, Aug. 22.—Records of the Republican administration, both in national and state affairs and reduction of taxes in Ohio were set forth by Democrats in their state convention here today as the main issue of the coming political campaign.

The platform, adopted speedily and without amendment, touched upon other issues but dwelt in the main upon alleged mismanagement of both state and national affairs by Republicans.

The appearance at the convention of Senator Fess, candidate for reelection, and A. Y. Donkey, the party's standard bearer on the state ticket, was the signal for vociferous cheers by the assembly. Mention of the names of Woodrow Wilson and James M. Cox also brought enthusiastic demonstrations and that for Mr. Wilson was particularly protracted.

YOUTH LANDS AS STOWAWAY, IS FOUND IN GARBAGE CAN

(By the Associated Press) PARIS, Aug. 22.—When 14-year-old Herman Jansen ran away from his home in Binghamton, N. Y., bound for a personally conducted sightseeing tour of Europe, he did not visualize his journey as ending in a garbage can on the boulevard Des Italiens in Paris.

But that is where a policeman found him wrapped in peaceful slumber at four o'clock this morning, and now Herman is awaiting completion of arrangements to return him to Binghamton. The adventurous youth crossed the Atlantic as a stowaway on the liner Finland. He was discovered during the voyage and was detained at Antwerp for deportation. He escaped, finally reaching Paris where he was waiting a chance to visit the battlefields.

Finding himself without funds at bedtime last night, he sought repose in a handy garbage can. There the police found him.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 22.—Money for the purchase of signed statements favorable to Herbert Wilson, charged with the murder of Herbert L. Cox, alleged mail robber, slain during an attempted jail break, was distributed freely to prisoners in the county jail, according to the testimony today of William Hornbuckle, one of the prisoners.

Hornbuckle testified that after the shooting of Cox, Wilson asked him to procure signed statements from other prisoners, to be used for Wilson's benefit at the trial. Wilson paid him various sums of money, he said, directing him to "give the boys whatever they want." He also offered some money to Hornbuckle's sister, the witness said, after he was told that she had seen a pistol smuggled into the jail for him prior to the shooting.

SKY BOLT KILLS BOY SCOUT

HENRY HEIDEMANN, 16, VICTIM OF LIGHTNING FLASH

BUTTE, Mont., Aug. 22.—Henry Heidemann, 16, a boy scout who had gone with a party on a climb or red mountain, in the highlands 25 miles south of Butte, was instantly killed Monday afternoon when lightning struck in the midst of the group of nine boys led by the scout executive, Benjamin Owen. Three other scouts, Thomas Lanphier, Carl Singer and William Kent, were knocked unconscious from the flash but were revived. Young Heidemann had suffered a direct hit and efforts at resuscitation were futile.

The party had left the summer camp early in the morning for the climb of the peak, more than 10,000 feet high, and were on their way down the steep slope when overtaken by the storm.

BAILEY, IDAHO, Aug. 22.—Moses Alexander, of Boise, was nominated by acclamation for governor by delegates to the Democratic state convention held here Tuesday night. George Watkinson, of Weiser, was nominated for the house of representatives from the first congressional district.

The platform as adopted calls for the abolition of the cabinet form of state government and state constabulary, and for the abolition of the convention system of nominating in favor of the state-wide direct primary. The platform took a stand for a bank guaranty act.

NAMPA, Idaho, Aug. 22.—Idaho Progressives at their state convention here today nominated a complete state ticket headed by H. F. Samuels, of Samuels, Idaho, for governor, and adopted a platform calling for public ownership of railroads and public control of national resources. W. Deal, of Nampa, was nominated for the house of representatives, first

congressional district, and Dow Dunning, of Boise, for the second district. Other principles embodied in the platform included: State wide primary, the initiative, referendum and recall, and exemption from taxation of the products of labor and industry, abolition of the state constabulary and the cabinet form of state government; election of members of the public utilities commission, a graduated inheritance and income tax on more than \$5000 a year, and the bonus bill.
