DAILY MARKET REPORT

(OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE)
PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 23.—All kinds of prices are ruling in the local egg market. The market is firm and prices are advancing, but just what the top should be nobody seems to know. Majority of the local trade advanced its selling price during the day to 31c, thus forcing itself into line with prices quoted the previous day by the poultry producers' association. Buying prices on eggs is also stiffening up, brokers offering 25 1/2c.

CANTALOUPE MARKET WEAK
Condition of the cantaloupe market was not quite so brisk as the first two days of the week. Prices on Yakima stock were shaded by some firms a trifle, \$1.15 to \$2.00 being asked.

EARLY PEACHES ABOUT GONE
Early white peaches have almost been cleaned up this year. Elbertas are arriving from California and early Crawford from local orchards. Within a week Elbertas from Yakima are expected.

TOMATO MARKET REMAINS FIRM
Tomato market maintained its steady tone during the day. Most of the trading was done around the 6c mark. Local tomatoes are expected to enter the market in a liberal way within the next week.

MEAT MARKETS ARE EASIER
Neither of the meat markets was firm during the day. Veal receipts have been about twice as heavy this week as last. Hogs followed the yard drop and sold generally at 16c. Poultry market is steady, but may decline if receipts continue to be so heavy.

WANTS SHARE OF \$40,000,000 REAM ESTATE

Mrs. Frank M. Downer, Jr.

Mrs. Frank M. Downer, Jr., formerly Miss Lenora Ream, beautiful niece of the late Norman H. Ream, has entered suit in Chicago for a \$100,000 share of his \$40,000,000 estate. When his younger brother, John, found himself in financial difficulties Norman Ream took the two younger boys and Lenora to raise. She was placed in care of Mrs. Hodges, in Oregan.

When she was 19 she lost a hand in an accident on the C. B. & Q. railroad in which Ream was one of the principal stockholders. That suit was settled for \$2500, with the understanding, she alleges, that Ream would take care of her for the rest of her life and provide for her in his will. Ream died two years after her marriage to Downer, and the provisions of the will were said to have been so disappointing that Downer left her.

WORK ON HIGHWAY ACTIVE

JUNCTION CITY - HARRISBURG

STRETCH WELL UNDER WAY

HARRISBURG, Ore., Aug. 23—(Special to the Register).—Work is being done faster now on the highway between here and Junction City. Pile driving has been finished on all but one of the trestles, that one being the largest and which crosses the Scott slough. The pile driver has now been moved to this place. Bridging of five of the trestles is practically done.

The crew of men has been considerably enlarged by Contractor E. S. Schell and everything is being gotten into shape to rush the job to completion. It will take another two weeks to complete the grading, and providing nothing unforeseen happens, trucks will begin in another week to haul gravel from the new plant, which is now being put up south of Lancaster, to macadamize the new grade.

A good rolling will be given to the grade before the gravel is applied and the surfacing material will also be rolled frequently to make the new grade when completed almost as good as pavement. When the paving comes
