

SENATE AGREES TO PUSH BONUS BILL TO FINAL VOTE

Measure to Be Taken up Monday and Rushed Through

DEBATE AGREEMENT MADE

Underwood Sees Notice That His Fight Would Be Against Passage Over Harding's Veto

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—The senate today agreed, by unanimous consent, to take up the soldiers' bonus bill Monday and push it to a final vote, which, it is expected, will be taken late Tuesday or Wednesday. The agreement provides that after 10 P. M. Monday no senator shall speak more than once, nor longer than 10 minutes on any amendment. No limitation was imposed on debate on the bill itself, but it was suggested that there might be a move to that effect, should it prove necessary. The agreement was proposed by Senator Underwood, Democrat, Arkansas, and seconded by Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, who said he would offer no objection to speedy action. Senator Underwood gave formal notice that his fight would be against passage of the bonus bill over President Harding's veto in the event that it was returned to congress with executive disapproval.

By common understanding the senate did not undertake today to bring up a vote any of the several amendments thus far offered. Senator McNary, Republican, Oregon, presented his amendment proposing the reclamation work and financial assistance for the men in developing homesteads on the reclaimed lands. In promising his support to any bill that would give the former service men the justice to which he believed they were entitled, Senator McNary, Democrat, Arizona, told the senate it would be forced to decide among other things whether it would listen to "the cry of commercialization of patriotism," when it had not done that at the end of the war.

Other Claims Speedily Paid
Congress, he said, had proceeded to vote, and had made no apology for doing so, to pay shipping claims, claims of the makers of uniforms and other equipment for the service men. It had done so, he said, on the statement that those contractors would have made profit had not the war ended. There was no cry of commercialization of patriotism then, he said. It was called "business."

"But these were inanimate objects," he went on. "These claims must be met and met properly, but the soldier, the man who fired the shots, must wait. It is commercialization of patriotism when his compensation is to be adjusted."

The Arizona senator said he must remind the senate that the original demand for the bonus came not from the former service men but from men and women who believed that the service men were entitled to compensation.

Randall Makes Plea for Bonus
Also supporting the bill, Senator Randall, Democrat, Louisiana, told the senate that if congress wished to settle its obligations to the veterans it could find means to do so and that if it did not, there were "a thousand excuses to hide behind."

"It seems strange to me," he said, "that as long as the war was on, there was no end to the amount of money the United States could raise to foot its bills, but now that victory is won and the national security is assured, we suddenly become too poor to adjust the soldiers' salaries on an equitable basis. In the meantime, however, our government has seen fit to repeal the excess profits law which yielded about \$115,000,000 a year."

BOOK EXCHANGE PLANNED

SCHOOL PUPILS WILL TRADE PRESCRIBED VOLUMES

Parent-Teacher Association Will Provide Means of Enabling Students to Acquire New Text Books for Old

In order to provide an efficient plan whereby public school students may exchange text books among the various classes and also in exchange between schools, the Parent-Teacher Association is planning to hold a clearing house for books in each of the local schools on Monday, September 11, when the institutions reopen for the winter semester. The plan of exchanging books among the students has been in effect here in the past but the association by organizing the various schools and providing for more efficient methods of exchanging books it is hoped to be of great benefit to teachers, pupils and parents.

It is expected that a total of approximately 5000 text books will be used during the coming school year in Eugene public schools and as the books are all of standard subjects used in all the schools of the state, a method of exchange is of great convenience to pupils and their parents. Pupils who have completed the prescribed books in one subject may by the exchange method pass it on to another pupil who is entering a higher grade and receive in return a book from another student who also has completed a book.

A member of the Parent-teacher association will be in charge of the exchange in each school and plans are to be worked out whereby one school with a surplus of similar volumes may interchange with another which has a demand for them but with an over supply of other texts.

Story Branded Hoax
SACRAMENTO, Cal., Aug. 26.—The story of finding the bodies of five persons under an overturned car near Crescent City, Cal., is similar to a story repeated in six Northern California counties last year. In each case the coroner branded it as a hoax. The only difference is that last year the bodies of one man, one woman and a child were reported to have been found.

TWO BUILDINGS BURNED

FIRE IN SPRINGFIELD RAZES CHURCH AND BURNS HOME

Eugene Department Called Out to Help Check Conflagration Fanned by Swift Breeze

Two Springfield structures—the Christian church and the home of A. W. McJowell at Fourth and A streets—were totally destroyed yesterday morning at 11 o'clock by a fire fanned by a stiff wind. The Eugene fire department answered the call for assistance and the combined fighting forces of the two cities confined the blaze to the limited area. Rev. and Mrs. Stater, who recently moved to Springfield from Idaho, occupied rooms in the Christian church and it is supposed that the blaze started from an overheated flue in their apartment.

At present the McJowells are in Idaho, but their residence was occupied by Mrs. E. A. Stater. The McJowell home was burned to the ground and the contents of the home were reported to be a total loss. Mr. McJowell is the owner of the notion store in Springfield. Other buildings endangered, but not materially damaged by the fire were the Pettijohn home across the street from the burned church.

Insurance carried on the church, which had only recently been completed, amounted to \$1000, and it has been estimated that this will cover about one-fifth of the value of the building. The McJowell residence was insured.

Men from the Booth-Kelly Lumber company turned out en masse and were of great assistance to the two departments fighting the blaze which was fanned fiercely by the wind. The truck sent to the scene of the fire by the Eugene department made record time. Mayor C. F. Eganman of Springfield has expressed his appreciation of the co-operation of the Eugene department.

PEAR SEASON UNDER WAY

1000 BUSHELS EACH DAY ARRIVING AT CANNERY HERE

Production This Year Will Be Fully Up to Standard, According to Reports of Association

Bartlett pears are ripening a little earlier than the average this year and are now pouring in at the Eugene Fruit Growers' cannery at the rate of 1000 bushels per day. This week the cannery will be running full time on pears, being temporarily sidetracked to make room for the pears. Most labor, particularly women, will be badly needed during the pear run.

Averaging all varieties, the fruit crop this year in the Eugene district will be fully up to standard. The association expects normally to increase its output 20 per cent each year, and indications now are that this rate of increase will be maintained this season. The normal expectation is to double the vegetable business each year, and this also will be accomplished this year.

Best sales this year have been unusually heavy. Manager Holt having sold the bulk of the best output in California, which likes to regard itself as the home of the canner's best. Carrot sales also have been large, the association's carrot tonnage having been sold principally in the East. The bean business also has been heavy. Bean canning, incidentally, has been transferred to the Junction City plant, while the Eugene plant is busy with the pear run.

The pear crop this year, Mr. Holt says, will be fully as large as last year, with the quality considerably higher. Every indication points to a record prune crop, and blackberries are coming in strongly.

BLOCK FOR FIELD BOUGHT

AGATE STREET PROPERTY WILL BE ATHLETIC GROUND

L. C. Church Purchases Lot to Assure Sufficient Facilities for Future Needs of University of Oregon

Purchase of the vacant block between Agate and Emerald streets and Fourteenth and Fifteenth avenues east which was recently made by L. C. Church, is a step to provide a future athletic field for the University of Oregon, it became known yesterday. The block composed of twenty building lots is adjacent to Hayward field and is the only vacant block in that section of the city and the purchase was made by Mr. Church to secure sufficient ground for the future needs of the university and in order to prevent the plot from being sold in sections and utilized for building purposes which would preclude the addition of a new field for the use of the institution in that vicinity.

Although the plans for the athletic field will not mature for some time the ground is now in possession of Mr. Church and will be held for the purpose of providing for the construction of an additional field when the increasing demand for an extension of the athletic grounds of the university will necessitate additional ground.

The tentative plans for the new field which will be worked out in the future are for the construction of a series of tennis courts and athletic fields for other sports. The property was formerly owned by the Frazier estate and was recently purchased by T. H. Garrett, who has sold it to Mr. Church.

RAIL STRIKE ENDURANCE TEST

Both Sides Settle Down to Wage Fight to the Finish

(By the Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Aug. 26.—With the peace effort launched by the big five brotherhoods definitely abandoned, rail executives and shop craft leaders re-aligned their forces for a finish fight in which both sides predicted an early victory.

"We are going home to start the real fight, whether it lasts for three weeks or three months," declared W. F. Ryan, president of the Carriers' National Brotherhood, as he prepared to leave for Kansas City. "Our organizations have plenty of funds to conduct a long fight and our men are willing to make the sacrifice needed for a decisive victory," he concluded.

B. M. Jewell, head of the strike organization of crafts, was equally positive of the outcome of the battle, which he asserted the railroads had left as the only course for the unions to pursue. Before starting for Chicago to pick up the reins of strike leadership where he had dropped them when recent peace parleys began he issued a statement to his men in which he said:

"We have won the full limit in the interest of peace. If we must fight we will show that we know how. Now that the issue is again clearly defined and false hopes of an early peace dispelled the fight must be renewed with increased vigor and every man must do his full part to bring it to an early and successful conclusion."

Sorry for Public
The attitude of the brotherhood chiefs whose tireless efforts to promote a settlement proved futile when negotiations collapsed yesterday was expressed by T. C. Cashion, president of the Switchmen's union of North America. He said:

"We are not so sorry for the strikers as we are for the American public. There are going to be the sufferers more and more as the strike is prolonged."

PORTLAND ELKS TO LAY CORNERSTONE SATURDAY

NEW HOME OF ANTIERED HERD WILL BE ERRECTED

Temple Will Cost \$1,050,000 and Will Be Ready for Occupancy July 1, 1923

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 26 (Special to the Register).—Portland lodge of Elks will lay the cornerstone of its new temple on the afternoon of Saturday, September 2. The ceremonies will be of a ritualistic nature and will be performed by the officers of the Seattle lodge. Elks of that city will come to Portland by special train, and members of the order from cities in Washington, Idaho and Oregon have announced their intention of being present on that day. Advance information indicates that the event will prove to be one of the most important and largely attended affairs held by the Elks in the Northwest in many years. Elaborate preparations are being made by Portland Elks both in connection with the ceremonies and the entertainment of the thousands of anticipated guests who will be here.

The new temple will cost \$1,050,000 and will be ready for occupancy about July 1, 1923. Its erection is indicative of the great strides that Portland lodge has made since its institution in old Turn hall on November 3, 1882. At that time it had 25 members. Now the membership numbers over 4000, and it is expected that there will be 5000 on the rolls by the time the temple is completed. Insignificant at the start, it is now and has been for several years nationally regarded as one of the staunchest lodges financially in the order, while its personnel is admitted to be of the highest type.

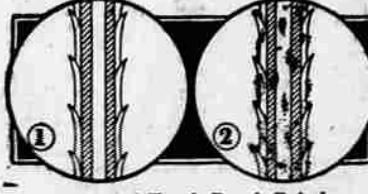

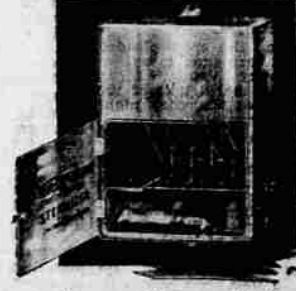

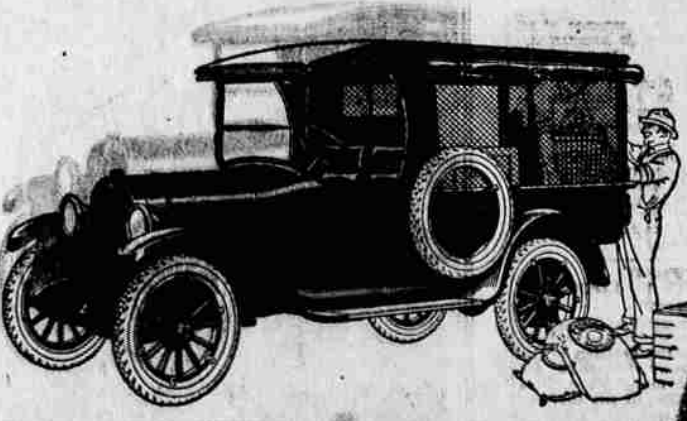
