

CITY COUNCIL PASSES ON
PROPOSED BUILDING WORKAction Taken on Street and
Sidewalk Projects

RADIO DECISION PENDING

Decide to Have Parents Submit Peti-
tions for Construction of Aerials
to Officials

Action on street, sidewalk and sewer projects made up the major portion of the activities of the city council members at the regular session of that body last night. One contract was let, that for the construction of the sewer between Charleston and Olive and Seventeenth and Eighteenth avenues west. The low bidder was the Clark-Bishop concern, which received the award for \$644. K. L. Hall also bid on the project, his figure being \$677.19.

Kincaid to Be Paved

A petition was presented for the paving of Kincaid street from Eleventh avenue to Thirtieth avenue east. Only three owners of private property signed the petition, John M. Ittman, the Y. W. C. A. and Marion McClain. The remainder of the frontage on the street is the property of the University of Oregon, which fronts the street on the east for two blocks, and the Eugene public university, which occupies the block between Eleventh and Twelfth avenues. It is understood that although neither of the institutions signed the petition, there will be no opposition to the improvement from this source. The city council acted favorably on the petition.

A petition for the granting of permits for the erection of radio aerials was presented by six boys, but after a discussion concerning the matter, it was held over for further investigation with the possibility that as the petitioners are minors their parents will be requested to sign the petition. More explicit information concerning the aerial towers will also be required before action, following a suggestion by Councilman S. R. Mosher. It was also suggested during the discussion that an official information of radio aerials in this city should be appointed on the work before permits were granted.

Garage Petition Denied

A petition requesting permission for the construction of a group of eight garages, each with a dimension of 15 by 15 feet, on the property between Oak and Willamette Sts. and Seventh and Ninth avenues east was denied by the council owing to the fact that the buildings were not to be built of fire proof material and that other wooden buildings on the block were of wooden construction and that the new garages would be a further fire menace in that district.

George Melvin Miller presented a petition requesting the council to take action on the beautifying of Franklin boulevard, which with the completion of the pavement now under way will be one of the main arteries of tourist traffic through the city. The petition signed by about 100 property owners, some of them residing on the boulevard, requested the city to improve the parking strips and to have the Southern Pacific railway remove the car obstructions that at present flank the right of way near the street. The matter was referred to the street committee for investigation.

Oil Tank Permit Asked

A. H. McDonald, proprietor of the Central Heating plant, again requested permission for the installation of a crude oil tank at the plant in the rear of the chamber of commerce building. The council passed on the petition with the provision that the installation of the oil tank met the requirements of the board of underwriters.

The Portfield and Macks garage was allowed thirty days in which to remove a wooden automobile incline from the curb. To construct a driveway to replace the wooden incline will necessitate the replacing of the wires for the electric clusters that are at present set along the surface of the sidewalk a few inches below the surface.

City May Buy Property

The proposition of purchasing for the city several pieces of property on September 2 that will be sold for unpaid taxes was referred to the finance committee.

On a complaint by R. W. Martin concerning the improvement work on Second street, the council decided that the city will be given one week in which to increase their activity or the city will take action according to the findings of the council.

A proposal to have the city halt road work was presented by the building inspector. A petition for the grading and graveling of Twenty-fourth street from Agate to Columbia was passed. Others matters taken up were the macadamizing of Potter St. from Nineteenth to Twenty-third avenues, to grade and gravel Kincaid street from Nineteenth to Twenty-third, macadamize Twenty-first and Twenty-second avenues from Alder to University, and several sidewalk projects in various parts of the city. Four of them being in the Fairmount district.

Extensive improvements are also planned by the new owners. Mr. Boyd is a resident of Eugene and Heilker, who lives in Bakerfield, Cal., left yesterday for that city to move his family here.

Mr. Price will remain in Eugene, but has not yet decided what line of business he will enter.

SPEED OFFICER APPOINTED

ARRANGEMENTS MADE TO PAY \$175 PER MONTH

G. A. Cornell was appointed city speed officer at a meeting of the city council last night at a salary of \$175 per month, to take effect September 1. I. Cornell, who has been employed by the city and who was recently injured at Corvallis, appeared before the council and presented three propositions concerning the position. One was to work jointly for Eugene and Corvallis on a salary of \$175 per month and expenses from each city; one to work exclusively for the city of Eugene at a salary of \$150 per month and expenses or at \$175 without expenses. The latter was the decision of the council, who believe that more efficient service can be maintained by the officer assuming all responsibility for his own machine and its upkeep.

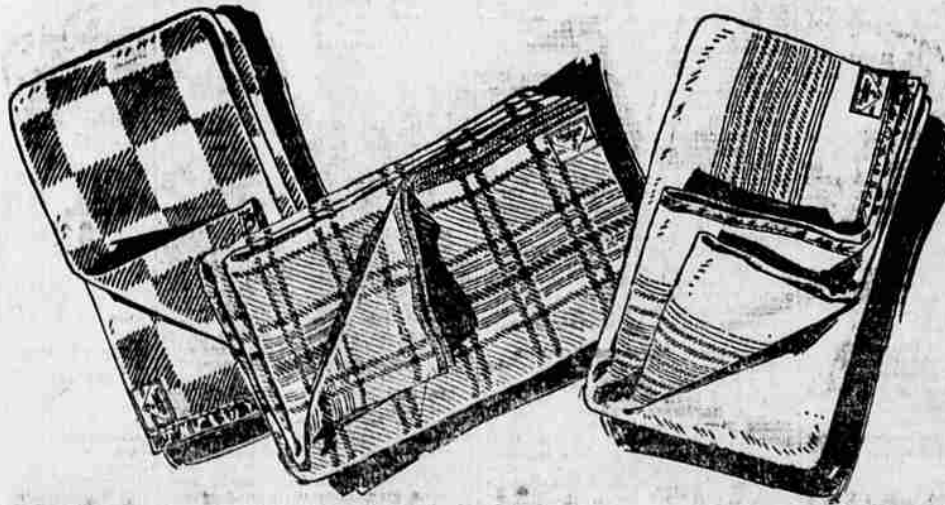

down into the mine. They found
raining flames and were unable to

reach the lower levels of the mine.
The situation of the entombed men
was made worse when air pipes burst
and the electric wiring went out of
commission, shutting off light and
communication.

The flames are burning in the 4200,

4400 and 4500 levels. During the
morning hours Superintendent Gar-
barini succeeded in restoring the air
line to the 2700 level and pipes were
installed to carry water down to be
used in an effort to extinguish the
burning timbers. Up to that time

water had been carried down to the
mine in skips.
The fire broke out just before
changing time for the underground
crews.
