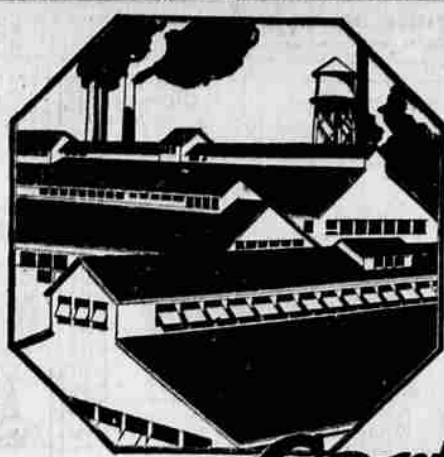

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FATHER KILLED IN AUTO SMASH; SPEEDERS HELD

EDWARD M. HILL OF DUFUR IS VICTIM; FAMILY FURT

Two California Tourists Set Fast Pace on Columbia Highway and Accidents Result

THE DALLES, Ore., Aug. 28.—One man is dead and five others, his wife and four children, lie seriously injured in The Dalles hospital as a result of an accident that hurled an automobile from the Columbia river highway near this city at noon yesterday. Two California tourists are held by local police.

The dead man is Edward M. Hill, 50, blacksmith of Dufur. The injured are Mrs. Hill and four children: Helen, 15; Wendell, 12; James, 8, and Marshall, 6.

The two men held are Frank G. Christ of Pasadena, Cal., and A. H. Pullin, of Carmel, Cal.

Hooked by Passing Car

The Hills, who had been on a vacation near Mt. Hood, were proceeding from Hood River to this city when an unidentified machine approached from behind and in endeavoring to pass hooked to the Hills machine and dragged it forty feet before dropping it over a twenty-foot embankment. The car turned completely over, throwing all of its occupants out, and crushing Hill.

The second car did not stop to ascertain the damage and disappeared before witnesses could take up the chase.

The two men arrested were located by a town marshal at the city of Arlington, fifty miles from here, on

a description furnished by Sheriff

Christman of The Dalles. Both men were visibly nervous at the time of their arrest, the marshal said. Neither is more than 25 years old. They are said to have left Portland yesterday morning, but denied all knowledge of the accident.

The machine was marked by a deeply dented right fender and had a scratched front wheel.

Doctor First on Scene

Dr. A. A. Essen of The Dalles was one of the first to reach the scene. He notified the police and put in a call for an ambulance. Hill died as he was being taken to the operating table.

Mrs. Hill suffered a fractured pelvis and other injuries. The four children were badly cut and bruised, but all are expected to recover.

Mr. Hill's condition was somewhat improved this morning, so that doctors held out some hopes for her recovery.

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
