Building Permits Granted—H. B. Pittsby has been granted a permit for the construction of a cottage at 150 Monroe street at an estimated cost of \$400. A remodel permit has been granted to the Christian church for improvement work on the building. The cost is estimated at \$500. S. J. Robertson has been granted a permit to remodel the property at 35 Twentieth avenue west at an estimated cost of \$500.

Y Officials to Meet on Row River Sept. 10—Plans for the Y. M. C. A. for the coming year will be formulated on September 10 on the site of the boys' summer camp on Row river, where that stream joins Sharp creek. The place is 35 miles distant from Eugene and as a good road leads to it, it has been estimated that all the Y. M. C. A. officials will attend the setting up conference. The program for the conference will be worked out this week.

No Blazes in Siuslaw District—Other than a few small blazes that cannot be classified as a forest blaze, the district under the protection of the Western Lane Fire Patrol association has been free from forest fires. G. M. Muir, president of the association. The Siuslaw country has suffered very little from forest fires this summer, but Mr. Muir does not believe that all danger is yet passed. The timber is very dry again, said Mr. Muir.

Special Rates Granted—A special round trip rate of \$3.42 between Eugene and Salem has been granted by the Southern Pacific company for the annual state fair. The tickets will be sold from September 23 to 30 and will be good returning until October 2. Arrangements have been made for the trains from this city to stop at the fair grounds to discharge passengers. A special round trip rate for the Pendleton round-up of \$18.29 has also been authorized by the Southern Pacific lines. The Pendleton tickets will be sold September 20 to 23 and are good returning until September 25.

New Rock Crusher to Start Operations—The new county rock crusher which will be put in operation on road projects here, will start next week, according to M. P. Morse, county surveyor. The new equipment was recently purchased to replace the machine formerly in operation but which was found to be too small for the work. The new rock crusher will be sent here by the state road officials. A consignment of 46 Liberty army trucks was recently turned over to the state by federal officials for the use of road work and they are being distributed to the various counties. The new trucks will increase the county fleet to eight machines.

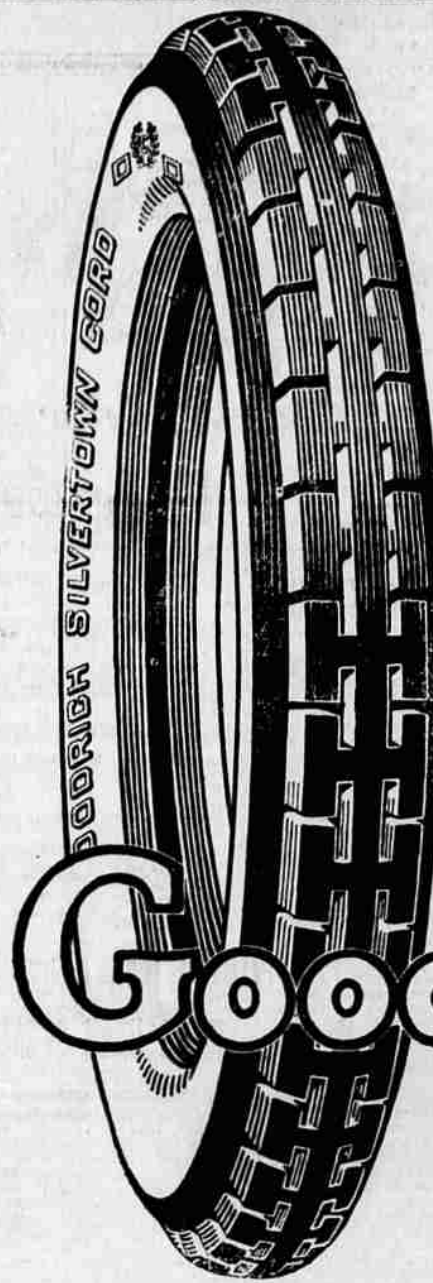

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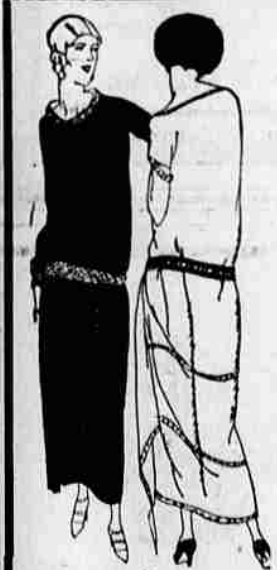
DIED
