### BREW REPLACES WATER

**WOMAN SOBS TALE TO COURT AND IS FINED \$500**

BEND, Ore., Aug. 28.—That she had made him brew so that her husband would not have to drink city water, was the statement made in justice court here today by Mrs. Alpharetta Meyer before she was sentenced to pay a fine of \$500 for having liquor in her possession. Mrs. Meyer, who is well known as the "tea garden," was told the court that she had been endeavoring to support her orphaned grandson, and that she believed herself to be the victim of a conspiracy. Twelve gallons of home brew, three quarts of moonshine and eight bottles of wine were confiscated by Sheriff S. E. Roberts, Deputy George Stokoe, and two federal officers, when they visited the Meyer ranch home early Sunday morning. The place had been come known as the "tea garden," but officers are positive that tea was not served to travelers and parties from town who stopped at the ranch in search of refreshments.

### BAKER HEADS FAIR STAFF

**PUBLICITY WORK FOR SHOW IN HANDS OF MAYOR**

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 28.—The entire management of the publicity campaign for the preliminary work of the 1923 exposition was placed in the hands of Mayor George L. Baker today by the exposition directors at a meeting.

The first line of attack will be an effort to have adopted the constitutional amendment authorizing the city of Portland to levy a tax to raise \$3,000,000 and to have the voters of Portland vote for the special tax. Both measures will go on the ballot at the November election.

The directors also set aside \$5000 to conduct this campaign.

### Stage Lines to Consolidate

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 29.—The Central Stage Terminal and Hotel company today announced the consolidation of the passenger stage lines operating between Salem, Albany, Corvallis and Eugene effective Friday, September 1.

The lines involved are the Oregon Stage Line, operating between Salem and Albany; the Albany and Corvallis Stage Line, operating between Albany and Corvallis; and the Central Motor Bus company, operating between Eugene and Corvallis. The new consolidated line will be known as the Central Motor Bus line. The stages will leave the terminals at Eugene and Salem every two hours and will run straight through with the regular intertowing stops.

### McArthur-Stauff Bull Medalist

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 30.—Holger, noted bull in the Jersey herd of McArthur and Stauff of Rickreath, near here, is the first of his breed to qualify for a medal of merit, according to information received here from the American Jersey Cattle club. The bull won the honor on his record of being the sire of three daughters producing over 850 pounds of butter fat each year on yearly test and one dropping a living calf within 15 months from the date of the last freshening prior to the test. Congressman C. N. McArthur is one of his owners.

### Gopher Hides Bring Circus Cops

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 30.—Circus day in Salem last Saturday resulted in all the squirrel and gopher traps that farmer boys had collected for months being brought to town for the bounty that would afford admissions to the circus. Checking over his books today, County Clerk H. B. Boyer found that on Saturday he paid out in bounties a total of \$55.50 to more than a hundred boys, the amount representing about 700 rodent scalps.

Local market has had an inquiry from the East for eggs, but was unable to take the order because there is not enough surplus here to make up a car.

Butter market is in a little healthier condition, with top score better now in good shape. Demand is still weak for off score butter, owing to the improper handling of milk, the market has been flooded with off score butter, which is hard to move. Cheese market continues dull.
