

PARK HOTELS ARE VISITED

EUGENIANS RETURN FROM TRIP TO YELLOWSTONE

M. Marquis Inspects Buildings to Determine Best Plans for New Antlers Resort Structure

After a three weeks trip through the Yellowstone park in order to inspect the hotels of the national playground for the purpose of determining the plans to be followed in the construction of the Antlers resort on the upper McKenzie river, M. Marquis, one of the proprietors of the resort, accompanied by Earl Matlock, returned to Eugene yesterday. No definite decision has been reached as to the arrangements of the resort that will replace the building recently destroyed by fire but it is expected that the rustic type of architecture will be employed with a partial log construction.

The Old Faithful Inn, the Norris Hotel and the Hotel at the Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone were all looked over in an endeavor to determine the best plan of construction for a tourist resort such as is planned by the owners of the Antlers property. With the exception

of size the new Lane county hotel will follow closely the plans of these resorts of the national park.

A record attendance is reported for the tourist season at the Yellowstone park, according to Mr. Matlock, who states that the hotels were all heavily taxed to take care of the influx of visitors. The Oregon motor license plates are also much in evidence on the roads of the park, he said.

MRS. JONES AFFECTIONATELY KNOWN AS "NELLIE GRANT"

MRS. JONES AFFECTIONATELY KNOWN AS "NELLIE GRANT" is Survived by Her Husband, a Chicago Banker and Former Assistant Postmaster General

(By the Associated Press) CHICAGO, Aug. 23.—Mrs. Franklin Hatch Jones, only daughter of General U. S. Grant, one of the country's few "White House brides," and one of the nation's popular heroines of the century, died at her home here today. Death was due to paralysis, which made her an invalid several years ago.

CHICAGO, Aug. 23.—Mrs. Jones, who was affectionately known throughout the land as "Nellie Grant" is survived by her husband, a Chicago banker and former assistant postmaster general in the Cleveland administration, two brothers, Ulysses S. Grant, Jr. of California, and Jesse R. Grant, of New York; two children by a former marriage, Algernon and Vivian Sartoris, and several nieces, among them the Princess Cantacuzene.

Funeral services will be held Thursday at the Chicago home, with Dr. James McCutcheon of the McCormick Theological Seminary officiating. Burial will be at Springfield, her husband's old home.

Death was not unexpected, as for two weeks Mrs. Jones had been failing rapidly as the attack of paralysis from which she suffered extended to her brain. For several days she had been too weak to be moved.

Nellie Grant was born on July 4, 1824, at Wiscasset, the estate of Colonel Dent, her grandfather.

Train Hits Auto: Two Killed

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 23.—Frank Redding of Tillamook, 40 years old, was instantly killed and Edward Arance, 29, of Falls City, Oregon, died an hour later as a result of their automobile being run over by an Oregon Electric work train near Liveokey station today. Both were employed in hop fields near Liveokey. Redding leaves his widow and four children, who also were employed as hop pickers. Arance was single. An inquest will be held.

AMUNDSEN GIVES UP HIS PLAN TO FLY OVER POLE

SEASON TOO FAR ADVANCED TO PERMIT OF CHANCE

Advices from Ship Maud Indicate Vessel Frozen in the Ice Near Wrangell Island

(By the Associated Press) NOME, Alaska, Aug. 23.—Captain Roald Amundsen, Norwegian explorer, has definitely abandoned for this year his plan for an airplane flight from northern Alaska across the north pole to Spitzbergen or Grant's Land. It plans to hop-off next spring, it became known today with the arrival here of the coast guard cutter Bear from Point Barrow.

Captain Amundsen told the correspondent of the Associated Press, who joined the Bear at Point Barrow, that the start had been delayed by unfavorable ice conditions and that the season was too far advanced to permit chances for success. Ice conditions, he said, militated against the chances of a successful landing at either Spitzbergen or Grant's Land.

Captain Amundsen landed his equipment and plane at Wainwright, 100 miles southwest of Point Barrow, and will make that point the base for his flight.

Maud Fast in Ice Radio advices from Captain Amundsen's ship, Maud, indicated that the vessel is frozen in ice near Wrangell island, off the northeastern Siberian coast, and not off Point Hope, Alaska, as was previously reported. This fits in with the plans of the explorer, who expected the ship to start somewhere near Wrangell island the long drift with the Arctic ice pack across the north polar basin. Extensive research will be made by the scientists aboard the Maud, with particular emphasis on the study of ocean and air currents and meteorological conditions at the "top of the world." The explorer expects to rejoin the Maud by airplane some time next year after the completion of his trans-pole flight.

Conditions Worst in Years Ice conditions in the Arctic off the northern Alaska coast are the worst in many years. Captain Cochran of the Bear guided his vessel for miles through tremendous ice floes, reaching Point Barrow with the greatest difficulty. Passengers for the Bear were finally transferred to the ship by dog sled after several attempts had failed. The training schooner Herman was caught in the ice near Point Barrow August 22 and narrowly escaped being crushed between the large floes. A timely shift of the wind saved the vessel and she reached Point Barrow safely.

OLD SCALE IN COLORADO MINES TO BE RESTORED

OPERATORS TO INCREASE WAGES ON SEPTEMBER FIRST

Decision of Mine Owners Hailed as Victory for the Miners by District President

PUEBLO, Colo., Aug. 23.—Colorado coal miners who have been on strike since April 1 were authorized to return to work as soon as the wage scale in effect November 1, 1921 is restored by mine operators, following a meeting of the executive board of district 15 of the United Mine Workers of America here this afternoon. The action followed the announcement that Colorado operators will probably restore the old wage scale, after a conference with the scale Denver.

Telegrams were dispatched to more than sixty locals of the union in Colorado, notifying them to call a meeting at once and accept the agreement of the operators to restore the wage scale in effect prior to November 1.

The decision of the operators was hailed as a victory for the miners of the state by A. J. Macguire, president of district 15, who announced the action of the executive board. He declared that approximately 7,500 miners would return to work as a result of the decision of the mine owners to reinstate the old wage scale.

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 23.—Wages of Colorado coal miners probably will be increased September 1 to the scale in effect prior to November 1, 1921, operators declared late today after a conference with the state industrial commission.

Wages were reduced approximately 30 per cent last November in anticipation of similar reductions in other fields. Since the recent agreement in other states restoring the former wage scale, Colorado wages are much lower than in surrounding states.

NEW PLAN TO LINK NATIONS

WORLD ASSOCIATION OF STATES NOW PROPOSED

(By the Associated Press) GRENoble, France, Aug. 23.—A new plan for a "world association of states" to link together the leagues of nations, the Pan American union and those governments which are members was submitted today in the institute of international law at its meeting here by Professor Alejandro Alvarez of Chile.

The plan was submitted in the form of a report submitted by Professor Alvarez for the twenty-seventh commission of the institute which approved it at an executive session held in Paris from July 31 to August 4. The new association would be superimposed upon the present league and Pan-American union and would seek to encourage regional and continental groups rather than attempt to replace them entirely. It is designed to meet the American objections to the league of nations with the primary purpose of coordinating the states of the world—not establishing a superstate.

OLCOTT DECREED NOMINEE

ORDER IS SIGNED BY JUDGES BINGHAM AND KELLY

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 23.—Ben W. Olcott, whose nomination as the Republican party's candidate for governor was contested in the circuit court of Marion county by R. R. Coster on behalf of Charles Hall, is declared the regular Republican nominee in an order signed by Judge George G. Bingham and Judge Percy H. Kelly on motion of the attorneys for Governor Olcott.

The order was issued on motion of Olcott's attorneys, following the abandonment of the contest proceedings by the contestant August 14.

ODESSA SOVIET DESERTS

PURGES SELF OF BOLSHEVISM, CLAIMS SELF RULE

(By the Associated Press) LONDON, Aug. 23.—A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Odesa says a report has been received in the German capital that the Odesa soviet has purged itself of bolshevism, proclaimed its independence of Moscow and called upon all citizens to unite against the communist usurpers.

PROGRESSIVES ROW OVER COMMITTEE PREROGATIVE

CONTENTION SAID TO CONCERN THE GOVERNORSHIP

Question Is Whether Party Indorse a Nominee on Ballot or Independent Be Groomed

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 23 (Special to the Register).—Disagreement is said to exist in the executive committee of the progressive party over recommendation to the nomination committee. The contention is said to be over the governorship and the question is whether an independent should be nominated or an indorsement be made of one of the nominees already on the ballot. The nominating committee probably will be requested to permit this matter to go before the convention without recommendation. The same situation is expected to apply to the treasurer.

If this develops there is a prospect of a lively fight on the floor of the convention, which has been called for September 5.

The impression in political circles is that the executive committee of the new party knows just what it wants to do, that the governorship and state treasurer will be done with according to program and that the representatives of dissension in the executive committee are for the purpose of arousing it in the convention. J. H. Graham, of Baker, Democratic nominee for representative for the third congressional district, has answered the questionnaire of the progressive committee and added that he considered Senators Stanford and McNary a disgrace to the United States senate and, with Senator Gooding of Idaho, are a disgrace to the states they represent, for helping to seat Senator Newberry.

25 Survive Steamer Wreck SANTIAGO, Chile, Aug. 23.—Late reports received here this afternoon, showed that 25 of the 232 passengers and crew on board the Chilean steamer Itata, which sank Monday off the coast near Coquimbo, were saved. Early reports said that all but six lost their lives.
