1/2 cup brown sugar—1/2 cup granulated sugar—1/2 tablespoon
cinnamon—1/2 teaspoon salt—1/2 teaspoon vanilla—1 cup
butter, chopped, melted, almonds or walnut meats. Combine
coffee, milk, sugar. Add over boiling water. Separate
eggs. Add salt, both sugars to yolks, creaming thoroughly
together. Add this to coffee mixture and cook stirring con-
stantly for 3 minutes until mixture coats spoon. Chill, and
serve. Fold in whipped egg whites and freeze in 3 parts

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 31.—E. J. Dixon of Portland, of the firm of Bates-Dixon company, was manager of general market organization of the Pacific Co-Operative Produce Producers Wednesday afternoon by the board of directors. The ballot was taken after the applications of several other brokers were considered.

The election was announced following a meeting of the producers Wednesday night in the courthouse at Hillsboro, when dissolution of the association was considered. The meeting was turned into a love feast, however, and the producers decided not to bolt the organization. Delegates were present from Benton, Polk, Lane, Marion and Yamhill counties.

T. H. Small, Mrs. Grant Brown and R. R. Durkee were also elected directors to fill existing vacancies.

The members are said to have been pleased with the reports made by E. C. Schroeder, president, and to have complimented him on his work during the past two months, while he has managed the organization. The report showed a better return to the growers from the last two pools than previous pools had rendered.
