OREGON CITY, Ore., Sept. 5.—Lewis Davaia of Sebastopol, Cal., suffering from probable severe internal injuries; Fred Bucher, also of Sebastopol, with a broken arm, and Anto Inguiter of Fresno, Cal., with lacerations of the face, are in a Portland hospital as the result of an automobile crash on the river road near Roth station this morning.

Harold Fransen, driver of the car, bruised and shaken, is receiving medical treatment here.

The party was enroute from California to Wenatchee, Wash., where all had expected to go to work in the apple orchards. According to Fransen, the steering gear came loose, sending the machine into the ditch, where it capsized. The driver fell clear of the machine, but the others were pinned beneath it.

Passing motorists and Deputy Sheriff Hughes righted the machine and gave first aid to the wreck victims until passing physicians arrived and took the injured men to the Portland hospital.

PREVENT FIRE IS PLAN

UNDERWRITERS MAY OBSERVE NATIONAL WEEK

Companies Maintaining Agencies in Eugene Suggest Event Be Held Here

In common with many other cities of the United States, local fire insurance underwriters are discussing plans for the observance of the annual fire prevention week which will be held this year October 8-15. Although only tentative details for a local observance of the week have been outlined, it has been suggested by officials of the national companies with agencies in this city that the co-operation of the retail merchants be obtained for the placing of window displays as a part of the campaign of education to keep down the annual fire loss. Arrangements for speakers at the public schools is also pointed out as a means of arousing interest in the fire prevention program. The annual fire prevention week marks the anniversary of the Chicago fire of 1871 which will be observed at Portland this year with a parade of the fire department and an special parade under the direction of the insurance companies and city officials. No definite arrangements have been prepared for the Eugene event, but it is probable, according to insurance agents of this city, that some plan will be worked out with the cooperation of the officials of the companies.
