TILDEN WARDEN PASSES

ROWLAND STATION MERCHANT DIES AT HARRISBURG

HARRISBURG, Ore., Sept. 7.—(Special to the Register).—Tilden Warden died Monday afternoon at the local hospital. He had just been brought back from Broten baths near Cloverdale, Ore., where he had been taken a few weeks previous to be given treatment for cancer in the hope that he might be benefited, but his affliction gradually grew worse until death came. He had been suffering with an acute case of cancer for the last six months.

Mr. Warden, who was manager of the general store at Rowland station east of here, was born in Indiana about 44 years ago. Together with his family he moved to Missouri when he was about of age and farming was engaged in in that state until 1919 when the family came to Oregon.

He leaves his wife, child, three brothers, William and Charles, of Missouri, and Albert of Brownsville, and one sister, Mrs. John Chastain of Holley, Ore.

The funeral services were conducted Wednesday afternoon at Rowland and the remains were laid to rest in the Alford cemetery.
