Preamble to be recited
CONSTITUTION DAY TO BE OBSERVED IN SCHOOLS

The preamble of the constitution of the United States will be memorized by the pupils of the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades of the city schools for constitution day which will be observed in all the schools Monday, September 18 according to announcement by Superintendent Carleton.

In the history classes that day attention will be called to the purpose of celebrating constitution day and the fundamental principles of the constitution. The pupils in each class room will recite the preamble in unison. In the lower grades the teachers will use the time of the opening exercises in explaining the meaning of constitution day. By observing constitution day in this way there will be no break in the regular school work and the boys and girls will learn something of value about the constitution of the United States. It is believed by Superintendent Carleton and the teachers that the effects will be more lasting than

would be secured through special programs.

In the high school every student will be asked to memorize the preamble and it will be given in unison by the entire student body at the opening of the regular assembly Wednesday morning of next week.

CONSTITUTION IS TOPIC

ST. MARY'S CATHOLIC CHURCH TO HAVE SERVICES

Local Parish Will Have Program for Week Including School Exercises and Speaking

In observance of constitution week a special program for the week starting Sunday evening will be held at the St. Mary's Catholic church of this city, according to the announcement of Rev. Edwin V. O'Hara, pastor of the parish, who will devote the major portion of his sermon that day to the United States constitution and its safeguards for the freedom of conscience. A special service will be held at the parish hall Friday evening and the principal speaker will be E. J. Lonergan, attorney at Portland, who will also speak on the constitution and its place in American history with particular bearing on present day conditions, according to the announcement.

The exercises of the pupils of the St. Mary's school, including both the grades and the high school division will also be held Friday evening and during educational work of the week special reference to the constitution will be made in the class room courses of the pupils, states Father O'Hara. The St. Mary's school reopened for the first semester Monday with a total registration of 149 including both the primary grades and the high school. It is expected that this will be increased during the next few weeks, is the report. Two new instructors have been added to the staff of the school for the present year, Father O'Hara states.

JERSEY OWNED BY MRS. PLANK IS BIG PRODUCER

Silver Emea Bell, 326.291, owned by Mrs. Minnie B. Plank of Junction City, has qualified for an American Jersey cattle club gold medal, having produced in one year 15,532 pounds of milk and 749.97 pounds of butterfat, according to a report made by the American Jersey cattle club.

FARMERS FIGHT TO SAVE PROPERTY FROM FLAMES

Fire Started in Grass Spreads to Hills South of City

GREEN FIR TREES BURN

Flames Race Through Underbrush and Have Crossed Ridge Over to Goshen Side

A fire that started early yesterday afternoon on the old Dunn farm on the South Alder street road about two miles south of the city limits when a farmer attempted to burn out an old rail fence row, spread rapidly through fields of grass and up the west slope of the hills south of the Masonic cemetery into the green fir trees. It was still spreading last night, according to reports from farmers living in that locality, and the damage has already run into hundreds of dollars, it is believed.

The great volume of smoke rising in a huge cloud attracted attention from the city and it was not long until men were sent out to fight the fire. A call came in at the sheriff's office for men and Deputy Sheriff Croner sent out three of his "trusties" prisoners and two members of his moonshine squad. Later 20 or more soldiers from the aviation field went out in a truck and together with the farmers residing near there and other volunteers succeeded in saving all farm buildings in the path of the flames, but several miles of fences were burned.

The fire appeared to be nearly two miles wide and, fanned by a stiff breeze, spread rapidly. When it reached the west slope of the hills it seemed to run toward the timber with the speed of a race horse and soon the trees were burning rapidly. A lot of small timber, good for cord wood, was destroyed. As the underbrush was as dry as tinder the small force of men at work could do little or nothing to stay the progress of the flames. The fire had crossed the ridge late in the afternoon and was burning on the Goshen and Creswell side last night.

The blaze on the south and west slopes of Spencer hill, which attracted much attention Monday, is said to be practically extinguished.

Farmers whose residence, barns and other buildings lay in the path of the flames fought desperately alone for a time to save their property and had not help from the city arrived their loss would have been considerable.

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MASONIC HOME TO RISE

PLANS FOR CRAFTSMEN'S CLUB UNDER WAY

First Unit Will Be Built at Cost of \$10,000 on Fourteenth Avenue Site Near Campus

Construction work on the first unit of the new home and club rooms of the Craftsmen's club, the University of Oregon Masonic order, will probably start some time in the fall, according to officials in charge of the promotion of the building which will be built on Fourteenth avenue east, between Alder and Kincaid streets. The first unit of the building will cost approximately \$10,000 and is being financed by the grand lodge of the Masonic order and the funds for the purchase of the site are being raised by the local Masonic units.

A committee composed of Fred Pink, J. S. Maglady, Dr. M. M. Davis, Robert Callahan and Gordon Fish have charge of the raising of the necessary finances for the purchase of the site which is being held on an option by the Masonic order. The new building will be of concrete construction and will contain all the modern facilities of a lodge hall and club room, according to the plans that have been drafted. The Craftsmen's club is composed of faculty and students of the University of Oregon who are members of the Masonic order and at present numbers 75 members with John M. MacGregor president.

Provision will also be made at the new building for a meeting place for the order of the DeMolay, a boys' organization composed of the sons of Masons.

was immediately secured by her attorney but before it could be served upon the sheriff he had disappeared with his fair prisoner.
