ARGONAUT DEAD TO BE LAID TO REST FRIDAY

BODIES OF 28 UNFORTUNATES BROUGHT TO SURFACE

Mrs. Potter, Coroner, Will Summon Members of Crew on Duty at Time to Inquest

JACKSON, Cal., Sept. 20.—Silent men worked in three cemeteries here today, preparing the last resting places for 45 of the 47 bodies of the Argonaut disaster.

Rescue workers made rapid progress today in bringing the bodies to the surface of the Kennedy mine from the 4,350 foot level of the Argonaut mine.

The number reached 28, 17 reaching the surface today. The rescue crews are working determinedly at the task, and it was expected the remaining 19 bodies would reach the surface before the United States bureau of mines rescue crew of miners quit their work.

Searching inquiry into the cause of the mine disaster will be made Friday at the coroner's inquest, Thomas G. Negrich, district attorney, announced.

Mrs. Dolores Potter, coroner, proudly announced that she would summon the engineer on duty when the Argonaut caught fire, James Bradshaw, shift boss, and others connected with the mine.

Throughout the strain of the last three weeks Jackson has borne up bravely under the strain. There has been no hysteria, instead a rather grave silence is noticeable over the town.

TIERNAN SAYS POULIN THIRD CHILD'S FATHER

ERIHNG WIFE AND OTHER MAN ATTENDED DANCES

Notre Dame Professor Testifies Mate Absent from Home on Wednesday, Friday Nights

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Sept. 20.—John Tiernan, Notre Dame law professor, testifying today in the case of his wife, Mrs. Augusta Tiernan, who charges Harry Poulin with the paternity of her third born child, denied that he was the father of the child and told of efforts to bring about a settlement of the affair between his wife and his wife, but after a wrangle lasting through most of today's hearing, Judge C. L. Ducomb ruled the testimony of a husband in a case of the peculiar character of the present one was not admissible.

Poulin has bored expression throughout today's hearing Poulin maintained an attitude of bored placidity, only once showing signs of interest.

Professor Tiernan told of a series of dancing parties at surrounding towns. He said the invitations always came from Poulin to Mrs. Tiernan and that he was invited by his wife to go along.

Frequently away from home, Tiernan was frequently away from home, the witness replied: "Between February and April she was regularly away from home on Wednesday and Friday nights and occasionally on Saturday. Often she said she was going to church. I encouraged her in that—attending Lenten services."

Professor Tiernan showed his first signs of cracking under the strain of the trial when Prosecutor Jeilison inquired into the birth of the third child.

His answers were low and in a trembling voice and other tears came into his eyes. He told of the baptism of the child two weeks after its birth and later of the repudiation.

FRAUDULENT SIGNATURES CHARGED BY ATTORNEY

WAGE INCREASES GIVEN

COUNTIES GET ROAD COIN

TOTAL OF \$786,326 APPORTIONED FROM AUTO FUND

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 20.—During the year from September 15, 1921, to September 15, 1922, the secretary of state apportioned to the counties of Oregon a total of \$786,326.01 and to the state highway fund \$2,258,873.02 from the receipts from motor vehicle and motor operators' license fees.

The counties receive 25 per cent and the highway fund 75 per cent after administrative expenses have been paid. A similar report Tuesday gave the figures for six months.
