HARRISBURG, Ore., Sept. 19.—A double golden wedding occurred here today of unusual interest. The brides are sisters and the ceremony uniting W. F. Elliott and Miss Mary Davis, J. W. Hedgepath and Miss Susan Davis was pronounced by Rev. J. M. Lowell of the Southern M. E. church September 19, 1872, at a camp meeting in Dixie, Oregon.

The marriage ceremony was repeated at 1:30 this afternoon by the Rev. H. E. Holcomb, Church of God minister. A banquet was then served to 80 relatives at the Methodist Episcopal church parlors.

Both bridegrooms came to Oregon in 1867; both brides crossed the plains by ox team in 1864. The Elliotts lived near Prineville until 1906, when they came to Harrisburg. Elliott has served the town both as councilman and mayor and is a prominent Mason. The Elliott children number eight—Walter
