LUMBER OUTPUT IS LESS

ONLY TWO SHIFTS EMPLOYED AT BOOTH-KELLY MILL

 Springfield, Ore., Feb. 5.—Due to the shortage of logs at the mill because of the bad weather at Wendling, only the first and second shifts will operate at the Booth-Kelly mill here. Only one shift will operate at a time at the same time that the old shift operated. Each shift will run three days at a time. The planer will also run two shifts instead of three.

COMMUNITY CLUB MEETS

MEMBERS OF TRENT FARMERS' UNION ARE GUESTS

Speakers Dwell on Aims and Objects of Union—Action of Court Discussed

 Pleasant Hill, Ore., Feb. 5.—The Pleasant Hill Community club held its first meeting in the new headquarters Saturday night, about 75 being present. The members of the Trent Farmers' union were invited to attend this meeting but owing to the great amount of sickness at Trent only a few were present.
 Will Wheeler, president of the Trent local, was called upon to explain more fully the purpose of the

Farmers' union. After a brief talk on that organization, giving the reason which brought it into existence and causing its popularity, he spent some little time setting forth its purposes, dwelling in particular upon the fourth purpose as set forth in the national constitution, "to educate the agricultural classes in scientific farming." Mr. Wheeler is a strong advocate of the county agricultural agent's office.

After Mr. Wheeler's talk, T. L. Hauregan, principal of the Pleasant Hill public school, spoke on the action of the county court in refusing to restore to the farmers the offices that have been cut off. He denounced Commissioners Sharp and Roney and spoke in particular of the fact that there are about 200 rural public schools in Lane county, many of which have teachers who are now at their work and need help and advice of a rural school supervisor and health nurse.

Mr. Hays Commends Speaker
 Mr. Hays, principal of the Union high school, commended Mr. Hauregan on his speech, adding that he felt as president of the Lane County Teachers' association, he could safely say at least 90 per cent of the teachers of Lane county would back the farmers in opposing the action of the court.
 Other members of the community club spoke testifying that although they had voted originally for Mr. Sharp and Mr. Roney, they did not feel that these men had lived up to their pledges as taking these offices from the farmers is false economy. It was then moved and carried by a heavy majority that "The Pleasant Hill Community club go on record as favoring the recall of Commissioner Emmett Sharp."

The meeting was then turned over to the program committee. Miss Wilcox, of Eugene, favored the club with a piano and a vocal solo, each time being called for an encore. Meryl Bennett would have pleased his audience much more if he had come provided with two solo songs, as one of his interpretations of "Their Yesterdays" was greatly appreciated. Mrs. Belle Wimmer, who is a favorite among the members of the club, first played a medley of old home songs in her violin followed by some lively pieces that pleased some members of the club to doing an old-fashioned clog. The women's club served sandwiches and coffee and the club adjourned at midnight.

COTTAGE GROVE MAKES

RECORD FOR EXPANSION

Growth In Building For Past Year Sets Mark

\$107,000 YEAR'S OUTLAY

(Register Lane County Special)
 Cottage Grove, Ore., Feb. 5.—New buildings and residences erected in Cottage Grove during the year 1922 indicate the wonderful growth the city is undergoing. There was more building than for the same period probably in the history of the city.
 Improvements in the business section of the city were the Ken two-story brick veneer business block and apartment building, erected upon the location of the old Oregon hotel; the Lawson tile garage building on Fifth street, on the old Lurch property, for many years occupied by the Sentinel and a hotel sample room; the tile addition to the Allison White Front block, now occupied by the Meeks cigar store, and the Spray store one-story concrete office building on Main street adjoining the old Bank of Cottage Grove building on the east. The Sentinel estimates that the total cost of these improvements was not less than \$47,000.

COMING OF CHRIST TOPIC

REV. CROMLEY PREDICTS HIS ADVENT IN 1931

Cresswell, Ore., Feb. 5.—

George Cromley, pastor of the Presbyterian church, preached a sermon Sunday evening on the subject of the second coming of Christ. He was not preaching an evangelistic sermon, simply discussed the time of present conditions in the world as being a fulfillment of prophecy. His scriptural foundation was the twelfth chapter of Daniel. He told of reading a couple of books in his youth in the year 1905 which dealt with the fulfillment of prophecy and all these years have lived in an expectation and waiting to see if those calculations came true. He had the figures on a blackboard to sustain his argument. Those calculations predicted that in 1917 Palestine would be liberated from the Turks and the Turkish empire proven by the possession of Palestine by Great Britain in 1917. According to these same calculations and figures the minister fixes the year 1931 as the year for Christ's second coming.

Mr. Cromley is not a man to proclaim these convictions to bring them to fear. His statement is that it would be the happiest experience of his life to be living at this second coming. If in 1931 Christ should not come, he would simply acknowledge that he was mistaken but it would not deter him in the least his expectation of the second coming. The years of separation accorded the Jews for their sin against Christ will be completed according to prophecy in 1931.
