KELLEMS DEFINES FAITH

EVANGELIST GIVES HIS IDEAS OF TERM

No Promise of Salvation Unless Man Has Belief In Divinity of Jesus, He Says

Evangelist James Kellems' sermon last night at the First Christian church was on the theme "What is Living Faith?" "Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen," thus faith was defined. "Without faith it is impossible to please God," he said. "No matter how moral or upright a man may be, there is no promise for him unless he believes in Jesus. Goodness and morality are only necessary to the man who would serve God, but his righteousness alone is not enough. But we hear the objection, 'All men believe in Jesus, and therefore all men should be saved.' All men believe that Jesus is the son of God. We are all sons of God. Jesus is divine in the same sense that we are divine, only he was a better man than we are today. This kind of faith will never save the soul. We must believe that Jesus is more than man. We must believe that he is divine in a sense that we have never been nor ever will be. We must believe he is very God Himself. This faith in Jesus as a God-man is the faith that saves the soul."

"Noah had a true faith when he built the ark just as God commanded him to do," continued the speaker. "He had never seen or heard of a flood like this, but he believed that it was coming because God had told him that it would. Noah's faith was real. He followed the instructions in every detail. He might have been like some people today and said, 'Now, Lord, you will not allow me to be lost. There is no need of me going to all of this trouble. You have the power to save me without any boat. I am trusting in you. I am afraid that Noah would have been lost had this been his attitude. God wants us to trust him. But he also wants us to do something. Again, Noah might have said, 'God, I can build a boat that will answer the purpose and it will look much better. This plan of yours is a little more sensible. It does not make any difference about the form, just so long as it is a boat.' We hear just such arguments from Christians today. They think the Bible teaches this thing, but I think my way will be just as good. I would hate to stand in the shoes of any man who knows what the Lord teaches and deliberately leads men to do otherwise."

"Faith that saves is the belief in Christ that causes a man to turn from the sins of his life to obey the commands that Christ has given. Until we believe enough to shape our lives according to the plan that God has given us, our faith is too weak. God does not expect us to perfection, but he does expect us to do the best we can from day to day. Often we are weak when we begin the Christian life, but as we serve Him year after year we become a very different man."

There have already been more than 70 additions to the church during the meeting and there has been a service so far without response to the invitation.

Tonight Dr. Kellems will preach his great message on the theme, "What is Repentance?"

The residence is to be a six-room bungalow and will be erected at 922 Nineteenth avenue east at a cost of \$3500. The repair shop will be erected at the corner of Park and Oak streets by Barnes and

Leonard at a cost of \$3000, the garage will be built by M. F. Griggs in the rear of his residence at 231 Eleventh avenue east at a cost of \$500 and the store to be needed is the former Variety grill, which will be reopened by Herschel Taylor under the name of Ye Towne Shoppe. The estimated cost of this work is \$500.

EVANGELIST IS BUSY

HUNDERUP HOLDS MANY SERVICES SUNDAY

Sunday was a busy day at the Evangelical church, where special services are in progress. In the morning Mr. Hunderup preached; in the afternoon he spoke to about 125 children and in the evening he preached to one of the best audiences that has yet attended the services since they began taking service from Luke 12, the title of the sermon being, "The conversion of the leader of a hard gang in a bad city." It is often noticed that evangelists have some peculiarity, such as buttoning and unbuttoning their coat, or running their hands through their hair, but Mr. Hunderup takes it out on his handkerchief which he unconsciously manipulates around considerably.

Mr. Hunderup is an unusual preacher in many respects. First, no shorthand expert could follow him as he delivers his message. He makes few stops, and words pour from his lips in a perfect torrent, and if it is a word that he says, they are left behind as he stops for nothing, lips or no lips.

Second, he is a preacher who impresses one as believing in what he is saying. He does not beat about the bush trying to qualify the scriptures, but gives it to you straight from the shoulder. He does not lead up to a crisis and then say: "This is Buffalo, let's get off here," but gives his truths and other hitches and crises: "This is Eugene, here is where the fight begins."

"The trouble with church members," declared the evangelist, "is their reluctance to 'come down' where Jesus can use them. No Price Cuts Indicated
 There is no indication that would lead to the opinion that prices of lumber will decrease. As long as demands continue as they now are the trend of prices will be upward rather than downward. The law of supply and demand will regulate the price that lumber consumers must pay.

During the past week two big lumber deals have been made in Portland. One of the big ones was the sale of the big mill at North Bend and great body of timber around Coos Bay, was sold for about \$4,000,000 cash to a syndicate of eastern capitalists and lumbermen. This was one of the big lumber deals ever made in Oregon. It was a good indication for the future prosperity of the industry in that the syndicate, which will probably be known as the Stout Lumber company, is composed of some of the largest operators in Michigan, Illinois and the South.

Another timber deal of importance was the sale of the Carlton Consolidated Lumber company property in Yamhill county to the Flora Lumber company. This deal involved about \$1,000,000 of cash and the syndicate is now in the process of purchasing the property. The purchasing concern will log the timber and transport it to Oswego where it will be dumped into the Willamette for use of the mills of Portland.

"FARM" IS ALKALI LAND

\$4,000,000 GRAFT FROM SOIL IN CALIFORNIA, CHARGE

CHICAGO, Feb. 5.—An exchange of 150 acres of Colorado land and \$500 cash for 40 acres in California, which later was found to be 75 per cent alkali, was made by Dr. Warren B. Weiss, Sheffield, Ill., testified today before Federal Judge W. C. Lindley, where Daniel Hayes and 11 other defendants are on trial for conspiracy to use the mails in the scheme to defraud.

The defendants, all part of the Daniel Hayes company, are charged with having obtained \$4,000,000 from the sale of the land.

LUMBER ORDERS FLOOD MILLS OF THIS STATE

No Indication of Buyers Cutting Down Demands

SOME REFUSE BUSINESS

Los Angeles, Which Is Undergoing Building Boom, Is Large Buyer of Product

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 5.—Orders from every possible source keep flooding the offices of manufacturers and wholesalers of lumber. During the week past there has been no indication of buyers cutting down their demands. Mills throughout the Northwest area are running full force in an effort to get out as much lumber as possible but even then are finding it necessary to reject many of the orders offered them.

The report of the West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending January 27 showed that during that period the new business placed was 25 per cent above production and production was 25 per cent above normal. This report, represented by a fraction of the mills of the Northwest, but it gave an accurate estimate of conditions that confront all.

Several lumber buyers from California have been here recently and have found it difficult to place orders. Particular complaint was made a few days ago by a Los Angeles man who found the lumber manufacturers rather independent regarding orders. Some of them refused to accept any more orders than are now on their books, but even then are finding it necessary to reject many of the orders they received.

Los Angeles Booming
 Los Angeles is experiencing a big building boom. It is requiring a large quantity of lumber to meet its home building requirements. For the past year its lumber merchants have purchased heavily in the local markets and they have indicated no intention of slowing down. The man who complained against the attitude of the local lumbermen needs timber products.
