COUNCIL HAS BUSY MEET
CIVIC BETTERMENT THEME AT CRESWELL SESSION
(Register Lane County Special)
CRESWELL, Ore., Feb. 6.—The council met in regular session Monday evening all members present, Mayor Travillion presiding. The usual bills were allowed and a check from the county treasurer for \$129.30 road fund was ordered to be forwarded to the state highway commission to apply on Creswell portion for the paving from Oregon avenue to limits south on 22nd street. The assessment was one-tenth of the total cost being \$14.41 the total cost being \$144.59 leaving a balance of \$514.91 still to pay which by agreement is to be paid by our road money received from the county until this balance is wiped off.

The Ladies' Civic Improvement club was represented by two members of the Civic Improvement committee, Mrs. George Schulmerich and Mrs. C. H. Sedgwick each made a report on the work of the club during the past week. The matter of riding bicycles on sidewalks proving a menace on account of the untidiness and carelessness of certain riders has caused the council to order an ordinance to be drawn prohibiting the running of bicycles on sidewalks.

To Extend Water Service
The matter of extending water service outside of town limits was discussed with a consensus of opinion that the policy of the town should be that those desiring such privileges should have their territory added to the town and thus participate in its burdens as well as privileges. The mayor, H. C. Travillion, gave his address which was a resume of the things that had been accomplished the last year, also the fact that the levy for Creswell this year is eight mills, the lowest of any town or city in the county, the fact of ordinances to improve the town and remove old offensive structures and he recommended for the year such cooperation and activity as would continue this policy and secure the paving of at least two blocks of Oregon avenue.

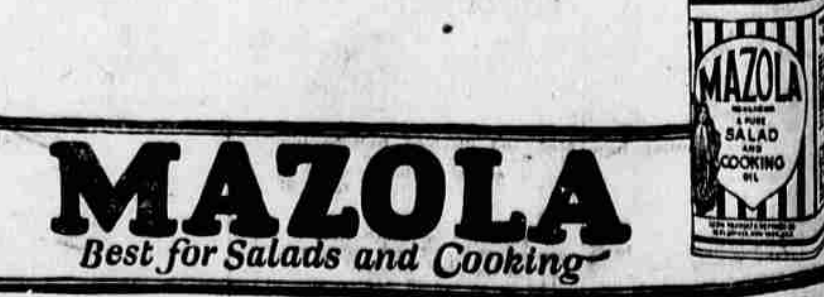
