The Webfoot basketball five, which completely upset the hope by Washington State and the University of Washington in their own ballistics, Coach Bohler's proteges will have to be journeying at top speed if they win from these formidable aggregations in their own camps. Coach Bohler is not optimistic over the prospects for the trip but figures that Oregon will be going at top speed when they meet Washington at Seattle on the last date of the trip. "Washington will need that game and need it bad," said the Oregon manager, "but we will be fixed to give them an awful battle." The Oregon coach figures that a team has to be 15 points better than another team to beat them on their own floor when there is as much difference in the floors as there is between the Oregon court and the arena and that in the Idaho gym which has a low roof with the track overhanging the baskets, so Oregon's chances to beat the Gem Staters is problematical.

However, on one point the Oregon supporters may rest assured. George M. Bohler is a master of basketball strategy and if there is a possible way to beat these teams on the trip and the Oregon team remains in good shape Oregon is apt to come out in any of all of these. Bohler used a lot of strategy in playing the Oregon Aggies. After dropping the game that counted in the percentage column at Corvallis and with another game to play and no chance to win it as the Webfoot hoopers were badly off color, the Oregon coach decided in his second strategy and let the Aggies win with lots of baskets the over confidence accumulated in that final contest worked disastrously for the Aggies for when they arrived in Eugene they found a transformed variety awaiting them.

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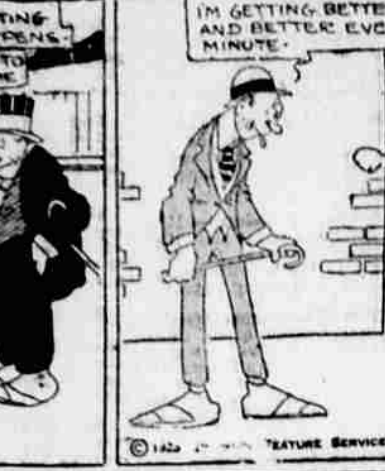

Important Measures Passed

Passage of the sterilization bill and the healthy revealed banking code, which continues the present superintendent of banks in office until the expiration of his present term, were the principal accomplishments of the senate today.

Much of the morning session was given up to discussion of the base with which the legislature is in its last week rushing through the business at hand. Senator Garland led the attack on the measure in which bills are being rushed through without ample opportunity for careful consideration, and warned the senate that if such a policy continues throughout the session, the legislature will be disgraced.

Would Give Governor License

Noted, and many worthy projects killed for want of deliberate consideration. He urged, and was joined in his plea by other senators, that the attempt to complete the vast amount of work now before the legislature by the end of the present week be abandoned and that the session be prolonged as much as is necessary to do the job thoroughly and carefully.

Flirt Staged on Banking Code

The fight of the day was staged around the banking code. Although revised by the committee, the code was not passed by the senate today. The committee of bankers would have placed in the hands of the bank superintendent, Senator Garland objected to the provision that removed the authority of the governor, or the state banking board.

This will give to the superintendent of banks almost autocratic powers, Garland declared. "Under its provisions he can literally tell the governor to go to the devil and the governor is powerless to resist it."

Garland moved that the bill be referred back to the committee for further amendment, but the motion was lost when Senator Hare of the banking committee pointed out that such action would be useless.

Twenty-six votes were cast in support of the committee's recommendations on the bill, which is 125 yeas and 95 nays.

The House senators to vote against it were Kinney, LaFollett, Strayer and Zimmerman.

Seventeen Bills Pass Senate

Seventeen bills completed their legislative cycle by passage in the senate today and are now ready for action by the governor. They are:

House bill 110, legalizing practice of Saturday half holidays for county employees in Multnomah county.

House bill 42, by Wheeler, providing for county high school funds which may be adopted by district boundary boards.

House bill 117, concerning present law relating to the establishment of school district boundaries.

House bill 40, enabling tax payments on portions of property assessed as a whole.

House bill 95, relating to filing of bonds by warehouse men.

House bill 304, providing safeguards in logging industry.

House bill 253, providing sale of lime by state lime board to farmers on credit.

House bill 263, providing for eradication of black currants.

House bill 111, making islands in navigable streams separate bridge districts.

House bill 255, by Lane county delegation, exempting from payment of state taxes the lands upon which the University of Oregon school of music is located.

House bill 233, imposing penalties upon persons using or illegally disposing of confiscated liquor.

House bill 92, by Wheeler, providing penalties for permitting livestock to run at large.

House bill 234, specifying manner in which county road funds are to be distributed.

House bill 220, simplifying procedure of state bonus commission.

House bill 31, amending laws relating to the sale of dairy bulls.

House bill 196, prohibiting livestock from running at large in certain sections of the state.

A big part of the cost of living today may be charged to lost motion, to slow, slipshod distribution of goods, and to old-style, wasteful selling methods.

For example, every year tons of fruits and vegetables rot on the ground, because it doesn't pay to pick them. Discouraged growers plant less the next season, and the supply of food is reduced. Meanwhile, consumers in the cities near by grumble over high prices. Demand and supply are not brought together.

Contrast this with the handling of oranges. One million dollars a year is spent for advertising by the co-operative association of the California Fruit Growers. A large sum, yet it is only about one-fifth of a cent per dozen—one-sixtieth of a cent for each orange sold. And this advertising has kept down the cost of oranges. To quote an official of the Exchange:

"The cost of selling oranges and lemons through the Cali-

fornia Fruit Growers' Exchange is lower today than it was ten years ago.

"In the twelve years since the first campaign was launched the consumption of Californian oranges has doubled. The American consumer has been taught by co-operative advertising to eat nearly twice as many oranges as before.

"Had the orange industry remained on the old basis, there would have been no profit in growing oranges. New acreage would not have been planted. Old orchards would most surely have been uprooted and other crops planted."

Advertising, properly done, saves money for the consumer and makes money for the producer by driving out wasteful methods, increasing volume and cutting down the costs of selling and distribution.

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FRENCH AND BELGIANS TO EXTEND OCCUPATION

TROOPS TODAY WILL OCCUPY WESEL AND EMMERICH

It Is Reported from Dusseldorf That Reinforcements Destined for Ruhr Are Arriving Daily

DUSSELDORF, Feb. 12.—The Rhine-land inter-allied commission has notified the commissioner of the Reich that Belgian troops will occupy the towns of Wesel and Emmerich at 7 o'clock Tuesday morning. Emmerich is the customs station for Holland.

BERLIN, Feb. 12.—Semi-official announcement is made here that the Franco-Belgians intend to occupy the Rhine harbors of Wesel and Emmerich tomorrow.

LONDON, Feb. 12.—A dispatch to the Times says:

"It is reported from Dusseldorf that reinforcements destined for the Ruhr, are arriving continually. It is learned that the Belgians are pressing the French to increase the severity of their measures in the Ruhr."

PARIS, Feb. 12.—The latest measures taken by the allies in the Ruhr, the stoppage of shipments from the district to unoccupied Germany, is primarily intended to bring pressure on the hands of German industry, who are regarded as detaching the German policy at present, it was explained today by French official circles. It is possible nevertheless, it was said, that arrangements might be made individually by the manufacturers in the Ruhr to complete contracts for the delivery of goods abroad. The case they were willing to pay the 24 per cent export tax.

The barrier raised around the Ruhr has two objects, it was stated. One is to press German industry to the point where it will cease obstruction to the enforcement of the treaty of Versailles. The other is to produce something to apply on reparations account. Special licenses for the exportation of manufactured goods from the district therefore, are possible in case the allies find these can be given without so relieving the pressure to make the economic influence of the measure ineffective.
