which for over eight years has desolated regions of the near east. I greatly regret that in spite of the conciliatory spirit shown by the allies and the immense concessions they were prepared to make, the treaty, when on the verge of signature, was declined by the Turkish delegation. But I cherish the hope that when the full report of the proceedings has reached the Turkish government the latter may still be disposed to accept the treaty and that the opportunity so earnestly and laboriously prepared of rebuilding the peace of the east and the stability of the future of the Turkish state may not be sacrificed.
"I welcome the prospective settlement of our war debt to the United States of America which reflects the determination of our people to meet their obligations."

Convict 90 Years Old
WALLA WALLA, Wash., Feb. 13.—Thomas Robertson said to be the oldest man to be confined in the state penitentiary here is all of 90 years old and may be older. Coming to the institution from San Juan county where he was sentenced on a charge of threatening to kill his son-in-law, Robertson, better known as "Tommy" Robertson, is one of the pioneers and trail blazers of early Puget Sound

days. Long before Seattle had a plank "main street," this aged convict married a niece of Chief Seattle. He was known, and respected among the peoples of the San Juan islands in the pioneer days as a fighter and a powerful man.

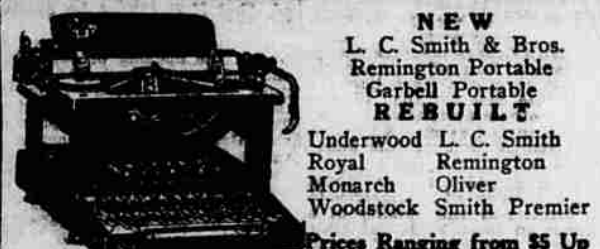
