PROPOSED INTER-ALLIED LEAGUE IS CHIEF TOPIC

Eight Eastern Cities In U. S. and Canada Interested

AIR OF MYSTERY IS DEEP

Colonel Huston, Part Owner of the Yankees, Expresses General Approval of Plans

NEW YORK, Feb. 14. — Baseball's chief topic of discussion today, the proposed continental or inter-allied league, reported to be in process of organization in eight eastern cities of the United States and Canada, and to have major league approval, if not actual backing, developed a diversity of opinion in diamond circles here and through the country.

An air of mystery cloaked the actual existence of the project and a majority of baseball men were skeptical in their views of a new league's feasibility. One or two significant developments, however, lent some further color to the proposition.

Chief among these developments was an informal conference held by John A. Heydler, president of the National league, with most of the club owners of the senior circuit, who remained in the city after yesterday's schedule meeting.

Mr. Heydler declined to discuss details of the meeting, but it was said that Barney Dreyfuss, president of the Pittsburgh club, said that he had been approached by sponsors for the new league and asked to join Montreal interests in backing a franchise in that Canadian city.

Cities Sought For Circuit

That similar interests also had made overtures to club owners in Washington and Brooklyn, two other cities mentioned as part of the new circuit, also was indicated, but their identity remains unrevealed.

Colonel T. L. Huston, part owner of the New York Yankees, expressed general approval of plans for a new league which would afford an outlet for major league material, but otherwise there was little official comment. The majority of club owners declined to discuss the project.

As results last night from apparently authoritative sources, it was planned to put clubs in the new circuit in Montreal, Washington, Brooklyn, Providence, Toronto, Baltimore, Buffalo and Newark. The latter four cities already hold international league franchises.

STANFORD GIVEN FIRST DEFEAT BY U. C. QUINT

Furious Contest Ends In 26 to 23 Score

BERKELEY, Cal., Feb. 14. — Stanford university's basketball team, the only five in the Pacific Coast conference that had not been beaten, tasted defeat tonight when it was conquered, 26 to 23, by the University of California in a furious contest that was in doubt until the final whistle.

About 2000 persons witnessed the game. The first of a series of four to decide which team will represent the southern division against the north for the coast championship. To win the right California has to take the remaining three games.

With but six minutes to play, Stanford got busy and scored half a dozen points and was still striving valiantly to overtake the Bruins when the last blast of the whistle ended the contest.
