At the Eugene high school, Principal G. E. Flinnery has prepared a program consisting of songs by the high school quartet and the boys' glee club under the direction of Mrs. Clifford Nash, also selections by the high school orchestra led by Alfred Perfect. The address will be delivered by Professor Justin Miller of the law school of the University of Oregon.

Under the direction of Principal Stanley D. Eaton, the teachers of the junior high school will present a group of patriotic songs and readings by their pupils and a minute by the upper grade students. Rev. Jesse H. Kellama will deliver the address.

At 11 o'clock the upper grades will meet in the assembly room where they will have a Washington program and an address by Mr. Edgings.

At the Patterson school, Mrs. Otto Gilestrap and her teachers have prepared a program in which every child will have some part. They have extended a special invitation to the members of the Grand Army of the Republic, the Woman's Relief corps and the Ladies of the G. A. R. to be their special guests at these exercises.

Miss Margaret Halvorsen, of the Condon school, has secured from the University of Oregon extension division a set of slides appropriate for the day which will be shown pupils and visitors.

Miss Ida Patterson, of the Washington school, has secured for each teacher to prepare one selection by the pupils of the respective rooms. The address will be given by C. E. Dunham.

Cottoned John M. Williams will be the speaker of the day at the Lincoln school. Mrs. O. C. Hamlin and her teachers have planned to open the exercises by having all of the pupils of the school sing patriotic songs and recitations. The fifth and sixth grades, also songs and readings by various pupils.

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GRAND JURY ADJOURNS
MINOR REPAIRS A.T. POOR FARM RECOMMENDED
New County Jail Though Best and If This Cannot Be Done Reconstruction Advocated

The grand jury adjourned for the term yesterday after a three-day session. No drastic changes were recommended for the county poor farm. Individual members expressed the opinion that conditions are quite satisfactory, although nothing was said in the report of the jury in this regard. The jury recommended that additional fire plugs be installed outside the buildings and new hose furnished. It was recommended that the sewer lines be repaired, and that several rooms should be overhauled to make them more habitable. Three high-back rocking chairs and two couches should be installed, in the opinion of the members of the grand jury. These recommendations were made in order that conditions might be made better for the superintendent and his wife and the inmates, said Mrs. Edith K. Chambers, foreman of the jury.

The report states that the jury is in favor of a new county jail or the reconstruction of the old one as it is deemed inadequate at present. A new heating stove be installed and the cook stove should be repaired and that hose and mops be supplied the prisoners.

CLUB SITE IS SELECTED
FORD TRACT WILL BE OBJECT OF NEGOTIATIONS
Committee of Three Named By Golf Organization to Confer With Land Owners

To confer with the owners of the Ford tract regarding the purchase of the property for the new site of the Eugene Country club, a committee composed of Dr. W. H. Dale, David Auld and R. W. Prescott, was appointed at a meeting last night of the officers, directors and finance committee of the organization. The Ford location, which is on the north side of the Williams, near the bridge, opposite Eugene, after an investigation and inspection by the club officers and an expert golf green architect, seems to be the final choice of the club officials who have been vested with power to carry on the negotiations for the location which they may select.

At the meeting last night the general sentiment favored the Ford site and this will be the objective of the committee of three that will take up the matter of purchase of the tract in addition to several adjacent pieces of ground that will be necessary for the plans of the club. If the ground is purchased arrangements are to be made by the finance committee to launch a plan for the financing of the project. Whether a bond issue will be floated among the club membership or other methods of handling the project has not yet been decided according to officials of the organization.

INDICTMENTS RETURNED
SEVERAL MEN NOW IN CUSTODY ARE HELD

Indictments against a number of men already in custody and three or four secret indictments were returned by the Lane county grand jury just before adjournment yesterday afternoon.

John Martinez was indicted for larceny of a pay check owned by his fellow railroad laborer, Jose Cuadra. J. W. Rogers and his son, Cuadra, were indicted on a charge of taking and using an automobile owned by Wayne Yarnell without the owner's consent. Roland Orr was indicted for contributing to the delinquency of minor boys, and Elmer V. Leonard was charged in two indictments with passing forged checks at Springfield and Cottage Grove.

Rogers and his son, Orr and Leonard were arraigned late in the afternoon and all will enter their pleas Friday morning. Orr said he did not want the cost to appoint an attorney for him, but Judge Skipworth appointed J. M. Williams to defend Rogers and his son. Leonard said he had an attorney in Portland who will handle his case.

"Not a true bill" was returned in the case against Chesley Fry, charged with larceny in a building. He was accused of breaking into O. A. Foster's pressing parlors in the Hotel Osburn basement.

S. P. BALLASTING ROAD
CRUSHED ROCK BEING USED ON MAIN LINE

Extensive work of ballasting the road bed of the main line of the Southern Pacific company is being planned for this spring and summer, according to local officials of the company.

The company is surfacing and ballasting the line from Oakland, Ore., south, crushed rock being taken from a quarry at Rogus river. Scattered spots between Albany and Marion, too, on the main line are being put in epic and repair work with rock from a quarry at Marion, and the same treatment is being given between Albany and Cottage Grove.

The line from Portland south has already been ballasted with new rock, the truck having been on a rock ballast, making operation faster, safer and more economical, as well as improving the appearance of the right-of-way.

This work is a part of a consistent policy of resurfacing throughout the whole Southern Pacific main-line track from Portland to New Orleans, it is said. Cost is about \$2500 a mile.

PLAN STUDENT SERVICE
SEAT SPACE TO BE RESERVED AT CHRISTIAN CHURCH

Dr. Jesse Kellama preached at the Christian church last evening on "The Cleansing Blood of Jesus." He showed how Jesus died on the cross in order that a race of sinful men might have salvation. "This death, however, does not assure us that we will all be saved," said the speaker. "Jesus died for us but that death alone will not

bring us forgiveness of sins. It is true that God has the power to save all of us if he determined to do this, but in no doing, he would take from us all power of choice.

"We would be as mere machines. Salvation is a Divine-human contract. God has promised that he will do certain things for us if we will do certain things for him. The first part of the Divine end of the contract was the death of Jesus on the cross. God will do no more until we do something for us. He has promised that if we accept Christ, if we will repent from our sins and take an open stand in obedience to Jesus before the world, He will forgive our sins and will give us an eternal life with the saints in heaven. When we fulfill our part of the contract we can rest assured that God will do his part."

Tonight will be a special students' service at the meeting. The high school and the university have started a contest to see which can have the largest attendance this evening. Special seating space has been reserved for each delegation. The auditorium and all galleries were filled last night. It is announced that the meeting will continue all of this week and into next week.

FARMERS TO USE LIME
WAREHOUSE ASSOCIATION TO EXPERIMENT HERE
Carload of Product Recommended by State Experts Has Been Purchased

As an experiment in land improvement the Eugene Grangers' Warehouse association has purchased a carload of ground lime from the state plant in Southern Oregon and it is expected to be here next week for distribution to a group of members of the organization for use. The use of the ground lime has been recommended by the Oregon Agricultural college officials and the grangers' association has planned to use the state product on several experimental plots in order to determine its value as a ground sweetener.

A carload of landplaster which is a composition of ground gypsum and other ingredients, has been distributed by the association to the members who have been engaged in the experimental work in various parts of the county. This is the second car of the landplaster to be purchased through the warehouse association this year. A carload of nitrate of soda has also been distributed for the purpose of fertilization at the farms of the members this year. A car of the nitrate was also purchased last year. The use of sulphur and other fertilizers is also being carried on by the grangers' association to obtain data on the use of these products, according to officials of the organization.

NEW MAN COMESTO COAST
S. P. COMPANY TRANSFERS J. H. R. PARSONS

According to word received by L. T. Sparks, district freight and passenger agent of the Southern Pacific company, J. H. R. Parsons, vice-president and general manager of the Southern Pacific company's lines in Louisiana, has been appointed assistant passenger traffic manager of the company's Pacific system lines with headquarters in San Francisco, effective March 1. Mr. Parsons, president of his company, is a vice-president and general manager of the Louisiana lines of the company, was general passenger agent for the same territory.

The appointment of Mr. Parsons is to fill the vacancy created by the recent death of Frank E. Batturs of San Francisco.

NEW COURSE IS PLANNED
Y. M. MAY HAVE CLASS UNDER SMITH-HUGHES ACT

Organization of classes in blueprint reading and mechanical drawing may be taken up at the Eugene Y. M. C. A., according to plans that have been tentatively discussed between the association and A. B. Nicholas, representative of the state vocational board, who is in the city. The finances for the course are provided through the provisions of the Smith-Hughes federal vocational act.

It is possible that a course of six weeks will be outlined and will consist of the blueprint work and a certain amount of mechanical drawing instruction. This work will be of much interest to men engaged in various lines of construction activity.

MORE WIRE TO BE STRUNG
FARMERS PLAN TO USE ONLY ONE POLE LINE

The lines of three different rural telephone companies extending out the Crow road as far as the brick works may be carried on one line of poles instead of three if the plans of the farmers interested are carried out. A delegation called upon the county court yesterday to discuss the matter of a franchise looking to that end.

The Coyote Telephone company and the Coyote Creek Telephone company, two distinct concerns now have separate pole lines on this road. A third line is now contemplated and it is proposed to string all three lines on one set of poles. One of the lines branches off at the brick works and it is probable from that point on there will be two pole lines at present.

MEDIC NON COM NAMED
CECIL J. PIERCE APPOINTED STAFF SERGEANT

Cecil J. Pierce has been appointed staff sergeant of the newly organized medical unit of the 186th Infantry according to Captain Orville Waller, commander. The outfit is still four men short of the authorized strength, states the captain, and vacancies are to be filled by enlistment. The medical unit will undergo the annual federal inspection Monday evening, March 12. Sergeant Pierce is the first non-commissioned officer to be appointed in the new company.

The equipment for the unit is now all here, says Captain Waller, and active training is under way in order to meet the inspection of the federal army officers

SURVEY IS COMPLETED
CRESCENT-RIGDON SECTION IS COVERED
Grades to Be Cut Down from as High as 25 Per Cent to a Maximum of Five Per Cent

Fifty-four miles of the new survey for the Willamette highway (Crescent-Rigdon section) has been completed, according to the Portland office of the bureau of public roads, United States department of agriculture. The total length of the road will be 117 miles. Fourteen miles of this project between Goshen and Lowell, are now under contract by the state of Oregon for grading and surfacing.

On the Emigrant grade on the west side of the mountains the old road grades varied from five to twenty-five per cent. The new survey eliminates this steep and dangerous climb by substituting 13½ miles of compensated five per cent grade.

C. E. Short, chief of the road survey party of the bureau of public roads, who is in charge of the location, reports seeing from 15 to 20 deer every day in the vicinity of Rigdon after the snow had driven the animals from the high mountains to the more sheltered valleys.

The remainder of the survey, amounting to 42 miles, is expected to be completed by June 1, 1923. No federal funds have yet been allocated for the construction of the project.

BANQUET PROGRAM READY
FATHERS AND SONS TO MEET TOMORROW NIGHT

Programs for the three father and son banquets to be held tomorrow evening at the Congregational, Presbyterian and Methodist churches have been completed. Dr. J. M. Walters will head the list of speakers at the Methodist church. Bruce Glavin will speak at the Presbyterian church meeting and L. P. Putnam, secretary of the campus Y. M. C. A., will be on the program at the Congregational church. Speakers representing the Y. M. C. A. will also be present at each of the banquet events.

A program of stunts and music has been prepared for the meetings of the fathers and sons. The Presbyterian male quartet under the leadership of John B. Seifert, will visit each of the churches as an additional feature of the entertainment program during the evening.

CHURCH TO DISCUSS SITE
BAPTISTS DECIDE ON LOCATION MARCH 4

Definite action toward the purchase of a new site for the Baptist church of this city is expected to be taken at a meeting of the congregation to be held Sunday, March 4, according to officials of the church. The board of trustees of the organization have investigated several possible locations for the proposed new building and it is expected that a decision will be reached by the church members at the meeting.

Plans have been launched for the organization of a holding company to take over the present property of the organization at Eighth avenue east and Post street. It is hoped, according to church officials, that construction work on the new building will be under way this summer.

ORIENT GETS EXCELSIOR
TWO CARLOADS OF LOCAL PRODUCT TO BE SHIPPED

A shipment of two carloads of excelsior manufactured at the local plant of the Eugene Excelsior company will be shipped to Hong Kong, China, according to C. O. Peterson, proprietor. The first car will leave the local plant Monday and will be followed by another car about March 1.

This is the first Oriental shipment of excelsior from the Eugene firm in about four years, says Mr. Peterson. There will be but little cutting of balm wood for the plant here this year, according to the owner who states that a sufficient supply of dry material is available at the present time for the demands of the concern.
