DAILY MARKET REPORT

OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 26.—There is a slightly heavier tone for cattle in the local market with fractional price advances noted, but a general cleanup of supplies is indicated. Centralizers here report some business as high as 44c as compared with 42c, generally quoted last week, while state cubes are ruling around 43 1/2c, as compared with business up to 44c a week ago. There was no change in the price of prints for the day and none is in sight. Because of the many inquiries for butter coming from the North and especially from Canadian sections, there is no indication of any material weakness in the butter trade for the immediate future. In fact, during March a shortage is shown in local stocks for normal seasons. Butterfat values are showing a favorable tone, with full values being paid.

EGG TRADE REMAINS UNIFORM Uniformly steady tone is generally indicated in the egg trade here, with no change in quotations. Buyers are generally offering 23c for current receipts and 20c for henneries. Good outside call.

POULTRY TRADE TRIFLE EASIER Trifle easier tone is shown for poultry along the wholesale way because of the limited retail sales last Saturday. However, one of the big f. o. b. buyers advanced his buying price on light hens to 17c during the day.

MEAT SITUATION ABOUT STEADY Generally steady conditions are shown for country-killed meats for the week's opening. Receipts were showing the usual Monday supply, but there was no apparent demand. Prices were unchanged.

APPLE TRADING VERY LIBERAL Dealers evidently anticipate a further break in apple sale records here for business during the initial day of apple week movement here. Both wholesaler and retailer are this week handling apples without profit.

MORE INQUIRIES FOR POTATOES More inquiries are arriving for potatoes here. There was a better call from the South, but at prices that were no higher than 50c at country points. Dealers generally look for a continuance of this demand during March.
