RUHR TRAFFIC NORMAL

CLASHES BETWEEN TEUTONS AND INVADERS FREQUENT

(By the Associated Press)
DUSSELDORF, Feb. 27.—Railroad traffic in the Ruhr, according to the French, is normal. There have been several accidents, however, and five men were injured through the derailing of a train near Capellen. The Rhenish telephone cable has been cut again and communication between Essen and Duisburg is interrupted. One Belgian and two French news vendors were assaulted outside of Bochum and a French officer and interpreter in civilian clothes were attacked in a restaurant. Penalties will be imposed for these offenses. At Verhulst 200 workers have asked for employment; it is declared that 8000 men are idle at

Hagen. The French authorities are still seizing orders from the German government aimed at encouraging passive resistance. The inter-allied Rhineland commission at Coblenz has decided that sentences of imprisonment for not exceeding five years passed by military tribunals may be carried out in French, British or Belgian prisons.

SANTIAGO, Chile, Feb. 27.—President Harding's sister, Mrs. N. H. Votaw and Miss Abigail Harding, received a cordial welcome upon their visit here today. They were received by President Alessandria at noon, were guests at a banquet at the American embassy this afternoon and left for Buenos Aires this evening on the presidential train.

Teams Unable to Agree on
Men to Rule Hoop Game

SPOKANE, Feb. 27.—With both Washington and Idaho basketball teams and full sets of substitutes in the city, and advance ticket sales booming, the question definitely to be disposed of before the game tomorrow night, is a dispute over officials. One man is certain—A. A. Woodward of Tacoma. The difficulty is over the second man. Hunter of Moscow was proposed and Washington objected. Stan Riddle of Seattle was suggested and Idaho objected. No agreement has been reached at a late hour tonight, but B. H. Mulligan and George Varnell of Spokane and Norgian Moss of W. S. C. were regarded as possibilities. Washington State college and Whitman college will send their entire teams to witness the contest and members of the various high school teams here for the fourth annual Inland Empire basketball tournament all will attend. In the main event Tillie Herman mixed wallops in four of the rounds for a draw but Davis won the first and last rounds by a good margin.

NENA IS RUSSIAN EXILE

VETERAN OF BATTALION OF
DEATH IS HERE

Pretty and Bob-Haired Member of
Irene Castle Girls' Revue Has
Interesting Life

Rolshavien and its tenets have made many enemies but none more bitter than Nena Regina. Pretty and bob-haired Nena, and she speaks in broken Russian and English and admits that she is an exile from her native land of snow, Siberia. Nena is appearing at the Helix theatre this week as one of the Irene Castle girls. Nena wears much in the way of gorgeous raiment during her stage appearance, but there was a time not long ago when she wore the rough, macabre costume of a cadet in the famed feminine Battalion of Death. Her brown hair, now coquettishly bobbed and curled, was clipped tight to her head then, she sadly admits, although she vehemently declares that patriotism for her beloved Russia impelled her to cast her lot with the battalion.

Two years she served in the ranks of the 1917 to 1919, says Nena, then the regime of Lenin and Trotsky caused the death of her father and drove her an exile to foreign lands. Nena likes America. She has been here now for three years. She also likes Eugene and college boys among other things, she states. In Russia after the war there were 10 women to every man, says Nena. "Zat is impossible," she says, shaking her head. "In America, zat is much better," she smilingly confesses.

SUGAR PRICES TAKE DROP

TUMBLE FURTHER FROM RE-
CENT HIGH POINT

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—Sugar prices tumbled still further today from their recent high altitude and sales of Cuban raws were made as low as 4 1/2 cents cost and freight. This represented a decline of practically a cent a pound from the top. In sympathy, raw sugar futures broke 2 1/2 to 3 points, and the previous night's close attended by active selling attributed to Cuban interests and then rallied on trade buying with final prices only two to three points net lower. Raw sugar also improved a little in the late trading with sales at 4 1/2-16 for Cuba's.

Refined sugar reflected the early drop in raws by declining upwards of 65 points in some cases, which made the final range of fine granulated from 18 to 19, although refiners listing at 9 cents were believed to be meeting the lower prices quoted by others. The belief expressed by a leading banker that the Cuban crop would reach four million tons was held to be largely responsible for today's decline here.

JOHN D. IN ART MIXUP

OIL KING HAS TAPESTRIES
WANTED LEFT IN FRANCE

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—Six medieval tapestries known as "The Hunt for the Unicorn," the sale of which the French press recently denigrated the government investigator, have been purchased by John D. Rockefeller, Jr., and are on their way to this country from London to hang in his home.

The purchase price was said to be \$1,000,000. A statement made public today on behalf of Mr. Rockefeller said:
"Before purchasing the tapestries, Mr. Rockefeller had what he considered to be responsible assurances that their sale was fully authorized by their owner. Mr. Rockefeller had no information as to any understanding between the French press and the French government concerning conditions under which these tapestries might be removed from France."

The tapestries were owned by Count Gabriel De La Rochefoucauld, who, according to the French press, had promised his government they would never be removed from France.

DIARY CLUE TO SLAYER

JEALOUS WOMAN PROBABLY
KILLED SCHNEIDER

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—"She threatened to shoot me in my face today. I have never heard of a female use such vile language." These words, penned in a little black leather bound diary were believed by District Attorney Glenne to be the most important evidence yet uncovered in the slaying of Frederick Schneider, officer of the world war and noted contractor, whose body, with two bullets in the head, was found yesterday

in his automobile on a quiet country road out on the Bronx. "She" was a jealous woman, authorities are convinced, whose identity was made clear in other entries found in the diary on the dead man. The name was kept an official secret. The soup incident was described under date of January 3, three years after the first entry in the diary.

BANDITS' VICTIM DIES

HOWARD MCCREARY, STUDENT
SUCCEUMS TO WOUNDS

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 27.—Howard J. McCreary, University of Washington student, shot by a bandit last night, while making the rounds of a string of gasoline stations, collecting the day's receipts, died in a hospital here today. McCreary, a policeman, was driving an automobile when accosted by two men in another car, who commanded him to drive his machine to the curb. Little reached for the revolver, whereupon one of the bandits opened fire, a bullet striking McCreary in the side.

Little gave his attention to the wounded man and the bandits escaped. McCreary was rushed to a hospital, where an operation was performed early this morning, but peritonitis developed and hope for his recovery was abandoned.
