STATE HAS BEGUN SUIT

PROPERTY OWNERS SUED FOR RIGHT-OF-WAY

The state highway commission yesterday began suit in circuit court here against Effie Demarest and R. H. Jacobs and wife, seeking to condemn a strip of land 50 feet wide through the premises of each near Dexter for the Willamette highway.

The amount offered by the county court to Demarest and wife was \$100 and to Jacobs and wife \$200, but they refused to accept the suit, claiming that they will be damaged to a much greater extent.

Construction work is about to start on the Goshen-Lowell section of the highway and it is hoped by highway officials and members of the county court to obtain settlement as speedily as possible.

WOOD FIRM WILL START

SPRINGFIELD PLANT TO BE UNDER WAY SOON

Carbolignum Preservative Concern is Now Moving Equipment Here from Portland

Operations are expected to start within the next 10 days at the new plant of the Carbolignum Wood Preservative company now being established at Springfield, according to Charles Wilson, who is here to supervise the installation of the equipment which is being sent from Portland. Two carloads of machinery and equipment for the plant are now at the Springfield site of the concern at the location of the former Weinhard ice plant. Another car of equipment for the preservative company is expected to be here next week, according to Mr. Wilson.

The plant will be equipped to handle timber with a length of 60 feet at the start, according to Mr. Wilson. Later, a 90-foot tank and a smaller tank of 25 feet are to be installed, he says. The tank now being placed is three by three feet by 25 feet. A high-pressure steam tank with a capacity of five bundles of shingles at one time is being installed. This steam process stains and permeates the bundled shingles with the preservative in three minutes, says Mr. Wilson. A loading platform and dock for the concern is now being built. The platform will have a dimension of 40x80 feet and later will be increased to 60x100 feet, according to the plans announced by the firm representative.

MONTH IS COLD AND DRY

LOW TEMPERATURES GOOD FOR FRUIT PROSPECTS

Keeps Buds from Swelling and Afterward Being Damaged by Late Cold Spells

February, 1923, was colder than usual and had less rainfall than the average February, according to the monthly report of Lee Goetschius, local weather observer. The low, even temperature of the absence of two extremes for this month is greatly in favor of the fruit crop as it has held the buds nearly dormant, thereby preventing early damage by frosts, said the observer, who is a horticulturalist of many years' experience.

The mean temperature for the month was 38.5 degrees, which is 4 degrees below the normal for eight years. The rainfall was 1.56 inches as compared with a normal of 4.45, being 2.89 below normal. The mean stage of the river during the month was 4.8 feet as compared with a normal since 1910, of 5.6 feet.

The maximum temperature was 58 on the 30th and the minimum was 29 on the 14th. There was but a trace of snowfall. Six clear days, six partly cloudy days and 16 cloudy days were noted. There was no hail but a sleet on the 12th. The prevailing direction of the wind was from the northwest.

MANY TROUT ESCAPE

HIGH WATER RELEASES FISH FROM HATCHERY

Matt Ryckman, Superintendent of State Plants, Estimates 150,000 Take to Streams

Trout fishing in the McKenzie and its upper tributaries should be above par this season, according to Matt Ryckman, superintendent of state fish hatcheries, who states that approximately 150,000 yearling trout between four and eight inches and about 30,000 larger fish were liberated at the McKenzie hatchery recently. This liberation was not by order, says Ryckman, but was the result of the high water which enabled the trout to swim out of the slough where they were impounded. The majority of yearling trout are now somewhere in the McKenzie, according to the opinion of the state hatchery superintendent who says that this should prove a big advantage for the anglers.

CHICKEN CENSUS STARTS

FLOCKS ARE BEING COUNTED BY ASSOCIATION

To obtain data on the number of poultry owners and the total number of hens in each flock a chicken census is under way by officials of the Grangers' Eugene Warehouse association. The field of operations of the census-takers is in the farm territory adjacent to Eugene. About 150 poultry raisers have already been listed and the number of their hens compiled.

The largest single flock reported contains approximately 750 chickens and the smallest has just four hens and a rooster. Several flocks of 500 birds have also been enumerated. A census of dairy cows is also under way by the warehouse association, according to officials of the organization.

ROAD WORK IS RESUMED

GRADING STARTS AGAIN ON DEADWOOD CREEK

Work has been resumed on the new road between Deadwood and Five Rivers, in the western part of Lane county, according to work received yesterday by Ralph S. Shelley, supervisor of the Siuslaw national forest. This work was started last fall under the direction of the forest service. The road will provide a direct outlet for the people of the Five Rivers country, who have heretofore been compelled to reach the valley by a roundabout way or take mountain trails.

CONSTRUCTION TO BEGIN

DIRT SOON TO BE FLYING ON DELIGHT VALLEY ROAD

Members of County Court Look Over South Lane Projects Around Cottage Grove

Work is expected to start on the Delight valley road just as soon as about half a mile of right-of-way through the Harding place is obtained, according to Emmett Sharp county commissioner, who with Commissioner Roney went over the road yesterday. This is a market road project for which \$6000 has been allotted in the budget. Mr. Sharp said yesterday he thought that sum would take care of all the expense unless the county has to pay more for the right-of-way through the Harding farm than expected.

This will be about the only deviation from the old route that will be made, said the commissioner, and this is quite necessary in order to get further away from the river. The road from the Siuslaw bridge to the steel bridge east of Cottage Grove is nearly three miles long.

All three members of the county court, Assistant Highway Engineer McLeod and J. M. Dovers, attorney for the state highway commission, were at Cottage Grove yesterday to make arrangements for an early beginning of work on the highway from the Cottage Grove city limits to the Coast Fork bridge north. Judge C. P. Burnard said the right-of-way matters have been settled. Arrangements are being made to obtain surplus dirt from W. B. Cooper's farm to make a fill in the roadway.
