HOLLAND GETS DECISION

JURY GIVES VERDICT AGAINST SHERIFF

Awards Him Possession of Dowson and Moyer Goods, But Case Will Be Fought In U. S. Court

G. W. Holland was given a verdict by the circuit court jury yesterday in his suit against Sheriff Fred C. Buehler, involving the bankrupt stock of goods of Dowson and Moyer at Crow. Holland, according to the verdict, is entitled to immediate possession of the stock and the jury stated that the sheriff, wrongfully withheld the property.

The stock of goods was seized by the sheriff for debts and sold, and had a chattel mortgage on them. The defendant was given 30 days in which to file a motion for a new trial.

Con S. Dillon, trustee in bankruptcy for Dowson and Moyer, yesterday, tendered the stock to Holland but made application to the district court of the United States to have Holland's chattel mortgage set aside on the ground that the bankruptcy proceedings makes void for the reason that the mortgage was not four months old at the time the firm was declared bankrupt. Dillon asks that the merchandise be sold and the proceeds pro-rated among all the creditors.

The case will be threshed out in the bankruptcy court, according to Mr. Dillon.

MILL WILL RESUME WORK

GAROUTTE BROTHERS' PLANT IS TAKEN ON LEASE

F. B. Roberts and E. J. J. of this city, have purchased the timber tract and leased the sawmill of the Garoutte brothers near Cottage Grove and plan to resume operation of operations at the plant. The mill, which has been closed for some time, has at present a daily capacity of about 20,000 feet and about 20 men are employed when in operation. It is expected that next Tuesday the plant will be in readiness to resume sawing, according to the new owners of the tract.

The Garoutte timber holdings consist of about 5,000,000 feet which will provide material for the plant for some time, according to the owners. Mr. Roberts, one of the purchasers, has been associated with the Western Lumber company of Elmira.

NEW PLANT IS DISCUSSED

OFFICER OF FAR WEST CONCERN TO SPEAK HERE

To discuss the details of the movement of the plant of the Far West Manufacturing company of Albany to this city a representative officer of the concern will be here tomorrow to speak to the chapter of commerce membership at the weekly noon luncheon of the organization, according to Eugene Chadwick, secretary of the chamber.

The committee of the chamber of commerce that has been investigating the plan of bringing the manufacturing firm here for the past several weeks will also meet in conference with the visiting Far West official in regard to the establishment of the firm here. The \$50,000 stock issue which is to be subscribed for in this city will be planned at the meeting it is announced.

SQUIRRELS TO BE FOUGHT

CAMPAIGN AGAINST GREY DIGGERS TO CONTINUE

Notwithstanding the office of county agricultural agent has been abolished in Lane county the campaign against the "grey diggers," so well started under the auspices of the county agents' office two years ago, will be continued this year, according to announcement of members of the county court. Yesterday the court made an order reappointing all the deputies in charge of the work last year in the different districts with instructions to look after it this season. They are to serve without pay, it was announced.

The campaign against the pest last year was very successful and in some communities where all the farmers co-operated in the movement the squirrels were entirely exterminated say those in charge of the work.

NURSES HOLD ELECTION

MISS GOULET PRESIDENT OF COUNTY ORGANIZATION

Yesterday was the first anniversary of the organization of the Lane County Nurses' association, and at a meeting at the chamber of commerce during the afternoon election of officers was held. Miss M. Goulet was elected president of the association; Mrs. E. L. Zimmerman, first vice-president; Mrs. A. B. Berryman, second vice-president; Miss Grace K. Robertson, secretary, and Miss Lulu Giel, treasurer.

The first year of the association has been very successful, say the members, and plans for an increase in membership are being made. It is hoped to enlist all the graduate nurses in the county.

NON-RESIDENTS FINED

TWO DRIVERS OF CARS ARE CAUGHT SPEEDING

Two non-residents were caught exceeding the speed limit on the streets yesterday and were fined in the local police court by Judge Alta King.

PLAN WOOD WORK SHOP

H. W. TURNER LEASES BUILDING ON BLAIR BOULEVARD

H. W. Turner, of this city, has closed a lease for a building owned by Isaac Wheelon on Blair boulevard between Third and Fourth avenues west and plans to install equipment for a wood manufacturing and repair of furniture, including all lines of cabinet work. Mr. Turner is a graduate of the Oregon Agricultural college, in the department of industrial arts, and recently was foreman of a wood-working plant at Portland.

ROAD CONTRACTOR SUE

C. R. MEAD SUEKS \$1078.70 FROM A. F. SAAR

C. R. Mead yesterday began suit in circuit court against A. F. Saar to recover the sum of \$1078.70 alleged due for moving dirt on a McKenzie river highway contract. It is alleged in the complaint that Saar employed Mead on July 12, 1922, to haul common earth at 35 cents a cubic yard and a residential lot to earth at 50 cents a cubic yard. He said the total amount was \$2778.50 but that only \$1710.20 was paid to him. The work was on the power plant and shell rock on the earth at 50 cents a cubic yard. He said the contract was made last year. H. E. Slattery is attorney for the plaintiff.

WOMAN TERRIBLY BURNED

SISTER OF MRS. HAWLEY MAY DIE OF INJURIES

Mrs. R. J. Hawley, of this city, yesterday received the details of a near fatal accident to her sister, Mrs. Mary Sheehan, of Salem, Ohio, in Los Angeles a few days ago. She was at first burned to death and is now in a hospital in that city very low, according to word received yesterday. Mrs. Sheehan was quite well known in Eugene, having visited her sister here.

While standing in front of a gas stove at the home of her sister, Mrs. O. E. Freeman, in Los Angeles, Mrs. Sheehan's clothing caught fire and before the flames could be extinguished she was so terribly burned that little hope was entertained for her recovery.

Mrs. Sheehan was in the room alone at the time. With presence of mind she reached up a rug and wrapped it about her and afterward jumped into bed and covered herself with the bed clothing, extinguishing the flames that way.

Y. M. WILL HAVE MEETING

DELEGATION FROM HERE TO GO TO PORTLAND

Plans for the sending of a delegation of representatives of the Eugene Y. M. C. A. to attend the annual meeting of the state association to be held at Portland March 14 and 15 will be taken up at a meeting of the board of directors to be held today at noon. The local association officials in addition to the administrative officials in charge of five lay delegates, A. E. Yount, of Portland, state boys' work secretary of the Y. M. C. A., will be here today for the directors' meeting in the interests of the state gathering. A delegation of Y. M. C. A. club officers will also attend from here.

J. O. Holt, president of the Eugene association, is scheduled to speak at the Portland meeting on the topic "What We Wish to Accomplish Through State Work." Dr. John R. Mott, nationally known Y. M. worker, will be the principal speaker at the state session.

ALLEY PAVING IS URGED

PETITION BEING PREPARED FOR DOWNTOWN BLOCK

Paving of the alleys which cross the block bounded by Willamette and Oak streets and Tenth and Eleventh avenues east is the objective of a petition that is being prepared for circulation among the property owners in the block. The alley that bisects the block from north to south is a connecting link between the end of the pavement at Tenth avenue and new pavement between Eleventh and Thirteenth streets on which has already been started, according to those who have been instrumental in promoting the improvement plan.

That the paving of the alleys is a move toward building operations that block, especially on the Willamette street frontage, is the unofficial announcement of those who have been interested in the plan for the circulation of a petition for the pavement.

VICE RESORTS BANNED

WAR WAGED ON DISORDERLY HOUSES IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, March 5.—A general order for the closing of disorderly houses in Chicago was issued tonight by Charles Fitzmorris, general superintendent of police. The order followed action by Judge Michael McKinley, last week, when the special grand jury investigating vice conditions, failed to bring indictments. Judge McKinley directed the attorney for the Juvenile Protective association to furnish officers with lists of known resorts and if they were not closed within a reasonable length of time, to obtain warrants for the arrest of the chief and others for neglecting their duty.

LEGIONNAIRES TO MEET

DISTRICT CONFERENCE TO BE HELD HERE MARCH 17

Series of Gatherings to Be Held in Different Parts of the State Next Month

According to an announcement by Harry N. Nelson, state adjutant of the American Legion of Oregon, final plans have been laid for the district conference of posts in Oregon, during the month of March. Conference will be held in The Dalles March 3, La Grande March 10, Eugene March 17 and Medford March 24. Final plans have now been completed for the Northwest coast posts to be held in Portland.

George R. Wilbur, department commander, and State Adjutant Nelson will handle the business program and the district committee men will have charge of the conference. According to the Legion's state executive board, discussion of duties of post officers, building of community or Legion homes, community work, liaison with civic organizations and problems affecting the disabled will be the chief topics under discussion. Representatives of the veterans' bureau at Seattle and a contact man from the sub-office veterans' bureau in Portland will attend the conference to handle claims of hospitalization, compensation, vocational training and government insurance.

C. W. Woodruff, executive committee man from Prineville, will have charge of The Dalles meeting. Mair A. Dano of Marshfield, the Medford gathering, Tracy Sawyer of Dallas, for the Eugene conference, and Fred E. Kiddle, of Island City, state Legion vice-commander, the La Grande conference.

ROAD CENSUS IS TAKEN

FEDERAL BUREAU MAKES REPORT ON STATISTICS

Oregon now has 22,608 miles of improved road not including that added during last season, according to the bureau of public roads, United States department of agriculture, which has made a complete census of the state. The improved road mileage at the beginning of 1922 was as follows: Gravel and drained.....15,559 Gravel, chest and shale.....6,250 Water-bound macadam.....840 Bituminous macadam.....35 Bituminous concrete.....746 Cement concrete.....139 Miscellaneous.....60

The total road mileage of the state is 45,475 miles, as compared with 36,819 miles in 1914, and during the seven-year period from 1914 the graded and drained mileage has increased from 4,718 to 15,559 and the surfaced and paved roads from 4726 to 8050 miles.

The total revenue in 1921 amounted to \$28,632,824, or \$298 for each square mile of area, \$627 for each mile of road, or \$36.22 per capita.

ICE FLOE IS REFUGE OF SHIPWRECKED CREW

HARTLY FROZEN MEN RESCUED BY NORWEGIAN SHIP

Captain Jones of Ill-Fated Schooner Says His Craft Was Crushed by Ice

ST. JOHNS, N. F., March 6.—The crew of the British schooner A. B. Bartheaux rescued from an ice floe three days after their vessel was crushed by the pack, were brought here today, partly frozen and exhausted, by the Norwegian steamer Hval which picked them up ten days ago and had been fighting the floes since to get the shipwrecked men to shore.

Captain Henry Jones, with both legs frozen and in danger of amputation, said he and his six men left their ship on February 29 after she was crushed by ice. They had left New York on February 5 with anthracite coal for this port.

The skipper said he had barely time to call his men together and get over the side with a small boat when the Bartheaux went down. They managed to keep themselves safe on a floe but had no food.

With no land in sight, they decided to stay where they were and spent the next two foodless days there. Vessels were sighted in the distance at times and the men made signals by waving part of an oil coat at the end of an ear by day and at night set coats afire piece by piece, and signalled by flares.

There was little left of the oil skins when rescue came with the Norwegian steamer found the men barely able to display their signals.
