WOMEN TAKE SERIES FROM UNIVERSITY TEAMS

Aggies Take Both Decisions by Score of Two to One—One Held Here and One at Corvallis

University of Oregon women debaters lost both decisions in a debate with the Oregon Agricultural college last night. The decision was two to one against the U. of O. team both here and at Corvallis. The question was, "Resolved that the United States should cancel the war debt of France, Italy and Belgium." The U. of O. affirmative team debated here against the O. A. C. negative team and the university negative team met the Aggie affirmatives at Corvallis.

The university affirmative team was composed of May Fenno, Eugene, and Frances Simpson, Portland. The O. A. C. negative team was Margery Stone, Junction City, and Olga Samuelson, Oregon City. The judges here were Dr. F. G. Franklin and C. M. Panum, both of Willamette university, and Victor A. Collins, of the Salem high school.

The Oregon negative team at Corvallis consisted of Lurline Coulter and Margaret Buerner. Two other debates are on the university schedule for women, one with Idaho April 9 and one with California May 16.

MRS. SALUDES GUILTY OF MURDER, SEEKS SUICIDE

JURY CONVICTS HER OF SLAYING OF MARTELLIERE

Swallows Poison on Bridge of Signs, Slashes Throat, Dashes Head Against Bars

NEW YORK, March 7.—Mrs. Paulette Saludes, the second woman to be convicted of murder in this city within three weeks, made three unsuccessful attempts at suicide tonight.

Found guilty of killing Oscar Martelliere, an insurance agent, who, she said, had wronged her, Mrs. Saludes was being led across the Bridge of Signs when she swallowed poison, then tried to slash her throat with the lid of a small tin box, and finally attempted to dash her brains out against the walls of her cell in the Tombs.

The jury, composed of men of "super-intelligence," and admonished to find a verdict with their heads instead of their hearts, found Mrs. Saludes guilty of second degree murder, which carries a prison sentence of 20 years to life. Less than three weeks ago a jury in Brooklyn returned a similar verdict against Mrs. Lillian Raizen for the slaying of Dr. Abraham Gluckstein.

Mrs. Saludes shot Martelliere October 15 and on that day was prevented from ending her own life when she attempted to leap from a window in her attorney's office.

The theory was set forth tonight by some prison officials that the woman had decided to end her life rather than to tell all the facts concerning her life which will be necessary when she is sentenced to prison.

Little is known of her history. Emotional Insanity Defense Plea—Mrs. Saludes based her defense on a plea of emotional insanity, as did Mrs. Raizen in the Gluckstein murder. Her counsel sought to show that Martelliere had seduced Mrs. Saludes' husband abroad to collect debts and that his real purpose was to get possession of his property. Mrs. Saludes in her testimony declared the broker had exerted an almost hypnotic influence over her and that he had promised to marry her as soon as they could obtain divorces. Five attempts by her to commit suicide after the shooting were described at the trial by witnesses.

HENDRICKS' TRIAL ENDS
CASE OF I. W. W. ORGANIZER GOES TO JURY

TILLAMOOK, Ore., March 7.—The case of Ole Hendricks, an organizer of the I. W. W., charged with criminal syndicalism, went to the jury tonight after having been in court since February 17.

Testimony was introduced by the prosecution at the trial purporting to show that a general strike in the mills and logging camps of Oregon had been set by the I. W. W. for May 1 next. Documents alleged to have been found in Hendricks' effects were read into the record in which sabotage, violence and "direct action" were openly advocated. Other testimony was to the effect that Hendricks had verbally advocated these measures. The defense did not deny Hendricks' connection with the I. W. W., but defended that organization, declaring that it is operated within lawful bounds.

LENINE FORECASTS WAR
SAYS CHINA AND INDIA WILL FEATURE IN CONFLICT

(By the Associated Press)
MOSCOW, March 7.—Premier Lenin contributes a lengthy article to the Pravda in which he reiterates that while a world revolution is inevitable, it is likely to be postponed until the masses in India and China are sufficiently educated and developed to wage the struggle.

He says that the interventionists in Russia and Europe were defeated and the counter revolution was broken because of dissension in the camp of "the eastern ex-

plotters and the western exploiters," namely Japan and America. Until the final struggle comes, in which the great masses of the East will have a part, the premier asserts that Russia must adopt an economic program capable of preventing the imperialistic European states from crushing her.

William Tanton passes

AGED CITIZEN OF HARRISBURG SUCCEUMS

HARRISBURG, Ore., March 6.—Harrisburg's oldest citizen and one of the oldest Civil War veterans, died when William Tanton of this city, passed away shortly after the noon hour Sunday at his home on Kesling street. He has been ill of pneumonia for the past several weeks.

Mr. Tanton, who was born in England, was in his 94th year when death overtook him, having passed his 93rd anniversary on December 16 of last year. He was born in 1829 and came to America when 19 years of age, taking up his residence in Wisconsin, in which state he lived until coming to Harrisburg in 1901. During his residence in that state he followed the farming game. At Elk Mound, Wis., on June 19, 1870, he was married to Miss Lois Lenore Rummel. For the past 30 years Mr. Tanton has been of the Unitarian faith.

Mr. Tanton's services in the Civil war consist of his enlisting in the first Wisconsin cavalry and serving for the last two years of the conflict. Since coming to Harrisburg Mr. Tanton had become a member of the G. A. R. post at Eugene.

The funeral services were conducted at the local Church of Christ Tuesday forenoon at 10:30. The funeral sermon was delivered by Rev. G. L. Matlock, pastor of the church. The remains were then conveyed to the Masonic cemetery where William Tanton was laid to rest beside his wife who preceded him in death by 13 days.

The deceased is survived by two half brothers, Charles and George Skinner, of Wisconsin, and by the following children: Byron J. Tanton, of Newport, and Ira W. Tanton and Mrs. Rolly Baker, of this city.
