SAWMILL IN OPERATION

HARRISBURG, Ore., Resumes After Two Years Lapse

HARRISBURG, Ore., March 12.—(Special to the Register)—The local sawmill of the Harrisburg Lumber and Manufacturing company, situated just north of the city, is now in operation after a rest of approximately two years because of the lumber market going to pieces. The mill was announced to have started two weeks ago, but because of trouble in getting the mill ready its opening was delayed until last Wednesday.

C. W. Laggett with his son, Earl, formerly of the Peoria sawmill, will supervise the operations. Operations begin with a supply of miscellaneous timbers being cut for the Oregon Electric Railway company to apply on an order placed with the mill. Not more than eight or ten men will be employed at the present but as the business increases at this mill additional labor will be added as needed. A crew of men are now busy in the timber filling a contract with the sawmill for a supply of logs.

DAILY MARKET REPORT

OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE PORTLAND, Ore., March 12.—Selling prices on eggs were generally reduced a cent or more last week. Both private and co-operative sellers announced a similar reduction, which means that the private firms are quoting 26¢ and 27¢ for selects on a delivery basis, while the co-ops are quoting 25¢ to 26¢ for their select price for storehouse delivery.

As previously announced, the buying price of eggs has been reduced to 20¢ for current receipts and 23¢ for henneries of select quality. All prices on a cashling basis.

Storage operations started in a small way at the week's opening, although the general influx is not expected to begin until later in the week. There is a disposition among the larger operators to go slow about storing at high prices, while some of the smaller operators may bid up their storage rates to take care of and influence the market but a fraction or so.

This is the first year for an extended period that the opening of the new storage season shows no old stock in ice boxes.

BUTTER MARKET STILL HOLDING Market for butter is showing a dull tone, although prices are holding. There are liberal offerings of state cubes, which were fine, and prices that range around 28c, while extras are held at 40c generally.

BROCCOLI PRICES ARE EASY Slightly easier prices for broccoli is quoted by some firms, although the average is about 47¢. There were no offerings for fancy and 1.35¢-1.50¢ for choice. California stock hard to move.

BETTER PRICES FOR CHICKENS Prices are being bid higher for chickens by drovers, as well as by the general trade. There are few offerings at present with heavy stock still commanding 41c. Improved tone all around.

LACK OF CALL FOR TURKEYS Owing to the poor quality of most offerings, the turkey market is showing a lack of call for turkeys, except for the live poultry trade. Real good stuff would sell around quotations.

MEATS SHOW A STEADY DEMAND There was no general change in the price of meats reported from the week's opening. Ham, bacon and lard were unchanged, as were country-killed hogs and calves. Packers quoted practically no change on beef.
