STORMSEWER, CITY AUDIT
INSURANCE DISCUSSED

Council Takes Up Important
Questions

RECORDS TO BE GUARDED

Valuable Papers and Maps In
Engineer's Office In Need of
Better Protection

A storm sewer to drain the University of Oregon athletic field, more insurance for the city hall, and a complete audit of the city officers' books were the outstanding topics of discussion at the regular meeting of the city council last night. No definite action was taken on any of the questions, each being referred to committees to act upon later.

Before the arrival of Councilman Dean Walker, who had asked that a storm sewer be built, the sewer committee had recommended that the request be turned down on account of lack of funds, but when he arrived and learned of the action of the committee, he opened the question again and argued in favor of the improvement. He stated that an institution that spends millions of dollars a year in Eugene annually should be given some consideration in a matter of this kind, and the members who had opposed the improvement said that while they realize that the sewer was perhaps needed to drain this property, it was a matter of having no money with which to do the work and that some of the sanitary sewers in the eastern part of the city that are now overtaxed and need enlarging should be given first consideration. Mr. Walker suggested that university authorities be consulted, the engineer be asked to make estimates as to cost and the matter be further considered.

Audit May Be Laid Over
Councilman Walker brought up the matter of a complete audit, stating that it will cost all the way from \$1500 to \$2000. No member of the council could see where the money is coming from this year, and the consensus of opinion was that such an audit should be left over until next year so that it could be provided for in the budget.

In bringing up the matter of insurance, Councilman Walker stated that there are \$75,000 worth of maps and papers in the city engineer's office that if destroyed by fire would be a disastrous loss to the city. A recent survey of the city hall property shows that outside the papers mentioned the property is valued at \$65,000 and there is only \$15,000 insurance on it. A vault for the engineer's papers was talked of.

Councilman Williams urged the placing of rates across such streets as Blair, Pearl and High where there is a great deal of traffic across the S. P. Tracks. He argued that some day someone will be killed by a train and the council will be blamed for not placing proper safeguards. Councilman Monroe, who is roundhouse foreman for the S. P., said that he has seen numerous drivers of automobile barely escape being killed by trains crossing the street opposite the roundhouse, but in every case it was on a disastrous loss to the drivers' recklessness. He said that such drivers would perhaps crash through any gate that might be erected.

Employment Office Suggested
Someone asked about the bill for the support of the government employment office and wanted to know what good the office does. When shown a weekly report of the number of men and women placed on jobs it was agreed that the money is well spent. The city pays \$40 a month and the county

WILL BE BROUGHT BACK

Man Who Entered Wallace Cigar
Store, Sample Store and Others,

At the Wallace cigar store cash was taken and at the Kyle store here a suit of clothes, a hat and a pair of suspenders were missed. At the Kyle store \$500 worth of goods were stolen.

The sheriff called the chief of police there asking him to hunt up Mrs. Adams and it was learned that she knew Wideberg but denied any knowledge of his burglaries. She said that he was a traveling salesman. The chief was asked to watch the express office there for any loot that might be sent by the burglar to Mrs. Adams.

It is quite probable that Wideberg will be charged here for trial. The sheriff learned that after his arrest he attempted to commit suicide.

Elkins, of Eugene, a member of the state industrial accident commission but he is one of those under consideration. There are fifty or sixty applicants."

"That the local attorney was certain to be a member of the commission was the opinion prevailing in this city although Mr. Elkins had made no statement in the matter. The position carries an annual salary of \$3600 and the members of the commission make their headquarters at Salem.
