DAILY MARKET REPORT

OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE

PORTLAND, Ore., March 15.

Full carload of butter to be sent from Portland to the East for an extended period has been started by a big manufacturer here. This removes from the local trade a supply that had shown a slight tinge of weakness in tone and created thereby a somewhat stronger feeling.

The latter was indicated by the fact that the buying price on case extras was advanced to 40c with a similar rise in prime firsts to 40c a pound.

No change is indicated in the print price and none is expected for the immediate future, although weather conditions will continue the dominating influence.

With a demand from butter from both the North and the East, there appears little chance of any heavy surplus here that cannot be moved at the present range. While local production is increasing, the demand is slowly improving and is taking up the stock as fast as it appears.

EGG TRADE SHOWS NO CHANGE

Market for eggs is showing no change generally, although the tone remains weak. Buyers continue to offer 20c for current receipts and 22c for henlayers. Portland delivery. Selling price top at 27c.

CHICKEN TREND IS VERY FIRM

Trend of the chicken trade is very firm locally. Receipts are not ample for requirements and advances of 1c a pound

are shown in some instances, with light hinds, 18c and heavy stock at 22c. Turkeys remain inactive.

MEAT SITUATION ABOUT STRAIGHT

Market for country-killed meats shows a steady tone generally, although retailers appear to be less keen in regard to calves during the 24 hours, although prices were unchanged. Hogs continue steady.

BROCCOLI MARKET HOLDS FIRM

Best Roseburg broccoli is being sold at \$1.50 to \$2.00 per crate here, with No. 2 stock at \$1.30 generally. A car of California stock is said to have been brought forth by brokers to hit the local growth.

ONION MARKET RULING WEAKER

Rather weak tone is showing for onions here with growers disposed to shade quotations in order to unload promptly. There is practically no outside movement at the moment. Local shipping sales at \$1.50 to \$2.00, according to quality and desire to unload.
