DAILY MARKET REPORT

OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE
PORTLAND, Ore., March 16.—Butter market continues to reflect a good degree of strength and activity here. No further price change was shown for Friday. Both cubes and slices held the advance of 1¢ Thursday, the carload business with Chicago keeping the surplus quite cleaned up.

Added to this demand is the increasing call from the coast for a small volume of business has yet been confirmed with the Dominion, takings by outside points, have been sufficient to keep centralizer as well as state stocks fairly well cleaned. Maintenance of the advance indicates this.

Along the same line is the fact that storage stocks of butter are getting down to the point where there is no longer any worry by the owners.

In view of the demand for butter, the butterfat market retains a favorable bias.

CHEESE SITUATION RULES SLOW
Price cutting by cheese sellers outside of the Tillamook district continues. There is a seasonal drop of weak sales in the entire situation, but no general price change is indicated for the day.

ONION TRADE NEGLECTED HERE
Trade in the onion market continues to show more or less neglect with growers getting anxious regarding a cleanup of their offerings. At this time the outside call is very limited.

POULTRY SCARCITY CONTINUED
Scarcity of live poultry continues in the wholesale trade. All sorts of chickens are in short supply, but the most acute scarcity remains in the lightweight stuff such as Leghorns, which are now laying.

DUMP SOUTHERN JUNK LETTUCE
Because of the shipment to Portland by California interests of lettuce so poor that even the poorest of the trade cannot use it, carload lots are being dumped here Oregon food dealers are doing nothing whatever to protect the public.

TAX COLLECTIONS HURT TRADE
Because of tax collections, trade along the wholesale way is generally very much curtailed. Reports of wholesalers generally tell the same story. There appears little snap to buying in any line.
