Claimant to Bantam Title of Canada Is Loser

SEATTLE, March 20.—Dandy Dillon of Minneapolis won a decision over Vic Foley, claimant to the bantamweight title of Canada, in a six-round match here tonight. Many of the fans indicated that the decision did not appeal to them.

Dillon weighed 122 pounds and Foley 124. The fight became interesting in the second round when Foley led with a left and crossed with the right. In the third round Foley appeared to be taking it easy. Dillon took the offensive at the opening of the fourth but Foley appeared to have the better of the muckups at the ropes. In the fifth Dillon drove Foley across the ring with a right and left blow that did not land clean. Both men tore into it in the sixth but the result was considered in favor of mauling and swindling.

EXPERTS SIFT 'BREAKS' IN RADIO BROADCASTING

HOOVER CALLS FOR EXPERTS TO CONSIDER PROBLEMS

Conferees in Executive Session Consider New Scheme of Allocating Bands of Wave Lengths

WASHINGTON, March 20.—Experts in the radio field and government officials concerned in its extension met here today at the call of Secretary Hoover to consider various problems that have arisen, particularly with a view to eliminating interference in broadcasting to the public.

After preliminary presentation of views by the government representatives, officials of radio associations, manufacturers and broadcasting station operators, the conferees went into executive committee sessions for consideration of a new scheme for allocating bands of wave lengths.

Failure of the last congress to enact regulatory legislation, Secretary Hoover said in the course of the conference, has made necessary voluntary cooperation and administrative assistance to establish control. The objective, he said, is to guard against taking steps which would hinder the development of an infant science, and extend the usefulness of a service which, he said, already had enlisted 533 broadcasting stations and perhaps 2,500,000 private individual receiving stations.

The government might be willing to relinquish part of its present monopoly of the wave length bands between 500 and 1,600 meters, Mr. Hoover indicated.

C. F. Jenkins, in charge of the government experimental work in the transmission of photos by radio, declared that within a short time research workers hoped to perfect even transmission of motion pictures and asked special consideration for the operation of such devices.

What Are Sun Spots? By way of explaining sun spots, an English scientist, during the course of an address made before the Royal society, suggested that there may be certain levels in the brilliant shell of hot vapors constituting the visible surface of the sun, where the temperature, although very high, falls below the critical temperature of the elements there present. In that case those elements would be precipitated into liquids, if the pressure were sufficiently great. Such liquid masses, floating in gaseous matters of greater density, would, it is thought, present the characteristic appearance of sun spots, for if the liquid were opaque, it would look darker than the surrounding photosphere. When the liquid re-evaporates the spot disappears. This theory implies that the sun spots are the first visible beginning of a change of state in the sun.—Washington Star.
