DAILY MARKET REPORT
OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE
PORTLAND, Ore., March 21.—Freight continue to be offered and paid for here and at country points, which has practically had the effect of forcing a slightly higher price range.

Mixed corn standards of so-called current record are being bid at 2 1/2c; a dozen generally, while berries are finding wholesalers anxious to pay from 23 to 25c a dozen. The latter is an extreme, while the general price reaches no higher than 24c for Perfection delivery.

No change in general selling values are shown here, although the price list is somewhat strengthened with practically no offerings of select below 27c.

Storage operations continue on a liberal scale and at elsewhere along the Pacific Slope. The bulk of the demand for berries is for the ice house movement.

No sales are reported to outside points at the moment, but March 21 being sufficient to take care of offerings.

BUTTER TRADE IS UNCHANGED
Practically no change was shown in the market for butter here during the day. Prices ruled steady, but unchanged, for both prints and cubes. Off-quality cubes are in supply, but good stuff is cleared.

SUGAR MARKET IS QUARTER OFF
Price of sugar has been reduced 25c per hundred pounds by Portland wholesalers, following a cut of that amount by one of the leading refiners. The new price is in effect.

ONION TRADE IS EXCITED HERE
Considerable excitement showing for onions here. Sales are not confirmed, but offers of \$1.75 and better are reported. California, the Mid-West, the East and the Southwest are now bidding for carloads.

POTATOES MOVING AT OLD PRICE
Because of the increasing supply of fresh greens and the opening of the California strawberry season, there is a decreasing call for apples here. Much poor quality is shown.
