DAILY MARKET REPORT
OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE
PORTLAND, Ore., March 22.—Activity continues generally in the market for eggs, with buying prices very firm and a good healthy appearance indicated in the selling market. No change was shown in either line for the day.

Cold storage operations for the first week showed a total of over 1000 cases at Portland and practically a similar amount at Seattle for the period. This is an unusually liberal movement for the start.

Trade interests are somewhat divided in their opinions regarding the probability of eggs going lower than the present level. The bigger operators appear to be anxious to put a certain per cent of their requirements into ice house at once.

BUTTER TRADE REMAINS STEADY
Market for butter continues to reflect an active and steady price. This applies to both cubes and prints. No sales to outside points are shown because of the lack of surplus. Supply is less.

CHICKENS CONTINUE ACTIVE
Activity continues all through the market for chickens, with a scramble for extra heavy hens for the Easter trade. All classes of poultry are now showing a call, with the probable exception of poor turkeys.

MEAT TRADE IS HOLDING HERE
Practically no change was shown in the price of country-killed meats here for the day. While occasional sales of hogs are reported in a limited way as high as 13c, the general market is not above 12½c.

POTATOES SELL AT OLD PRICE
Considerable carload business continues in the potato market, but there is no business of moment above 50c a cwt., although in isolated instances selections have brought 55c common freight points.

HOME GROWN BROCCOLI COMING
Limited supplies of broccoli from the Oswego section are arriving here. Roseburg stock is in greater supply, with the price there held rather firm. No further price changes here.
