HUNDREDS OF HARDING'S FRIENDS AT RECEPTION

PRESIDENT WELL KNOWN AT ST. AUGUSTINE, FLA.

Old Style Affairs, Band and All, Warmly Greets Executive and Wife

ST. AUGUSTINE, Fla., March 24.—Concluding their houseboat cruise along the Florida east coast, President and Mrs. Harding and their vacation companions arrived in St. Augustine late today and received an enthusiastic reception of hundreds of old friends.

The people of St. Augustine know the President and his wife and perhaps more intimately than the people of any other city in the United States except Marion, Ohio, for the Hardings have been coming to this old Spanish-founded city for nearly 20 years. For that reason the arrival of the presidential party here differed from that at the various other east coast cities visited.

It seemed like something of a home-coming.

Several thousand lined the sea wall within a few minutes after the presidential houseboat, the Pioneer, was sighted coming up Matanzas bay, while a hundred or so had kept a patient watch during the afternoon. Even the band was there to play as the Pioneer docked.

Mr. and Mrs. Harding recognized a number of old friends in the crowd that pressed around their automobile and lined the streets leading to the Hotel Ponce de Leon where the party will stay for a week before leaving Florida.

Harding, Wife Warmly Greeted

These, the President and his wife greeted warmly. Arriving at the hotel the chief executive and Mrs. Harding were formally welcomed by the Governor of Florida and Mrs. Hardee, who had come over from Tallahassee.

The week to be spent here is expected to be much like the previous 18 days the President and his party have spent in Florida, quiet and restful. The executive will not be able to secure the seclusion here that has marked the houseboat trip, which took him from Ormond to Miami and back up the coast to this city, but arrangements have been made to insure a continuation of the rest and recreation. A game of golf will be the principal feature of his daily program.

Several administration officials, including Attorney General Daugherty, will join the party here and the President on his arrival found Fred Starck, member of the war finance corporation and one of those prominent in his pre-convention and election campaigns in 1920, awaiting him.

TAKES RAP AT GAMBLERS

PIGGY HEAD WILL EXACT \$100 SHARE FOR STOCK

MEMPHIS, Tenn., March 25.—Clarence Saunders, awaiting trial in the jam when trading in Piggy Wiggly Stores Inc., of which Saunders is the president, was stopped by the New York exchange Tuesday after a day of wild fluctuations, will decline to accept in settlement, at this late day, any of the stock sold under his \$100 a share offer of yesterday.

Mr. Saunders in a statement

issued late today, held the offer of yesterday was a "one day" proposition and those still short cannot now make settlement with that stock.

Mr. Saunders in making public his intention to combat any effort

to tender the stock bought yesterday, again bitterly denounced the action of the stock exchange in extending the time of settlement and generally the system of handling the situation which grew out of the flight of Piggy Wiggly.
